

INTRODUCTION

For a small borough Woodstock has a remarkably fine collection of records ranging from the late 15th century to modern times. Few throw as much light on the activities of the town at a particular period as the chamberlains' book for 1609–50.

The manuscript, B 79, is still kept with the borough records in the town hall. It is paper but with parchment wraps, in this case made from a medieval music manuscript. That was contemporary practice, and the borough court books are similar. The covers were probably added after the accounts had been written up, as some entries in the inner margins of the manuscript are now hidden by tight sewing; 17th-century scribbles on the covers suggest that it was done fairly soon. The folios are numbered 1–211 plus 18a and 24a, and are of uniform size, 21cm. by 56cm. They are worn on the right hand corners but otherwise are in good condition, testifying to continuity and care in custody. Blank folios are indicated in the edition.

On its cover the manuscript is called 'A booke of the chamberlins accomptes, and of the rentes of the boughroughe of Newe Woodstocke'. It contains the accounts for 1609-50, two rentals (1609-13 and 1614-18), an account of dole money paid from 1615 to 1621, and a record of a council meeting in March 1636, preceding the 1636 account. All the records in the book have relevance to the finances of the borough. Checking and collecting the rents was among the chamberlains' most important work for the town, and the many alterations and additions to the rentals show this, particularly between 1609 and 1613. The details of the dole money follow the 1622 account and seem to be a record made by the town clerk after the death in that year of the donor, Sir Thomas Spencer of Yarnton, perhaps to ensure that the town knew what to claim from his heirs. The dole money was distributed by the mayor and until 1646 the chamberlains' accounts did not deal with its receipt and distribution, only with the money spent to secure payment from the Spencers. The brief record of a March meeting of councillors in 1636 dealt with the constables' accounts, as well as giving some of the orders made for the town, useful information in the absence of a council order book for this period.

The chief interest of this edition lies in the chamberlains' accounts from December 1608 to December 1650. They are fuller and more informative than other early financial records which have survived for

the borough. The one surviving earlier account for the single year from Michaelmas 1517 to Michaelmas 1518 is useful for comparison, but belongs to the period before the corporation had acquired all the money and reponsibilities seen in the seventeenth century. Then there is a long gap in the accounts until the 1609 to 1650 series, and again after 1650 until 1738, when there is a second series up to 1812. The mayor's book, Borough Mun. B 81, called the ledger book in the chamberlains' accounts below, contains the annual audit from 1534 to 1812, but the entries are brief: until 1619 only the town's debts and liabilities were given, with thereafter the final totals of the chamberlains' accounts. It supplements the accounts printed here, particularly as it gives more detail of audit decisions, but it does not supplant them. These early-seventeenth century accounts, therefore, give us the first opportunity to see in detail how the Woodstock borough finances worked. They provide an historical record of the town under the early Stuarts and in the civil wars, and add to our knowledge of town reactions in that troubled period.

The chamberlains' accounts were made up at the end of the year from other records, none of which are now extant. For example, their own daily accounts, and those of the town crier and the constables, as well as such items as an almanack, are known only from occasional mentions in this book, but were obviously the basic materials. Fortunately, other contemporary records have survived in Woodstock's well-stocked archive room. They include the ledger audit book already mentioned, earlier and later rentals, records of freemen's admissions and of council business, property deeds, original and enrolled, and lists of inhabitants, musters and taxes. In addition there are court books of various dates between 1588 and 1635 for the portmoot and frankpledge courts, as well as for Woodstock's own sessions court. Information from these as well as from state and ecclesiastical records has been used for this edition, though not exhaustively. Through probate records, for example, it is possible to find out more about local people mentioned, and some identifications are provided in the footnotes and appendix. The chamberlains' book will itself prove a quarry for other researchers.

The evolution of the accounts and of the chamberlains' office can be traced throughout the 16th century. Chamberlains were not mentioned in the 1453 grant of incorporation, and they may have been comparatively new officers when they appeared in the first surviving account of 1517–18. In that account the two chamberlains had money in hand 'of the last yeres proffet the first accompt', but whether this previous account was the chamberlains' first account or the first time those particular men accounted is not clear. The town had had more money to manage since

1453 when Henry VI granted its charter of incorporation and an income from the borough quit rents, from Le Pool marsh, and from fines, forfeitures, waifs, strays, felons' goods and other royal perquisites. The charter granted as well the assizes of bread and ale and other victuals, and confirmation of the fair of St. Matthew (21 Sept.), dating back to the 13th century, and of St. Mary Magdalen (22 July), which had been held since the 14th century, both fairs now for four days.² In the same year townsfolk endowed the chantry of St. Mary which Henry VI established in Woodstock chapel, and the new corporation was closely involved with the management of the land and shops belonging to it.³ In 1488 the mayor and corporation acquired more such obligations when Thomas Croft made them trustees of the lands he left to St. Margaret's chantry in Woodstock chapel and for the two poor men who were to pray there,⁴ apparently the beginning of the almshouse.

Despite all this, the role of the chamberlains was limited at first because the mayor took the rents, waifs and strays and other perquisites, and paid the fee farm rent of £2 13s 4d to the Crown for Le Pool.⁵ Other property was similarly farmed out throughout much of the 16th century to individuals, who were responsible directly to the council.6 At the audit of the 1517-18 account, held in 1519, the chamberlains accounted for only 55s 2d of the borough revenues, but their responsibilities for repair of the town's roads and property were there, as later, and the connexion with the chantry. The account was brief. They took in money from a few rents only, i.e. 20s from Le Pool, 4s from a shop under the guildhall and 2s 4d from the Spittle House close in Old Woodstock; 6s 10d came from making freemen and 22s were left over from the previous account. They paid out 2s 7d on the hedges of Spittle House close, 9s on the stocks and cucking stool, 4s on the chantry lands, and 2s 11d on wages to repair the highways, 12d similarly for the prison wall work and for lime, and 20d for crests for the guildhall; they were allowed 13s 4d for losses to the lessees through damage to Le Pool by the king's men and their horses. Their total expenditure was 34s 6d, and so they had 20s 10d in hand for the next year. The ledger audit book (B 81), which was begun in 1534, shows that the chamberlains were presenting such limited accounts regularly for the next fifty years.

By the late 16th century there were changes. The chantries were dissolved in 1547, but the town bought the chantry house, which Croft had endowed, for the town almshouse in 1551. In 1565, by grant from Queen Elizabeth, they acquired some of the houses and rents which had belonged to St. Mary's chantry, so that they were once again dealing with property which earlier townsfolk had given for the community.⁷ The

town obviously hoped to benefit from thriving local trade and by the same grant in 1565 was allowed to hold a new Friday market, in addition to the Tuesday market dating back to the 12th century, and two new fairs of St. Nicholas (6 Dec.) and Lady Day (25 Mar.), each for four days. The stallages and tolls added to the town's revenues.8 The grant of the wool beam at the same time was similarly designed to increase trade and help the town, and the mayor received all the profits from the weighing of wool and yarn in the market. In 1576 there was further encouragement when Woodstock was made a staple town, where anyone could buy and sell wool and yarn.9 In 1585 more charity obligations came with Richard Cornwell's endowment of the grammar school, and in the next decades the town embarked on moving the almshouse away from the original church site and enlarging it.¹⁰ Most important for the chamberlains' role was that by reforms in 1580 the mayor was given a fixed stipend of f,10 a year and the chamberlains took over the revenues he had been collecting, including the profits of the wool beam, and they now paid the fee farm and guit rents to the Crown.11 This revolution in council affairs meant that the chamberlains' status and responsibilities were enhanced and that their accounts must have become fuller and more like those we see in the early 17th century, when they accounted for all the borough revenues. Because of these changes the Woodstock chamberlains' accounts are clearer and easier to understand than those of other local corporations like Abingdon, Banbury, and Oxford, where different officials each presented their own separate accounts at the audit.

In the 16th century and in these accounts for 1609-50 the two chamberlains were elected at the audit in December, not as in the 19th century with the mayor in September.¹² They were chosen from the common council, the senior elected by the common council, or more precisely in these accounts, those who were at the audit, while the junior was the choice of the mayor; he would move up later to be senior. Although elected annually, chamberlains frequently served a number of years, as several careers in the biographies below show. George Noble, for example, was chamberlain for some fourteen years in all. The cursus honorum was envisaged in the 1580 constitution as a progress from tithingman, churchwarden, and constable, though these offices could be by-passed on payment, to chamberlain, alderman and, for some, mayor. 13 Those who reached the office of chamberlain were of some standing in the local community, tradesmen or others who could bear the expense of serving. They were unpaid and had often to reach into their own pockets for the money for the accounts before the revenues came in, since there was usually only a small amount handed over in ready cash as a running fund at the beginning of their year. Not much is shown in these accounts as to how the two divided their duties. The junior chamberlain presented a small account of eight items in 1610, and in 1636 he held the book recording gifts and rewards. In 1646 their accounts are entered separately and, as might be expected, the senior chamberlain dealt with the major revenues. There does not seem to be as clear a division of duties as a larger town like Oxford was perhaps obliged to have.

The town clerk was almost as important in the development of the accounts. He was recorded in Woodstock in 1498¹⁴ and would have been needed to deal with all the responsibilities and records arising from the 15th-century incorporation. As the senior permanent official he could exert influence over 'amateur' chamberlains, particularly when, as in these 17th-century accounts, he was a man of standing in the community and closely related by marriage to the leading families. We can see that many of the functions of the town clerk had developed in the 16th century. He is mentioned in the reformed constitution in 1580 and in 1589 he was specifically ordered to write up the 'mayor's book', i.e. the ledger audit book, though he presumably had been doing that already. He had to keep the records in the town chest, for which both he and the mayor had keys. ¹⁵ In the ledger book in 1598 Thomas Rawlins, the town clerk, dealt with the mortmain for the school and almshouse, as well as looking after the town's records.

We owe the accounts below almost entirely to the town clerk Edmond Hiorne, who took over the position from Rawlins, his fatherin-law, in December 1607.16 A year later he began writing up the chamberlains' accounts in this book, and during his long tenure of nearly forty years he put his own stamp on them and gave them a more orderly and settled character. In a very real sense the accounts are his as well as the chamberlains'. Hiorne collected receipts and some of the money, cast up and wrote the accounts for the chamberlains and signed them as they did: he then entered the audit account and other records in the ledger book. He also wrote up the court records of the town and records for Woodstock manor of which he was deputy steward. He belonged to the new breed of town clerks, meticulously keeping his records and maintaining a watchful eye on the finances and policy of the town in all spheres. He was not always in the town office. He journeyed in the county and to London on town business. He sat in the courts, was a justice of the borough, and saw to legal transactions, although, like other Woodstock town clerks up to the 19th century, he was not trained in law; expert legal advice came from the recorder of the borough.¹⁷ It is, though, the scrupulous care taken over the layout of the accounts and in writing them up and ensuring they were agreed and signed which reveals the dedicated professional clerk in Hiorne. He undoubtedly 'worked over' the accounts. Looking at the ledger book for his first year, 1608, we can see him trying to find out where and when payments were made and establishing the practice of entering and signing the receipts. It was probably his thinking that led to the transfer of most church business from the town accounts after a few years. For example, in 1608 he wrote in the ledger book that the Whitsuntide money from the Whitsun sports or revels, which at that time was handed over to the chamberlains, was 'cleerly gotten to the use of the Church'; it disappeared from the chamberlains' accounts after 1615 and from 1617 appeared in the churchwardens' accounts. The accounts in the 1630s show how he liked to present the finances, grouped under headings such as wine, school, or repairs. The change can be appreciated by comparison with the first account of 1609.

The importance of his position can be gauged from the fact that it was he who was blamed for handing over the town armour to the royal forces in 1642. He was brought before the House of Commons to be reprimanded by Speaker Lenthall, who was also the recorder and member for Woodstock. Hiorne's loss of the clerkship in the Civil War purge of 1645 must have hurt, but he remained in the town and on the council. He voted against making Richard Croke, the deputy recorder, a freeman in 1652, perhaps because of Croke's connexion with parliamentary commissioners who destroyed the royal manor and park in 1649. Hiorne was restored to office in 1662, but in 1663 he retired in favour of George Ryves, his granddaughter's husband. He lived on in Woodstock until his death in 1669. Though his own father was a yeoman and his brother a blacksmith, his marriage had brought him gentry connexions and his will shows that his daughter Ann had married a Fleetwood, from a leading local family from the park.¹⁹

Only a few years of the accounts of his successor, John Williams, have survived. He was the son of an earlier mayor, Thomas Williams, one of the wealthiest bakers and innkeepers in Woodstock in the 1630s.²⁰ John Williams, too, was deeply involved in town affairs. He was admitted freeman in 1635, worked his way through the system as churchwarden in 1640, constable in 1641, and lessee of the common meadow from 1640. He was set, one would have thought, to become chamberlain and alderman in time; instead it looks as if he was diverted to the town clerk's office at a time of crisis in 1645. He differed in politics from Hiorne, but was equally concerned to preserve the interests of the town. His style of writing up the accounts differed in that he did it on a day and month basis, but they are full from 1648 and show the restoration of accountability after the

Civil War with, for example, the recovery of rents and the making of back-payments in the last years of the 1640s. Williams served the town throughout the Commonwealth period, apparently supporting the regime: he named a son Oliver. Though the chamberlains' accounts have not survived for these years, the ledger audit accounts show that they were presented and were entered by him. In 1662 he was dismissed, along with his brother-in-law the mayor, Alexander Johnson, in the new purge of corporations. He died before Hiorne, in 1663, and, perhaps because of the troubles of the 1640s and 1650s, he left only £184 10s, rather less than his father, who died worth £464 15s 11d in 1636. 22

Woodstock was one of the towns where the town clerk was paid for his work. In December 1607 the ledger book records that it was agreed that Edmond Hiorne should be paid 26s 8d a year for life. The accounts below show that he also received 13s 4d for attendance at the assizes in Oxford twice a year, when he reported on the town's sessions court, and 5s for writing and casting up the chamberlains' accounts, a total of 45s a year. That remained the payment until Williams became town clerk. He received just 26s 8d a year, perhaps as an economy measure and because Hiorne continued to deal with the courts for a time. There would in addition be certain fees received in the courts, but those form no part of the chamberlains' accounts.

We learn something about the working conditions for the town clerks and the council in the 17th century from these records. The town office had been built by Rawlins at the back of the town clerk's house near the church and opposite the town or guild hall.23 Both he and Hiorne rented the house from the council at first, but in the 1618 account Hiorne is recorded buying the freehold. In 1609 he purchased a lock for the office door and in 1621 two iron-plate bolts. In 1630 the office was repaired and new slates put on. In 1640 Hiorne had a new table and four joinery stools and a new wainscot cupboard installed, with red leather for the cupboard and 36 yards of matting as well as leather for the seats. At the same time a table of fees for the office was written out. The town chest contained the records of the town such as the ledger book and bonds and deeds, and in 1609 Hiorne had likewise bought a lock for it. In 1621 the chest was said to be in the care of alderman Thomas Meatcalfe, and was again furnished with a lock and key. This is presumably the chest now in the present town hall. For the audit the town clerk and chamberlains moved over to the town hall, though on a rare occasion in 1643 the chamberlains' accounts were audited in the town clerk's office. The town or guild hall was also the place where the town courts were held.

Other officers appearing in the accounts were mainly those who collected money for the town and those receiving wages or stipends. Hence, in the receipts section the chamberlains accounted for money received each year from the sergeant at the mace and the tollman. The sergeant, although elected annually at the same time as the mayor in September, kept his office for life. They collected the stallage money and paid some to the chamberlains, but kept part, the proceeds from the St. Mary Magdalen and St. Nicholas fairs, for their emoluments. Sometime between 1635 and 1637 the council decided to pay them a wage of £1 10s instead, and for a few years the stallages were collected by the tollman for a wage and paid over to the town. By 1645 the sergeant was again collecting stallages, but for a wage on the new basis. Other business also brought them into the accounts: in 1633, for instance, for the repair of the great silver-gilt mace which it was their duty to carry on ceremonial occasions. The tollman was also the crief of the court and keeper of the town hall, where he looked after the fire buckets. In 1609 he was Edward Longe, a lastmaker, who had been given his office as crier for life in 1608.24 Longe was also the church clerk, and this probably explains why he was paid in the early accounts for looking after the bells and graves. As tollman he paid over the sums he collected from tolls for the first twenty five years. Sometime after 1635, perhaps after Longe's death in 1636, there was another change in policy: this time, in contrast to the stallage arrangement, a set sum or 'farm' of f8 a year was paid in by the new tollman, declining to f.4 by 1650.

Under expenses the chamberlains accounted for the stipends and fees of the higher officers such as the recorder, town clerk, and mayor, and also for wages to lesser officers. The warders at the fairs, for example, were paid 8d each per fair, a rate which did not vary throughout the period. The town scavenger, Raphe Lucas, received 6d a quarter in the 1630s and 1640s and a besom. Lucas was a useful character who also 'swept up', as it were, the poor in his capacity as the beadle of beggars from 1632. That seems to have been a new office, created in response to Charles I's book of orders, urging action on the poor. From then on the chamberlains accounted for the purchase each year of red and blue cloth, later a more sober grey, for the beadle's coat and cap.

It is in the disbursement section that the town's two constables can be found, engaged with many aspects of the borough's administration. They collected fines and estreats for the court, looked after prisoners, and were responsible for the town armour and much of the work with musters and trained bands which appears in these accounts. Sometimes payments were made to them for their own levies as in 1622 and 1636, and they

were frequently reimbursed for their expenditure on the poor and vagrants. They were elected annually at the leet court and their own accounts should have been presented before the quarter sessions court. Such overlap of duties and officers was common where there were several bodies responsible for the same problem, generally the poor at this time. For this reason the collectors for the poor sometimes appear in these accounts although as parish officers they are usually to be found in the churchwardens' accounts. In 1633, indeed, they were elected at the audit meeting. The surveyors of the highways likewise had payments made to them. They were elected in the leet court and worked under an agreement with the council, as described later in the 1650s, to repair the borough roads.²⁶

Some town officers, who were elected in the courts and made presentations there, were only occasionally mentioned in the accounts because they had no regular payments to receive or make. References to the leather sealers and the tasters and weighers occur only when their seals or scales and measures had to be replaced. Tithingmen, essential in the courts, make only an incidental appearance when in 1611 one was assaulted. A full range of the officers is more easily seen in the court books.

The officers of the account were responsible to the commonalty of Woodstock borough, comprising a common council of twenty councillors and five aldermen including the mayor, and the other freemen, numbering some 40-50 in lists surviving from 1608 to 1630.27 The common council, the town's governing body, was largely made up of leading businessmen and notables. The mayor and aldermen headed the council and supervised its finances. Under the 1580 constitution the mayor must have served as chamberlain. He was elected annually from the aldermen but was usually re-elected for a second year, and because of the smallness of the group would often have other turns at the office, as the appendix below shows. When aldermen were long-lived the office was monopolized by a few. The mayor's own expenditure on town business appears in the accounts, particularly that on entertainment and on the poor and on prisoners in Oxford castle. In 1631, again apparently in response to the book of orders, he was given 6s a quarter to distribute to the poor, instead of making payments at will. His stipend of f, 10 was spent on the two dinners held after the leet courts, but in 1641 the accounts show that the town took economy measures and discontinued his stipend in favour of paying the actual cost of the dinners, which in the following years was indeed cheaper. High Wycombe in neighbouring Buckinghamshire did the same in a similar economy campaign in the 1640s.²⁸

Grander men from outside also had a place in the borough accounts. Most important from the 16th century were the recorder and the high steward, who were regarded as giving status to the town. The recorder was a lawyer who provided the borough with legal expertise. New Windsor, on which Woodstock's privileges were modelled in 1453, tried hard and in vain in the 17th century to acquire one, but Woodstock had James Bury as recorder by 1551.²⁹ The recorder was paid f.3 6s 8d a year, and on occasion collected it in person in December; he took an oath and had a formal patent of office, as shown in the 1622 account. He was in the commission of the peace for the borough, and he or his deputy were supposed to be present at the court of sessions and the leet and to form a quorum with the mayor for the court of record.³⁰ He was consulted on such matters as the procedure to be followed in 1611 when the mayor died in office, about school matters in 1638, and about the Spencer dole money in 1640. The recorder usually represented the town in Parliament. Sir James Whitelocke, who held both offices, maintained in his biography that this was customary. He also pointed out that there could be tension over this between them and the high steward.31

The high steward's role was more ceremonial, but he was a grander personage and provided the political patronage regarded as vital for the town. He was not paid a fee, but each year the town sent wine, sugar, or a taste cake at Christmas, and payments to his servants, regularly recorded in the accounts. In the early years he was chosen from among leading local landowners. Thus, Sir Henry Lee of Ditchley (d. 1611) was followed by Sir Thomas Spencer of Yarnton (d. 1622). Philip, 1st earl of Montgomery and 4th earl of Pembroke, was high steward for the remainder of the accounts. Although not a local landowner he was steward of the royal park and powerful in the royal household, of which he was Lord Chamberlain from 1630. From at least 1614, according to Whitelocke, he and his brother William, 3rd earl of Pembroke, tried to bring Woodstock under their influence so as to secure the election of their nominees. In the 1620s they succeeded in gaining at least one of the two places for their candidate, and the 4th earl allegedly overturned the town's choice in 1640, procuring the election of William Lenthall and Sir Robert Pye to the Long Parliament.³²

The borough, of course, spent money on writs and returns for those and earlier elections and on correspondence with its members, though the actual election costs would be paid by the candidates and their patrons. The accounts also show that it sent gifts to other local and influential families such as Crown lessees of the park lodges and park rangers, and to local Catholic gentry, like the Brownes of Kiddington,

who were high in Stuart favour. In 1641 gifts went to Robert Dormer, 1st earl of Carnarvon, son-in-law of the Earl of Pembroke and steward through him of Woodstock manor; he died in the royalist cause at Newbury in 1643. The borough also sent, in 1641, to 'Old Subtlety', the Puritan Lord Saye and Sele. It was, however, too early to presume that the town was picking sides.

The process of the 17th-century audit, for which the chamberlains' accounts were prepared, can be studied in the ledger audit book and in these accounts. The ledger book shows that in the 16th century the audit had originally been taken near St. Catherine's Day (25 Nov.), whereas in these accounts in the early 17th century it was held on or near St. Thomas's Day (21 Dec.), and from the mid century accounts were often audited in the subsequent year. Payments came in at various dates in the year, but the major town rents were paid at Lady Day (25 Mar.) and at Michaelmas (29 Sept.), and that meant the town accounts had to be presented yet later. Incidental expenses were accounted for up to the end of the accounting year. The Civil War delayed the audit of 1642 and 1643 until March 1644, and from 1645 the accounts were audited in January or February of the next year, but the year of account still ran from December to December. The December date meant that the accounts took in part of two mayoral years since the mayor was elected in September and took office at Michaelmas. Perhaps this gave some greater check on the accounts since the second mayor audited part of his predecessor's expenditure, but the reason is more likely linked to the gathering in of income at the end of the year.

The audit was held before the mayor and such of the aldermen and members of the common council as were present. In the 16th century the chamberlains brought their box with them to the audit and in 1590 they had to take out a bond for the money they handled, but neither boxes nor bonds are mentioned in these 17th-century accounts. The mayor and town clerk and occasionally others signed the accounts in the audit book, while the mayor, town clerk and chamberlains signed the presented accounts. Corrections were made to the accounts, some at the writing up and others at the audit. Where it looks as if there was an audit correction, it has been indicated in this edition. There are also later notes added when, for example, debts were paid; these again are indicated below. There are sometimes obvious mistakes in addition and in 1610 the rents were omitted as an item, but not in the final reckoning. It is not always possible to explain what happened since there may have been allowances made at the time of account. Accordingly, no corrections have been made to the manuscript totals in this edition.

The object of the accounts was to record receipt and expenditure during the year and in particular the amount still to be collected or to be handed over by the chamberlains at the end of the year, the usual charge and discharge of medieval and contemporary accounting. At the audit the new chamberlains were made responsible for the receipt and expenditure of the annual income, and for the collection or payment of debts owed to and by the town. They were charged with the collection of all the rents on the rent roll, but were allowed for unpaid rents in their disbursements. Unpaid debts appeared in a separate item of debts owing to the town and there was another section for debts owed by the town. Debts to the town included unpaid rent, like that owed year after year by the Whittons for the Great House, or admission fees or payments for sealing charters. Debts owed by the town included money borrowed by the town or owed after the account to their officers, as well as capital on which there were charges for sermons or charities, i.e. the town's liabilities. To know if the town was living within its means, therefore, it is necessary to know not just the annual expenditure and receipt, but also the extent of debt and liability: how much it had borrowed or had in money out on loan at interest or was liable for from endowed funds for the poor or for sermons. In certain years the debts and liabilities were equivalent to almost half the receipts, but the debts did not have to be repaid at once and were sometimes wiped out by a bequest or use of an endowment as in the case of the school money below.

The town relied a great deal on the goodwill of its townsfolk and officers. The council would collect money at its meetings, as for a constable's levy in 1636. Like other towns it raised loans from townsfolk for unusual expenditure: in 1603 the borough borrowed £21 10s from twenty one local people, which was still being paid back in the early accounts in this book. The mayor and chamberlains made payments for the town out of their own pockets and by 1614 the town was paying interest on such debts. The officials in turn were in a position to secure preferential treatment in taking town leases of the corporation meadow, Le Pool, or of the Hampton Poyle leys. Local businessmen acted as town bankers. William Rayer took the £50 school bequest money on loan in 1612 and paid the interest over for the schoolmaster's salary. He also financed town expenditure over a number of years and the loan money eventually went in the time of his son in 1640 to pay the debt which the town had incurred to them both, while the town took on the payment to the schoolmaster out of current funds. The accounts show that the interest rate was ten per cent until 1626 when it droppped to eight per cent and the schoolmaster got only £,4 from that source. It was at that time that Thomas Rayer was

summoned before the archdeacon's court because he refused to pay more than 8s on his father's bequest of £5 for a sermon, on the grounds that he could no longer obtain the higher rate himself.³³

The chamberlains rarely had money to hand over to the town at the end of the year but it is not a situation unique to these accounts or this town. In 1584, admittedly an exceptional time because of the reorganization, the town had owed £67 17s 8d, and in the 19th century the commission of enquiry into corporations showed it spending more money than it received, a position it shared with a number of other towns. It did not necessarily mean that matters were bad in the town, as long as local businessmen had confidence in the corporation. In these accounts the town had a profit in ten of the thirty-six years, as shown in the table of totals. The deficit was above £14 in only six years (1612, 1613, 1621, 1622, 1642, 1648), and can be explained by higher expenditure on enlarging the almshouse in 1612, repayment of debt in 1613, the new commission of the peace in 1621, repair of highways in 1622, the war in 1642, and the attempt to secure the Yarnton dole money in 1648.

Until 1640 the annual receipts were between £50 and £60. A third to a half (c. $\int .25-30$) came from the quit rents and property which had been granted by the two monarchs and from houses purchased with the money given for the school. Some rents were lost when property was sold off, as to Edmond Hiorne in 1618, but there were also additions, as in 1626 when the town increased its rents by charging for encroachments on the waste by tenants who built out into the roadway. Larger entry fines compensated for low rents, as in the case of Hampton Poyle leys, rented for 1d a year but with entry fines of £10 in 1614, £15 in 1619, and £18 in 1636. Revenue from the rents of the wool beam (24s), and from the stalls and tolls at the markets and fairs (£.10-12) made up about a fifth of the total. It was the increase in these two sources, from a rise in rents after 1640 and through the reorganization of tolls and stallages from 1636, which brought the annual borough income to c. £,90 in the early 1640s. Receipts from court fines and for sealing deeds were only ever irregular and small, and payments for admissions to freedom did not bring in more than £4 or £5, if that, in a year. Nonetheless, they could be a helpful windfall, for instance in 1619 when eleven freemen were admitted. Until 1616 the corporation also had the money from the Whitsuntide revels.³⁵ As in many other towns, no rate money was collected for the town accounts, and when the constables made their levies and the collectors of the poor gathered in their money they accounted to other bodies. It is salutary to remember that the chamberlains' accounts do not show us all the finances of the community.

Endowments for education, for the poor, and for sermons were in the words of a 19th-century commentator 'blended with those of the corporation'.36 This state of affairs came about in the 16th and early 17th centuries when the town received the various bequests which enabled it to provide and maintain these social services. The most notable charity in the accounts is seen in the various sums for the school from the legacy of Richard Cornwell (d. 1585). He was a London skinner, but he came from Woodstock. His father seems to have been the Robert Cornwell of Woodstock who died in 1545 and left his young son Richard some silver spoons, but his grandfather, William Cornwell (d. 1552), who had been mayor of Woodstock and was an executor of Robert's will, endowed him with a house in Woodstock, which may have helped him on his road to fortune.37 Richard bequeathed £300 for a free grammar school to be established in his home town; £100 was for the schoolhouse and £200 was to buy lands for the school and the schoolmaster. The White Hart and another house in Oxford Street, and land in Hensington were purchased.³⁸ The rental of 1609 shows that the town managed them for the schoolmaster's income and housing. Another part of the bequest seen in the accounts, the Doleman or Dolman annual payment for the schoolmaster, was collected twice a year as an £8 rent charge from Frethorns manor in Childrey, near Wantage (Berks.). It came from the final settlement made in 1599 by John Doleman, who had married Richard Cornwell's widow, Mary. He died in 1607 and it was his son, Thomas (d. 1649), who paid it in these accounts.³⁹ The £50, already noticed as lent out, to Sir Henry Lee and then to the Rayers until 1640, was another part of the settlement, providing part of the schoolmaster's salary. In 1616 a cousin of Cornwell's, Thomas Fletcher, also a London skinner and member of a Woodstock family, left £,4 to the schoolmaster out of his £,12 bequest to the town, money which it was finally agreed in 1623 should be paid by the Skinners' Company of London at their hall.⁴⁰ It does not appear in the accounts until 1642 when the town paid it because it could not be obtained from London, but from 1645 it occurs regularly in the receipts and disbursements. The schoolmaster's salary was covered by the bequests, but the corporation would have had to pay some money from its own funds for the maintenance of the schoolbuildings, which would only partially be met by the 6s 8d quit rent they received from the White Hart. It was much the same situation as in the 19th century when it was felt that not enough return was gained from the property.⁴¹

The town's poor often received bequests in local wills of bread and money which rarely appear in the town accounts, because they were distributed at the funeral,⁴² but there were some long-term gifts. The most

regular appearing in the accounts was from 1629, when the town received $\pounds 5$ for the poor of the almshouse from the town clerk's father, Edmond Hiorne senior, yeoman; the borough undertook to pay 8s a year to the almshouse poor. The later accounts show the receipt and expenditure of the £4 given to the poor at the five sermons which Thomas Fletcher endowed in 1616, as well as the £4 for the preachers. Then there was the charity of dole money given in his life-time by Sir Thomas Spencer (d. 1622) of Yarnton, and eventually paid also by his heirs. Neither of those latter two bequests, however, were distributed through these accounts until the mid 1640s. Two other bequests from men born in Woodstock likewise came into the later accounts: John Chadwell's gift of £20 in 1638, of which £10 was held by the town and the interest used for the poor, appeared in 1639 and 1640; and Henry Hopkins's bequest, made in 1643, of £5 for bread to be distributed every Good Friday.

Loan money to help young tradesmen and artisans was another form of legacy favoured in towns to encourage the industrious. In 1600 Dr. John Case had left £40 to be lent to four tradesmen, and although the loans were not accounted for by the chamberlains he is referred to in 1621. Richard Nash left £100 in 1637 for a Whitsuntide sermon and loans to eight burgesses for six-year terms, but because of the war and the investment terms notice of the loans only came into the receipts in 1648. Capt. Thomas Warburton's £100, bequeathed for three-year loans to burgesses in 1641, likewise appeared in the 1647 account.

After the Reformation townsfolk retained their concern for their own commemoration and for the upkeep of the fabric and services of Woodstock chapel. The town rented the churchyard from the rector of Bladon, and in 1637 expressed due gratitude to Sir Gerard Fleetwood for his lady's gift of a velvet cushion and a pulpit cloth. Money bequeathed to the chapel was, when managed by the mayor and corporation, noted by the chamberlains or at audit. The provision of extra sermons was a typical 17th-century concern shared by Woodstock residents. The first two accounts below detail money spent on sermons endowed by Margery Nurse, widow of a former chamberlain. Longer-term endowments of annual sermons were made by two former mayors, William Meatcalfe in 1608 and Thomas Browne in 1621, as well as by Thomas Fletcher in 1616, and by Richard Nash of Old Woodstock in 1637.

Throughout most of the period charity money was only a minor part of the revenues, but it became more valuable to the town when it was trying to restore the revenues in the late 1640s. The Civil War was disastrous for town finances, though Woodstock seems to have managed better than Banbury,⁴⁵ and kept accounts going throughout the worst years,

1643–6. In 1643, however, the receipts as a whole were down by a quarter and rents were in arrears. In 1644 only a third of the revenues received in the pre-war period were collected and many disbursements were not made. This was shown up in 1646 when the fee farm and quit rents for the previous two years were paid and five years' back payment to the recorder, William Lenthall. The town was still chasing rent arrears in the last years of the decade but had restored much of the traditional finance by 1650. In that year the town showed a healthy receipt total of £105, though receipts from stallages and tolls were low and a third of the revenue came from the charity money passing through the accounts.

It is from the way the chamberlains and other officers spent the money that we learn most about the life of Woodstock and the corporation's dealings with local inhabitants, the wider community of the county, and the government of the realm. Like every other town the mayor and officers had to keep affairs running smoothly for themselves and to meet government demands. The upkeep of town property was a prime charge and the sections on town repairs tell us not only about the guild or town hall and the town clerk's office, but also about the little house, which had a bed in it and seems to have served as a town prison, in addition to the cage, which is frequently mentioned. The cucking stool and the stocks were in use and had to be mended. The sergeant had his chains and whipping post. The town paid for cleaning the bays or sluices at the mill, as well as for the upkeep of the roads. Generally the chamberlains dealt directly with the workmen for the particular task, as the long lists of day payments at the standard 17th-century rate of 10d or 12d a day show. For some jobs they had annual contracts, as with the town surveyors, or with Thomas Screevin for the repair of the glass in the civic buildings, or with Edward Longe for care of the clock. Salaries, stipends, gifts and entertainment costs, particularly for wine, took up a high proportion of the income but this was on a par with other towns. They would undoubtedly have defended this expenditure as proper and necessary for the dignity of the town and the defence and maintenance of privileges which helped its economic survival. Payments were made for law suits and to central government officials when the council was defending the town's chartered rights and liberties or pursuing the Spencers for the dole money. Modern historians see the maintenance of social harmony behind the payments for the maypole and in the observance of what has been called the 'Protestant Calendar', with celebrations on November 5, and on the king's accession and at royal births and weddings. 46 There was also the fasting enjoined by both king and parliament in times of distress that became more frequent than rejoicings as the period wore on.

Through the entries we see the many visits which made the town a social centre, among them the arrivals of the king and his household, tax commissioners, justices, recruiting officers, and preachers. In other entries the social conscience of the 17th century as well as its problems is apparent in the money spent on more unwelcome visitors, the vagabond poor and 'travellers'. We read of Bohemian soldiers, of Irish poor gentlefolk, of a blackamoor wench, of a man whose tongue had been cut out by the Turks, and of other genuine and rogue poor. Maimed soldiers frequently passed through and were given money by the borough officers, who also paid to the high constable's fund for them. Money was sent for the maintenance of the Marshalsea, the debtors' prison in London, and for poor prisoners in Oxford castle. The town was tender of its own poor, and names of those in the almshouse become familiar as they are tended in sickness or given shrouds at death. A few bastard children regularly appear, in the care of locals or occasionally in the almshouse. The school was an important responsibility. There is nothing in these accounts about teaching in the school, but there is a great deal of information about the hiring of schoolmasters and the upkeep of the school and the master's house. Through the school the town got not only education for its children but also a useful member of the community in the person of the schoolmaster. Symon James, the master up to 1632, was particularly active. He was admitted a freeman of the borough in 1605, and appointed schoolmaster and made a member of the common council in 1608. He was also the licensed attorney in the borough court, and was witness and overseer of many local wills and inventories. He was a member of the governing circle, not only through his work but also through his family, by which he was related, probably through his wife Elizabeth, 47 to Edmond Hiorne the town clerk. His connexions were typical of that inner circle of borough families whose members featured in positions of authority in these accounts.

Throughout the accounts there is evidence of the pressure of the central government on the provinces. Proclamations,⁴⁸ with the cherished views of the king on tobacco, fasting, alehouses, schemes for wool and the merchant adventurers, for gold and trade and much more, came into the town in James's reign, followed by yet more, and the books of orders and other measures, from Charles I. In the 1630s Laud's influence with the king stopped the town's combination lectures. There were numerous demands for money to finance the Stuarts' wars and projects, bringing collectors down to the town and creating correspondence with the Privy Council. There were payments for parliamentary elections. Eventually the town was dragged into the Civil War as a royal garrison,

with devastating consequences for its economy and well-being. The accounts then become testimony to the determined effort to keep Woodstock functioning amid its traumas: the problems of collecting the income and paying stipends and dues, the attacks by contending forces, the presence of hundreds of soldiers, the care of the sick and wounded, the adjustment to parliamentary rule and taxation. The final impression is of the council's success in managing its affairs so that by 1650 it was clear that the borough and its finances would survive the crisis.

EDITORIAL NOTE

Punctuation and capitalization have been modernized, as has the orthography of the letters c and t, i and j, u and v, which have also been given their modern placings. Side headings have been transferred to the body of the text, and other material in the margins has been indicated as [marginated] in the accounts. Sums have been tabulated on the right-hand side, a practice that sometimes occurs in the original and that makes for easier reading. Ease of use has also determined the employment of bold-face type for headings and of italic for sub-headings.

The text contains all entries found in the manuscript, but the words 'item', 'received', and 'paid' are omitted where they can be inferred from the context. The year, which is often found in entries, has also been omitted except where there is a risk of ambiguity.

Some entries have been abbreviated. The headings, after the first one, have been shortened to the date of the account and the names of the chamberlains. Since the mayor's name is given only occasionally in the heading it has been omitted here but can be found in the appendix of office-holders. The recurring payments for stipends are also shortened, but they are given in full at the first occurrence or when there is any alteration. Dates have been abbreviated.

Latin days and months have been translated into English, as occasionally happens in the original. Modern spelling is used to distinguish them from those in which the clerk used contemporary spelling. Latin words such as *vidue* for 'widdowe', as used in the English rendering in the accounts, have also been translated.

Common abbreviations and personal names have been extended, except in the appendices. The extension of some commonly used words in the accounts proved more difficult, as in the case of the sum total at the end of each account, which might be 'summa totalis', 'summe totale', or, as adopted here, 'summ totall'. The abbreviation 'pd' has been given the common extension 'paied'. li has been altered to \pounds or lb throughout. The contemporary usage of 'Oxon' for Oxford has been retained.

The first rental in the book (ff. 19r–23v) was heavily altered and is not easy to present in transcript. The information has therefore been abstracted and laid out in tabular form so as to show the sequence of tenants.

The usual editorial conventions such as square brackets for editorial insertions have been observed.

APPENDIX 2

Biographies

These are notes on local men connected with Woodstock council during the period of the accounts. For national figures such as the high stewards, recorders, and tenants of the royal park see biographical dictionaries such as the *Dictionary of National Biography*; for preachers see identifications in the index below, and see also *Alumni Oxonienses* 1500–1714, ed. J. Forster (Oxf. 1888–92).

Unless otherwise stated, the information has been taken from the following sources: death (d.), inventory (inv.), son (s.), wife (w.) from probate (prob.) records in the Oxfordshire Archives or in the Public Record Office (P.C.C.); burial (bur.) from Woodstock or Wootton parish register transcripts by Brig. G. Goadby; details of aldermen (ald.), junior and senior chamberlains (jun., sen., chamb.) and mayors, from Woodstock Borough Mun. B 79, B 81; sergeants (serg.), constables (con.), tithingmen, victuallers (vctl.), and innkeepers (innk.) from B 78/1, 2, 3 (court books), B 79; admission to freedom (adm.) from B 79, B 81; membership of the common council from B 96; churchwardens (chw.) from the Woodstock churchwardens' accounts in Oxfordshire Archives. The Justices of the Peace for Woodstock (J.P.) are taken from the sessions in B 78/2, and from the 1621 and 1625 commissions as detailed in the footnotes to these accounts; note that the mayor was a J.P. by virtue of his office.

Gregory, Fras. Nash: bur. 3 Jan. 1654/5 (Wootton reg.); gent. of Hordley and Old Woodstock; relative of Jerome Nash; adm. 1613; attorney in Woodstock courts; J.P. 1621.

Longe (Long), Edw.: d. before Mich. 1635; lastmaker; adm. 1608; made crier of court and clerk of church for life in Sept. 1608; taster 1611; tollman by 1609 to death.

Love, alias **Edginge** (chw. accts.), **Bart.:** bur. 12 Mar. 1654/5; brother of Thos. Love, woolman; adm. 1635; chw. 1625–6; jun. chamb. 1639–43; sen. chamb. 1643–5; ald. 1646; mayor 1646.

Lucas, Raphe: d. c. 1654 (when new scavenger appointed: see B 83); same or namesake confessed theft as servant of Rob. Bignill, baker, on 8 April 1612 in B 78/2; town scavenger and beadle of the poor 1632– c. 1654.

Mayott (Mates), Nic.: bur. 26 Jan. 1659/60; haberdasher; adm. 1627; chw. 1631–2; con. 1636; jun. chamb. 1638–9; sen. chamb. 1639–43; ald. 1645; mayor 1644–5, 1649–50, 1654–5.

Meade (Meades), Ric.: d. by Sept. 1620; w. Joan; yeoman 1620 but innk. 1608 and held the Geo. Inn 1609; jun. chamb. 1608–10; inv. £96 17s 4d.

Meatcalfe, Thos.: d. 6 May 1629 (B 79); s. of Wm. (d.1608); gent.; woollendraper; con. 1609; jun. chamb. 1610–12; ald. 1621; mayor 1628 to 6 May 1629; inv. £165 16s 8s.

Meatcalfe, alias **Abraham, Abram, Wm.:** d. 22 Jan. 1607/8 (B 78/2); draper, with shopbooks in Bicester and Woodstock in will; chamb. 1589–90; ald. 1591; mayor 1595–7, 1602–4, 1606–8; left £5 for sermon in Woodstock, 40s for new bell and £3 towards a water conduit for the town. The family was also called Abraham or Abram, perhaps after Abraham Metcalfe who was mayor in 1563: see B 81, f. 5r.

Meatcalfe, Wm.: d. c. 1644; will proved 12 July 1648 (P.C.C.); son of Wm. (d. 1608); w. Margaret in probate; woollendraper; adm. 1607; con. 1609, 1610, 1611; chw. 1614–15; jun. chamb. 1614–15; sen. chamb. 1615–19; ald. 1619–43; J.P. 1621; mayor 1624–6, 1634–6.

Meatcalfe, Wm.: overseer of the poor 1662–3; sen. chamb. 1663–9; perhaps the nonconformist of 1672 and 1678, which would account for his not appearing as an office-holder later. See also *V.C.H.Oxon*. xii. 381, 415.

Nash (Nasshe), Jerome: d. by 2 Oct. 1623 (inv.); of Old Woodstock; gent., M.A. 1581; B.C.L. 1588; Fellow of St. John's Coll., Oxf.; inv. £354 11s 9d.

Nash (Nasshe), Ric.: d. 1637; of Old Woodstock; gent.; brother and heir of Jerome; left Woodstock £20 for an annual sermon and £80 loan for poor tradesmen and inhabitants.

Newman, Wm.: schoolmaster 1632-7.

Nickolls (Nicholls), Jas.: d. by 22 May 1641 (inv.); baker; w. Eliz. d. 1648; adm. 1622; con. 1628; chw. 1631–2; jun. chamb. 1636–8; inv. £149 17s 4d.

Noble, Ant.: d. 1617; clerk; curate by 1577 (MS. Wills Oxon. 185, f. 57v); poss. schoolmaster; w. Ursula, sister of Wm. Meatcalfe (d. 1608), d. by Feb. 1636/7 (prob.). See also *V.C.H. Oxon.* xii. 408, 416.
