Hopton, euer since Tuesday was sennight, by the Gouernour of Readings Order, all w^{ch}. time your Regiment hath vndergone extreme hard duty, for wee were forced to march night and day till we came to this place, where wee are quartered so neere the enemy, that

wee are in continuall feare of being beaten vp, wch. on Tuesday night last they attempted, but it was our good ffortune to be in such a readines to receive them, that after beating in our sentryes they retreated. wee haue had euery day and night since wee came hither, eight men and horse commanded out of euery Troope, to passe vpon duty at my Ld. Hoptons Quarters, and wth. the rest of your Regiment wee are on horsebacke most part of the night, for the defence of our Quarter, I find both men and horse so extreamely wearyed wth. this hard duty these longe & ffrosty nights that if there bee not some speedy course taken that our horses may have some rest, a great part of your Regiment will be scattered and lost, for this last night (vpon intelligence that the enemy was mouing) I draw all the Regiment forth, & found many of your Troopes much lessened since they came hither, their Officers alledging that their horses are so lame and tyred out, that they are able to march no longer, besides I haue a great want of Officers, I have not seene a Captaine of the Regiment but one, since wee begun this march, many Lts. and Cornetts also absent, I beseech your Ld.ship not to be jealious that I write this because I am weary myselfe of this duty for (I take God to witnes) my first intention of taking armes was to doe his Matie. all the faithfull seruice, in my power, wth. a constant resolue neuer to be wearyed in venturing life and ffortune to pforme it; but I thought good to give yu. this timely notice, lest hereafter yu. should blame mee for want of care of your Regiment when it is past time. Mr. Robin is to send, theis shipps may bring it, if they can stay a little tyme at the Haure, but la ruiere saith the captains be impatient by reason their victuals be almost spent. Concerning the fieldpieces, all that can be possibly don, shalbe don but that will require som tyme for they must be bought and vnless the grand prieur preuale wth the grand maistre38 for them, they cannot goe wth their shipps, for wth noe endevuour is a wanting. I wish wth all my hart that mr Montagu39 had not stirred from hence where his power was much wth this Queen and Cardinal, but whether it wilbe the same at his returne I know not. here it is said that the Ambr. is coming back wthout effecting what hee went for. they saye here that the Kings ennemies be strong, and wilbe assisted by the scotts, weh make them here verie nyce in shewing the good affections they say they have to his Matie: but I pray god make his matie. able to doe his owne busines wthout them, for I feare things will not goe soe currantly on as they began.

I received yor lord^{sps}. letter by this bearer on the 28th of december according to this style and as I writt to yor lordsp. the last of that month, I went presently to my lord Ambr. to vnderstand if his lordsp. had given his Matie. aduertisement of those 600 barrells of powder to be redy at Haure de Grace but not fynding that his lordsp. neyther mr Crofts knew anie thing therof; I went to the Comte de Brienne to know if anie order had been giuen, or were to be giuen from hence concerning the same. I found him altogeather ignorant, and soe could not imagin vpon what ground that aduertisement had been given vnless vpon a mistake that one monsieur Robin a marchant had about that quantitie at Haure to be transported to Weymouth to be sold there, soe as I purposed to have made tryall here to have gotten som least this bearer should returne emptiehanded: but my lord Ambr. thought it not fitting considering his lord^{sp}. was resolued to lett them know here, that his Ma^{tie}. would not demand anie thing of them, whervpon I did forbeare his lordsp. sayeing hee would endevuour by other meanes to gett som sent; and mr Crofts sayeing that 200 barrells were lately gon from Rouen to Weymouth in a barque a seruant of his did pass in. since w^{ch} tyme Sr Willm Beecher⁴¹ haueing notice of the ships lyeing at Haure sent hither for pacquets for powder and Armes to be sent ouer in them, wch he obteyned and this bearer carrieth them wth him, wth letters from my lord Ambr.: and I hope hee shall not returne wth out good provisions though not in the manner as was expected. countrie, to come in and take up armes, their came in some 500 extreame willing men and many of them armed, whoe are returned to their seuerall homes with a faithfull promisse to bee heere to morrow and make themselues up 1000 men, whith all the armes thay can guet, those that have none, wee are very confident wee shall have armes for them from Winchester heere to morrow or next day at the farthest, soe that I hope wee shall bee 1000 foot stronguer by tomorrow or next night which is the onely want we have, wee have not yet had any returne of our messenger to the castle, from which wee must ground our resolutions what to doe next, but expect it howerly, yesterday wee tooke in a very stronge house called Warblinton⁵¹, it lyes just betweene Chichester and Portchmouth, it commands a prety port for barkes of 50 tunne, I hope it may prooue of very good aduantage to vs, I am sure it will bee very vsefull to vs in order to this present expedition, in it their was 60 soldier and 100 good muskets My lord, Captain Herne beeing employed by your regiment to desire mee that hee mought bee sent from them to you to represent something to you[r] loshp concerning the good of your regimet I have given him leave to waite vpon you, I know I shall not neede to desire your loshp to send him speedily backe to his command, you have to mutch affection to the Kings service not to doe it, a slight president will inuite many of our caualiers to desire to bee at their ease and pleasure at Oxford, concerning Farnham I shall give your loshp an account of that in my next when I have once againe represented it to my lord Hopton.

I knowe not how to express a grattitude large enough for those fauors I daily receaue from your Ld^{sp} if Prince Robert doe any thinge for mee, I must thanke your Ld^{sp}: for it, and the like for what my L^d: Jermin doth in that kinde, my sutte in the Prince his hands is only yet granted as a wardship vnto Mst Treuanion, ⁵⁴ vnto whome his Ma^{tie} gaue the Viceadmeralty soe lately; if I might haue it, the wardship should not prejudice mee very much; but my L^d, the Kinge will giue noe forfeited estates now, if the Prince had done it in tyme, his fauor had made mee happie:

The Excise heere only expects a command, and direction from aboue, and wee shall sone dispatch it;

I cannot but complaine vnto your Ldsp that the Kinge expects greate things from hence, and yet will not give me creditt to obledge one man in the county, I have bestowed the Master of the Rowles his feathers amongst them, and that serues yett, but if his Matie would have obledged the industreous Sheriffe vppon my recommendation, it would have much inable mee to serue him; for my L^d: Mohun,⁵⁵ that tooke all the Kings promises for words, putt on the Sheriffe to trye my power, and his Ma^{tys}: intentions to them all by the Sheriffs success. It hapned that the Kinges first deniall found the Sheriffe and mee at my Ld: Mohuns house, where vppon my cold account of his owne hopes his Ldsp: thought fitt to laugh at the Sheriffe, and to shewe such contempt to mee, and his Maties: promised fauors to such as should merritt from him in this county; as begatt a breache with mee, such as shall neuer more bringe me vnder his rooffe. Your Ldsp: maye judge by his letter about the excise, what vse might have beene made of him, if a little incoradged; but I finde that my aduises are of no vallewe with his Matie: which will in tyme lessen my credditt heere. The Kinge hath lost above a hundred thousand pound this Christmas for want of 9: or: 10: whole culuerin at the Mounts Baye: and the like maye happen againe the next storme. My L^d Digby hath a particular relation of this, which I cannot send your Ldsp: because I haue but my owne penn; and I am quite tyred by the daily vse of it for all occasions heere. Ashbornham 500 musketts & 20 barrells of powder written by Mr Mason & subscribed with your owne hand and dated the 8th of Decemb which 1000 musketts & 40 barrells of powder I have delivered according to yor honors warrant which I have heer by me and att meeting I shall pduce them: My Lord, mistake me nott, so long as I am vnder yor honors command, ther shall no man thatt is vnder yor command be more carefull to obey yor commissions and warrantts then I shall: vor honor hath written thatt I shall send away the Armes for Bristoll: ther is as greatt danger going to Sheirborne which is the way to Bristoll beeing 18 miles from hence as to Blandford which is likewise 18 miles & Oxford way: & beeing once past Blandford the passage is cleere & free: butt you may be pleased to know thatt we want sufficient convoy and likewise carts: for ther was warned to be heer 45 carts yesternight butt ther did nott appear aboue 14 or 15: & in respect of the distraction of the gentry of this country, the King is deceived: the Gentleman Coll. Collonell Ashburneham was gon to Bristoll for his men. when I received yors of the 11th to mee of yr mistake of ye 500 musketts, when hee came hither acquainted him wth it, hee told me for that particular I were best looke on my warrants, and further added hee would never spend a graine of powder, or use a muskett, but in the Kings service (So wthout any particular offence in it to my Lord Percy) if hee haue a pressing occasion vpon the place for it no mans authority, seale or warrant vnder heaven should forbid his taking for the Kings service any thing that was in his power to comand, whither it bee the Kings, ye subjects, or straungers goods. These were his words we'h hee bid mee write to yor honnor (verbatim) as hee spoke them, & likewise well you may send what directions you please to the contrary, but I see hee only hath ye comand of the force heere, & will obay in what hee pleaseth, and I beleive you will heare others from hence say as much, only hee concluded with kindnesse to yor honnor who hee said hee knew would find so much reason in it, you would not dislike it, & therefore bid mee bee satisfyed. My Lord I remit this to yor honnors consideration: I writ formerly that ye Governors heere in the west were all Like kings in their owne parts where they governe. The souldiers came to Dorset ye 16th of this instant at night. Collonell Ashburneham hath taken order wth the Governor of Bristoll to send 40, or 50 carts from Bristoll heere to carry away the armes, & amunition hence to Bristoll, I would to god it were free off of my hands for the staying of it for want of convoy, and carryages doth vex mee to the heart that I cannot sleepe a sound sleepe, & I cannot carry it upon my back, therefore let not the Queene, nor any thinke it is my fault. Captaine Slingsby⁶² came hither yesterday morning, and I am very glad that such a man is sent for I am taking an order wth him that wee may haue good correspondence of letters, and all other business whereby wee may haue a good dispatch weh wilbee a good way to give yor honnor a good accompt from time to time. Collonell Ashburneham is taking order for buying the 2500ll of match, and 27 barrells of powder wth 2 chests of pistolls. My Lord I wonder yt wee heare of noe order yt is taking wth the powder, match, and brimstone yt came with Mr Crafts man. This northerley wind is the cause of yt Capt: Lewer, & Capt: Tresaer are not come over yet wth ye powder. To morrow goeth to sea ye resolute Batt a dainty vessell of six guns a side wch was a prize heere belonging to the King, and Col: Ashburneham did giue mee monies to set her out a freebooting wth another vessell called Viseadmirall Pap⁶³, but good Lord what amazem^t the sailers were in when they heard Col: Ashburneham name them that they refused to saile in shippes of yt had such vnknowen names yt were never heard of before, but I told them that were the names of two famous persons, that had such good successe in all their adventures both by sea, and land, yt I hoped in god these shippes would thriue the better in their purchase, for that they Admirall was named the Resolute Batt and the vise-admirall the Pap, whereat being partly satisfyed wth my words, and thereafter fully with some monies wch Coll Ashburneham gave them to drinke the health of the Resolute Batt, and then of Pap that they dranke their heads out of Lith (that day) and swore yt they would proue resolute, and adventurous against all rebells, and so I beseech god to blesse them to perform their promise. I pray god to send them good prizes, I doubt not god willing but the admirall will catch prizes if shee bee as fortunate as her godmother to whome I pray remember my blessing, & hoping likewise the vise-admirall wilbee a sharer in taking of these prizes to whose god-mother remember my service, and to all the rest of my noble friends I rest

The 25th of this moneth I proued 200 musketts (all of them held ye prooffe) and brought into his Mats stores this daye. There wilbee readye to proue wthin one weeke 200 more. Wth will amount to the sume of 180li. Likewise received into the stores 200 Bandeleeres, and 200 more will bee readye the latter end of this weeke, wch will come in money to 30. Soe there will bee necessarye to pay both for the musketts, & Bandeleeres 310^{li}. This day I am promised 200^{li} by M^r Jones deputye. I humbly desire yor Lop to bee earnest wth my Lord Threr for a pfect setled course for weekelye payments, w^{ch} otherwise my creditt, and the King's s^rvice will infinitely suffer.

Accordinge to yo^r Lo^{ps} comaund (wth the first oportunitye) I shall send to Cap^{en}. Straherne, whereby yo^r Lo^p may have an accompte from him of what armes, & municōn came to Dartmouth, and other ports in y^e West. I have sent yo^r Lo^p here inclosed Proposicōns of Tobias Atkins of Wells gent under his hand, for the makeinge of Powder (a man formerlye ymployed in his Ma^{ts} service for the makeinge of Peter. I have treated wth another here, w^{ch} if there bee readye money, will make 6, or 8 barrells weekelye, hee hath alreadye 20 barrells, w^{ch} hee made for the Geouerno^r, and cann neither gett money for them, nor any, for his arreare due to him as he informeth mee hee holdeth his powder at y^e rate of 5^{li}. a barrell, but I hope vpō ready money, and constant

payment, to bringe him to 4^{li}. 10^s. a barrell. I have treated likewise for the makeinge of droumbes at 23^s. a peece compleately furnished, wth spare heads, & snares to ech droumbe, therefore I desire to knowe what quantitye shall bee made, and money for the payment of them.

Sr ffrancis Hawley told mee, that hee receiued a letter from Mr Secretarye Nicholas, that hee much wondred, that the 5 weynes w^{ch} went from hence to Oxōn wth municōn were not payd by yo^r Lo^p at Oxford, or by mee here (w^{ch} I conceaue not proper) but to bee payd out of the weekelye contribucōn, w^{ch} hath formelye bine payd, and allowed by warrant from y^e Lo: Hopton at the rate of 6^d. a mile for ech weyne, or cart.

I formerly acquainted yor Lop, that Sr ffrancis Hawley is sendinge to Weymouth for Powder (hauinge the King's warrt for the doeinge thereof) I shall desire yor Lop, that, what Powder cometh hither may bee assigned to mee, soe as there may noe yssues bee made wth out yor Lops order. I am informed likewise by Sr ffra: Hawley that there is an expresse warrt from Prince Rupert, that noe armes or municōn whatsoever bee yssued, & disposed from hence, but either by his Matie, or his Highn's. warrant wch I conceaue may in some wise entrenche vpōn yor Lops power, if you give way vnto it, hauinge formerlye his Maties warrant dated 28. October. 1643. That all Geouernors of all and singuler of his Matis garrisons, townes, and castles in the Westerne ptes, and everye of them, from time to time vpō notice giuen by the Generall of the Artillerye, doe make yssues of such cannon, armes and municōn to such psons, and for such vses as hee shall direct, or appoint, to wch they are to giue full and due obedience by all whom it may concerne. Wch warrt I haue thought good to put yor Lop in minde of.69

I haue likewise treated w^{th} a ploumber here, whoe will undertake the makeinge of one tonne of muskett shott weekelye after the rate of $16^{\tilde{l}i}$. p tonne, vpōn weekelye payments. All w^{ch} the p^rmisses I leaue to yo^r Lo^{ps} serious consideracōn, and rest.

My Lord

I have received yor lord^{sps} letter by this bearer, but I know not whether yor lordsp haue received these I formerly writt vnto you, by one of wch of the last of December in few words I saide much and that weh I feare you lordsp will fynd [illegible] the feare of what may have become of these letters I have formerly written, haith restrayned me from performing that duetie vnto yor lord p wch I ow you, but when ther shalbe saifer meanes of sending, as by Weymouth (if that settles all, to wch. I fynd no great inclination here) I shall then rather importune yor lordsp. then be slow in wrighting; but I feare wee shall fynd euen som obstacle in that benefit wee might haue by that passage; I cannot say vpon what ground things stand but a great person told me lately, vota volunt, sed fata negant. Mr Crafts I doubt not haith certefyed how little hee haith been beholding to the grand maistre who after hee had given him hopes of a faire answer concerning the two bastards of 12ll bullet, did slipp away into Brittanie and since that tyme no answer can be gotten from him, and wthout his order, ther can be nothing had in that kynd. Yet I am put in hope I may recouer a couple by an other way wch I will attempt.

Theise affaires here have not passed wthout som difficulties wch they wisely labour to overcom by giveing content to preuent, rather then to strugle wth riseing difficulties, and yet when they have the advantage make it apparent as though they had never feared. The three deputies who came wth the submission from the nobilitie of prictrie, were advised to goe to the Bastille and offer themselves prisoners to the governer, which they did and were two dayes before they were received to grace. But they have used those of the Religion a little harshly: certaine deputies who came wth complaints from those of the Religion in Languedoque were presently comanded to leave Paris, wth they were forced to doe: and wheras by the Edict of Nants they ought to have an Assemblie graunted to them wth was comonly held in som convenient place nere the hart of the kingdom, and at a tyme of the yeare comodious for all persons and parts thereof: they have wth much labour gotten it appointed at Sharenton, and on the last day of December by wth yoth Lordspiece what favor they doe those of the Religion.

The Spaniards have monie and will not make peace at soe easie a rate as hee was willing to haue don. They here will endeauour to make the Prince of Orange declare against the Emperor if it be possible, and send Mons^r de Bellingham⁷⁴ vnto him for that purpose under other pretences, hee haueing great power wth that prince. The peace in Italye was belieued here to be made Cardinal Biely authorised by the Pope and this crowne signed it, and the Articles were sent hither to Cardinal Mazarin, whoe reported it concluded and ratified. But I am told by a very good hand that the Pope haith not yet signed the ratification w^{ch} if hee doe not, the French in Italie will not be loose to serue elswhere as was intended.⁷⁵ This is all occurreth to me now, I send yo^r lord^{sp} this paper to serue vpon occasions herafter, and I will not fale as I may fynd opportunitie to give yo^r lord^{sp} and accompt wth more freedom of what shall com to the knowledge of

I did receive the Kings warrt to exempt, and free the Gonnesmyths from watchinge, and wardinge. ffor the Lord Byrons powder assigned to him, I haue likewise giuen my Lord, and you a pticuler retourne, and the reasons why it was not supplyed from hence. Concerninge the 100li received, whereof I have given my acquittance, is noe pte of ye Estimate for ye Musketts, Bandeleeres &c but for the fixeinge, and repinge of Musketts formerly layd out, and other incident Charges. I haue received from Mr Jones deputyes the last weeke 230li. wch cometh short by 80li. if the Gonnemakers, & Bandeleeremakers had brought in theire weekely pporcon, wch was ordered by the Geouernor to bee taken from them for Collonell Veale, being designed for Barkley &c. I have formerly sent vnto you for the makeinge of droumbes at 23s: a peece compleatelye furnished wth spare heads, & snares, and therefore did, and doe desire to knowe what number shall bee puided, and money to pay for them, it beinge noe pte of the Estimate. Concerninge the ordennce weh came from Ireland I have both sent to my Lord, and yor selfe a pticuler weh I hope is come to yor hands. I writte to my Lord alsoe and therewth certaine pposicons for the makeinge of 15 barrells of Powder weekely I desire you to moue my Lord for an answere and his resoluçon. I have as yet received noe generall warrt for imbezeled and concealed armes & Municon, wch I desire you to give a speedye dispatch vnto. Concerninge the 1100 Musketts to bee reserved for Prince Rupert. There hath bine deliuered by a former warr^t from hence to his Regiment 700 Musketts, and Bandeleeres, and haue nowe received a warrt from my Lord for 500 newe Musketts wth Bandeleeres weh shall bee brought into his Mats Stores to bee deliuered to Sr ffrancis Hawley, whereof I have yssued in pte 50. As yet there is noe Armes or Municon come from Capen Straherne, this day I have written vnto him, to giue my Lord an Accompte, what Armes or Municon haue bine lately brought into Dartmouth, & other Portes in ye West. Concerninge Pikes there are none to bee had here I much wonder there are not sufficient Store prouided at Readinge, & from those ptes, from whence wee were supplyed the last yeere. I have likewise formerly acquainted my Lord, that one tonne of Muskett Shott may bee here Cast weekely at 16li. p tonne, pray lett mee knowe whether the

worke may goe on, and of what gages they shall bee of (for leade growes very deare) Before my iourney into the West I desire the busines concerninge ye Gonnemakers, Bandeleeremakers, Powdermaker &c may bee setled, as that my absence may bee noe hinderance in p formance of ye seu'all vndertakeings. I am sorrye there is noe more but 1000li payd for ye Trayne of Artillerye at Oxōn, for ye yeere cometh on a pace, and time will be pretious, for provideinge ye sevall pticulers incident to ye said Trayne. I shall entreate you to remember mee to Mr Sherburne, Mr Wynn, and the rest of my friends, & send mee word howe ye wine was liked of, we'h I sent vnto my Lord.

This Last night came into this roade the two shippes that was sent to Haure de Grace; yor honnor hath faild of yor expectation of soe great quantities of powder, the most part of this Amunition belongeth to merchants, and now wee must striue to driue another trade, vizt: to haue Cloth, wooll, and all other Sorts of Commodities ready heere, or the monies to pay them wth an exact accompt taken both of goods Sold, and bought, and Likewise a free Lisence of transporting of all Sorts of Comodities, I meane for Such quanteties of armes as they bring in that there bee a stock of 4, or 5000 pounds Led aside, and to buy vp the wooles, hides, and fallow, & such Sorts of Comodities as are on free; the King may have these goods sould at very good rates wch will make the amunition to come in heere from fforraine places, wee shall have them at an easier rate then wee can bring them our selfes; if the King doe not buy these Comodities, and pay them present, there is very few marchants that will venter to buy them, for it is spoken to my selfe by diverse marchants when I doe inquire of them why they doe not buy two, or three hundred barrells of powder, and Lay them up in their Sellers and sell it out, they have answered mee, that if the King, or any other governor had to doe wth powder that then they would take it when they pleased, and pay them when they pleased weh is impossible to mainetaine their trade wthout prsent paymt: My Lord it is true I had order for 400 pounds, and I have received but 325 pounds in respect the collectors of Waymouth cannot get in the rest of the 500 pound of Contribution yt was pmised to the King, and I have payed already 263 pound besides since the 15th: of December that it hath cost mee, and my Servaunts, and other petty Charges. I cannot live on the wind, I have but Little monies considering the paying of 4 moneths, and halfe to 130 mens wages of the two shippes wch will amount to 585 pounds, besides heere I send yor honnor a coppy of my Lord Gorings⁷⁸ Letter to consider on, I should have sent his owne Letter, but

because hee hath written to mee to pay 2000 Livers turnoys weh wilbee about 150 pound sterling for revictualling ye two shipps at Havre de Grace, for another moneth I have taken vpon mee to the marchant to pay it, & hee hath taken my word, and therefore I have kept the principall for my warrant, I beseech yor honnor to show the Queene yt I have noe more remaining, but my Credit, and honest word, & I shall never bee wanting to ingage both Life, and Credit, & all for her Matie: I would to god from my heart that it did Ly in my power to advance 500000li prsent monies. By god her Matie: should haue it, (but ad propo) I beseech yor honnor, and Likewise my Lord Jerman that yor honnors will both speake to the Queene that I may bee furnished wth monies to pay my Lord Gorings bill, that I have accepted for if I breake my Lord Goring must breake, and so farewell Coopmen, & Likewise 580 pound of monies to pay the Sailers wages, or else I shall have a miserable Life amongst them, for the marchants amunitio that is come over in these two shippes Capt. Lewer, & Capt. Tresaer they may sell their amunition very cheape to the King having custome, and fraight free, otherwise I thinke they must pay fraight for it. yor honnor would bee pleased to aske ye King what his Maties: will is therein, and if wee can have the goods for 8 of the 100 the true bill of ffactorage being produced it were well, and so take fraight in or owne hands, for it is true they might have had a shippe to carry all these goods for 50 pound fraight, but not so secure, I have not written what amunition is in the two shippes, because I have reserved that to Mons^r: de Rivier a dilligent young man to informe yo^r honnor of it; My Lord I send yor honnor a note of what powder, and armes I delivered for on Saterday last, I sent 104 barrells of powder and 200 musketts to Bristoll to Cap^t. March, I pray yo^r honno^r to cause to take order wth carriages otherwise all our travaile is but in vaine, so in haste remember my blessing to ye Queene and my service to my Lord Duke of Richmond, and my Lord Jerman & all my noble friends I Rest

Accordinge to what I have divers times intimated to yor Lop, I fynde nowe, That the Geouernor doth take all Municon into his handes, notwthstandinge yor Lops warrant to Capen. Strachen, comaundinge him to send this Powder, went is nowe come to Bristoll (wth that assigned to mee from Sr George Strode by an expresse from the Lord Threr signifyed by his Secretarye) (the pticuler Accots and Lres I here send by this Bearer) to bee deliuered into my Custodye; And accordingly Capen Strachen did giue instructions to the Conductors for the doeing thereof (wch herewth I likewise send vnto yor Lop) Wch Conductors,

hee supposed were sent from mee, but ymployed by the Geouerno^r (vnknowne to mee) were dispatcht to Weymouth, vpo theire retourne, repaired to the Geouernor, acquainted him, that they had instruccons, wth a lie, from Capen Strachen directed to mee; The Geouernor takeinge both my lie (wch afterwards hee brake vp) and the Conductors instruccons; Vpon notice whereof giuen vnto mee (after hee had taken possession of pte of the Municon) I reped to ye Geouernor, whoe told mee in playne wordes, I should not meddle wth any Municon that cometh hither (wthout a speciall warrt from his Matie, or Prince Rupert) sayeinge likewise hee would comaund, and send for all the Municon from Weymouth (affirmeing hee hath the Kings, and Prince Ruperts warrt) (wch I never sawe) I conceaue those warrts were onelye to send for the Municon hither, and not to take it into his Custodye, in regard there is a great want of Carriages there. I would aduice yor Lop to take it into consideracon, if the Geouernor (contrarye to all former predents of all garrisons, and Magazines in ye kingedome, viz. Barwicke, Newe Castle, Hull, London, Portesmouth, Plymouth, Isle of Wight, Oxon, &c Noe Geouernors have any power to take into theire Charge, & Custodye any Municon out of his Mats Magazines wthout a speciall warrant (being supplyed out of his Mats Stores) and what Municon are assigned vnto them, they are to Indent or give theire Receipts and become accomptable to Th'office of his Mats Ordennce) shall take into his custodye his Mats Municon, & Armes (wch hee hath done alreadye) his Matie vpon any occasion of service, must bee constrayned to write his pticuler Warrants to every Geouernor; wch would much entrenche upō yor Lops power, and destructive, of giuinge any Accots of his Mats Armes and Municon, weh I humbly desire may bee crusht in the first conception. And further if this bee made a prcedent, it were in vayne for mee to take any Survey of the Westerne Garrisons. Therefore I entreate yor Lop I may have an imediate warrant from the Kinge to receiue into my Custodye all Municon, and Armes, wch are latelye brought into Bristoll from Weymouth, or hereafter shall bee brought from thence; or from any other ptes whatsoever to this Cittie, whereby I may give my receipte, and discharge to Capen Strachen, & others, weh otherwise I cannot doe (if I receiue them not) nor his Matie any accompte, if his Mats Armes & municon shall bee disposed of, but to those whom it pply belongeth, & appteyneth.

Vpō receipt of his Ma^{ts} warr^t dated 8th ffebruary 1643, directed to S^r ffrancis Hawley Lieutennte Geouerno^r of Bristoll for redeliuerye of the Armes & Municōn w^{ch} lately came from Weymouth, into my Charge, and Acc^o. I reped vnto him and deliuered the same, at w^{ch} time hee gaue mee noe answere, but willed mee to come vnto him the next morneinge, w^{ch} accordinglye I did, his answere was, that hee would deliuer mee the Powder, w^{ch} came from Weymouth, but reserved 60 barrells for the vse of y^e Garrison, and defence of the Cittie; condicōnallye, that hee would procure yo^r Lo^{ps} warrant for my discharge, or otherwise hee would retourne the same into my custodye.

The 19th of this instant, I received 2 warrants, the one directed to yo^r Lo^p from his Ma^{tie} dated the 3^d. and yo^r Lo^{ps} the 4th of ffebruary for the deliverye to S^r Jn^o. Penington⁹⁰ 20 barrells of Powder, wth good store of Cannon bullett, & other Municon, wth 3 Peeces of Artillerye lyinge before his gate, (viz, demi Cannon of brasse one, culu'inge one, & one wreath'd Saker) to bee forthwth sent to y^e Earle of Carberrye⁹¹; vpon receipte of w^{ch} warrants, not being well myselfe, I sent John Newport to the Geouerno^r wth the said warrants, whoe retourned his answere, that hee could spare noe Peeces, for hee had received Order from Prince Rupert, that the wreath'd Saker should bee sent vnto him, as this daye; before these warrants came to my hands vpon sight of a letter w^{ch} came from Secretarye Nicholas to S^r Jn^o. Penington, I had made readye 20 barrells of powder, 12^C of Match, and 200 of demi Culuinge shott, w^{ch} is this daye shipt for the Earle of Carberry and is fallen downe this tide.

I haue herewth sent yo^r Lo^p a pticuler State of his Ma^{ties} Powder in the Stores nowe here in my Charge and acc^o, wth what is left wth the Geouerno^r, and alsoe (w^{ch} I conceaue) what belongs to S^r George Strode Acc^o. w^{ch} lately came from Weymouth.

I have formerly acquainted yor Lop wth a Contract for ye makeing of 15 barrells p weeke [4li. 10s. p barrell. in margin] wth I desire yor Lop to give mee yor resolution therein.

The Geouerno^r hath spoken to mee for the payment of y^e Carriage of the Municon from Weymouth (w^{ch} I hold) is not proper for yo^r Lo^p to take care in that pticuler in regard the Contribucon of y^e Countrey both in Dorsetshire, & Somersetshire is received by the Geouerno^r here, or Collonell Ashburneham Geou'nor of Dorchester. Wherefore, I shall humbly p^rsent vnto yo^r Lo^p; that yo^u would procure his Ma^{ts} warrant, to bee directed to the Geouerno^r here and alsoe to Colonell Ashburneham, that out of y^e Contribution of either Countye, there may bee satisfaction given, after y^e rate of 6^d a mile for every cart, or weyne, and 6^d a horse, w^{ch} will bringe 2 barrells of Powder at a time.

And for ye Charges of the bringinge of Powder, Match, &c vpōn Sr George Strodes Acco. I have order by the Lord Thrēr to see that satisfyed, out of such monyes as I shall receive here, weh I will carefully pforme, whensoever there shall bee any further assigned to mee.

I haue received yor Lops warrt for the deliverye of 500 Musketts, & Bandeleeres to Sr ffrancis Hawley, hee expectinge to bee supplyed out of the newe Musketts, wch are made here, and hee shewd mee my Lord Digbyes letter to that purpose wch I have thought good to acquainte yor Lop, soe as I may have yor approbation therevnto.

Soe not troublinge yor Lop wth any other busines at this preent, I humbly take my leave, and rest.

Yor Lops humble srvaunt to bee comaunded.

Also tenn Cases Contayning 500 paire of pistolls wth their spanners; Also Seaven ffatts, two cases, and one basket Containing 1500 bandoleers, and 537 Paire Pistoll Cases, and Certaine moulds to Cast bulletts with, Moreover 110 barrells of powder each waighing 1001 Holland waight all marked, and nombred as in margent; All which said Goods God Sending mee to arrive in safety at the said Port of Waymouth, or ffalmouth, doe promise to deliver to the Governour, or Chiefe officer for his Matie: or to his assignes. I received not a Letter, but one dated the 17th: Since the 6th: of this instant of the Carts that are to Come from the Shiriffe of Wiltshire where I shall bee ready god willing to Loade all that is here, except that powder, and armes belonging to Marchants, I spoke to Mr Whitt to Loade his powder, match, and brimstone that hee hath for Sir John Strouds accompt, and order to bee from him Sent to Bristoll to Captaine March, but I heare noe answeare from him, but hee will send it to Bristoll, and God knoweth when hee shall haue occasion of Carryage there, yor honnor writ mee a warrant to deliver 6 barrells of powder, and match proportionable, I delivered 6 barrells of some of the old such as I had, and the rest of ye powder that Came Last over, as for match there is noen in my Custody for God bee thanked wee haue many store keepers, and soe the king may have abundance of armes, and powder for my part I care not albeit there were 20 more store keepers heere; My Lord Treasurer hath sent downe word to the Customer to pay my Lord Gorings bills which doth amount to 2001: sterling wch are payed by Mr Whitt the Customer, and hee hath received the bills; I sent yor honnor a coppy of what armes that are to come over in the Hamburger that wee doe expect heere, and likewise of the Armes that was taken from the Londoners at Dunkirke, I haue written diverse times that I cannot get but 35li: as yet of the 100li: my Lord Treasurer did giue order to mee to receiue of the 500li: of the towne of Waymouths Contribution, I beseech yor honnor to dispatch these Capts: downe of the two shippes, and monies to pay their men, and I shall have more quietnes, I doubt not but yor honnor hath taken order wth the ffrench man for his powder, and musketts, and swords; Mr Naper hath the rest of the Last powder, and pistolls, and Armes is coming vp, hee is a Sure marchaunt, and will deale very warily, I know not what to write as yet till I can heare from yor honnor, for these two weekely poasts I received noe Letter, I beleiue my Letters are miscarryed, not farther to trouble yor honnor, but that there is a Little vessell with wooll taken by a frigate of Si^r Nicholas Crisps, and to desire yo^r honno^r to remember my blessing to the Queene, and to remember her Matie: that this day 12 moneth, and about the very same houre, the Haddock, and his Consorts did so spout their venome from Birlington roade that they made the Capons, and hens flie in the Aire Like pillins of onions, and remember my Service to my Lord Duke of Richmond, and his Dutches my Lord Jerman, and to all the rest of the noble witnesses of this miracle (that day) So I rest

That vpon the 220: of May last his Ma^{tie} by Lett Pa^{ts}: vnder the great seale of England, Constituted y^e Lo^d Percy Generall of the Trayne of Artillery of his Army wth all profetts & priuelledges to the same place belonging in as ample manno^r, as any other formerly inioyed the same

That by vertue thereof his Lo^p receaued into his charge the Magazins and stores, and tooke a perticular accoumpt of such Office^{rs} & Ministers as were belonging to the said trayne, and p^rsentinge the same to his Ma^{tie} and the Gen^{lls} of his Army: itt was conceiued fitt by them that a further addition of Officers should be made, by reason that there were diuers peeces bouth Iron and brass then newly made wherevpon diuers Ingeneeres, a Comptroller & 4 gent of y^e Ordinance, and diuers other office^{rs} were incerted in the old list, and the same ingrossed in partchment and a warrant drawne vp and subscribed by his Ma^{tie} that this new establishment, should be for the future the establishment of the trayne of Artillery.

Soe that itt may be answared for the Lo^d Percy: that the increase of the List, was acted by his Ma^t[ie] wth the consent of his Gene^{ls}:

That the last winter there was 2200^{li} Issued to ye Lt Generall of the Ordinance for the makinge of puisions for the Magazin, & all puisions were brought in before the 22°: of May since weh time [a]ll the Garrisons heare-abouts have benn supplied severall times from this Magazin, much hath benn spent in the seige of Glosister beinge full 4 weeks ye takinge of Bristoll the batle of Newbury wth many other expeditions yett noe supplies came into the Magazin nor money Issued to make any new provisions:

The Clarke of the Ordinance and Keep of the stores [M^r Sherburne M^r March: in margin] are now ready to give an accoumpt: how the timber boards Iron Spades shouells and all other materialls whatsoeu^r and also: Wagons Carts and tumbrells have benn issued since the Lo^d: Percy came in and will give ffull satisfaction how the Cannon Mounted came to be impayred and of all other defects of the said Trayne if the House please them they will attend to Morrow:

ffor the Accompt it is referred to y^e paymaster of the Trayne who receaued it issued all the money: his accompts is received by an Auditor already and wilbe ready to be pduced when itt shalbe required:

There were att ye Kings comminge ffrom Newbury 400 draught Horses and oxen: these are now 260: att home and abroud in seruice the rest haue dyed bene kild & taken by the Enemy as will appeare by the accompt given to the Comittee by the Commissary of the draught horses:

I sent vp all the store of Armes, and amunition that was in my hands except 7 pikes wth an accompt, but now I am certifyed by one of my clarkes that came back that my Lord Hopton caused to take away 52 barrells of the best powder that was sent over from my Lord Mountague, that wch is taken perforce I cannot help it: Now is Mr Naper and Mr Villa nova the french marchant both come down, and we have viewed their powder wch is nothing else but old cannon powder that hath lyen in some magazine these 4, or 5 yeares it will never doe good service tyll it bee refined, and the musketts, there are about 1000 of them, I am assured they are of 3, or 4 score sundry bores, some pistoll bores, some carabine bores, some little fowling peeces, and all the old trash that could bee rapt together; I must say that the pistolls are good, and the swords are reasonable (but to come to the price) shall I eate Queene Maries bread, and see a company of cheating marchants to deceive openly (hang mee, draw mee, quarter mee, or begger mee let it bee what it will I will speake the trueth, I have suffered these 5 yeares for being an honest man, I hope to God never to suffer for being a knaue, but (a propo.) to give them 7li: for 112ll. of powder; 16s: for a musket, 10s: and 6s 8d: for the best swords, and bad swords, 30s: for a dozen of bandoleers weh hath one charge as big againe as another, and give them custome free, fraight free, and all the courtesy that can bee done (it would anger a Sow, and a sword about her) yet if it were good Armes, and powder it were nothing; I belieue the Queene knoweth the barrell of powder to bee worth 44 gilders, muskets, and bandoleers 7 gilders, comon pistolls 16: or 17 gilders, and for this a man shall have good stuffe for it, give them 20 in the hundred for the marchants adventure, fraught [sic], & custome I am certaine of it, if there bee but reddy monies to buy them vp presently so soone as they come in, that wee shall have marchants to court us (as if wee were ladies) to buy vp their Armes from them cheaper than 2s: for the gilder, & 21, or 22 pence for their floren, If marchants see that they may be payed in monies, or goods wee shall have them come (ding dong) it is not now, as it was a yeare, or two since the roade is broken, & every marchant will follow on the roade way; had I had order, and knowen where to haue had monies, to haue payed for these Armes, and Amunition at the first, I could have had them for 15 of the hundred profit (monies for monies) I do not meane 2s: sterling for their floren, or liver, and given mee thanks; Heere is made every weeke 8, or 900 of very good match, and cost noe more but 25s: the hundred for towe, and workemanshippe, and all, and allow 5s: for carriage to Oxford it will stand but 30s: the hundred free

Lewer for all my good Service towards King Charles, and my courtesy to Capt. Lewer for when they came downe heere to Waymouth from Oxon they did bring no Letter from yor honnor, nor any Lord else, now would scarse acknowledge mee, but there was a warrant to Mr Witt collector of the Custome, Mr Ellis Viseadmirall, and Mr Gape to examine my accompts for victualling of the two ships, weh I very willingly did pduce my accompts before them, & willed them to aske of every pticular weh if they could have picked a hole in my coate they would have done it, but wth gods helpe they, nor any man else shall proue that I am a cheater of King Charles, I pray god my examiners doe proue themselves as honest as I haue beene to his Matie: after my accompts was examined, & they could not find any thing to challenge mee in that; I demanded them who should pay mee 40li: I did disburse in accompt of the companies wages before the ships went to Haure de Grace, they told mee that they knew not well; besides I did aske the Capts. to pay mee 351i: I did Lend them in accompt of the two ships for the reliefe of their necessity since they came Last over, they told mee, that I should have it the first monies, wth this I was very well contented, I went to Mr Witt the Collector of the Custome, and told him that I had no monies but yt belonged to King Charles, and desired him that hee would stop 35li: due to mee of that 300li: hee had order to pay the Capts: wth. hee gaue mee a faire answere at first, but at Last hee told mee hee would not stop it, but had given order to Mr Churchey a marchant of this towne to pay the Capts: the monies a coppy of wch warrant I send up heere inclosed; I went, and got out a warrant from the Maior for the stopping of 3511: in the hands of Mr Churchey, who was willing to stop it for my use, but Mr Witt ye customer came, and told him that hee must pay the some, and Capt: Lewer should give him a receit for it; The Sarieant willing to have the monies, that neither Mr Witt, nor Capt. Lewer would, but Capt. Lewer renders his owne person wthout my knowledge to bee prisoner, and Mr Witt became his baile wch if Mr Witt would have passed his word to mee before, that hee would see it payed, I had never sought to laie any arrest on the monies, as for his person it was neither my desire, nor will, but such servants to ye King is ready to breed more mischeife, for after this Lewer goeth, and pduceth a Letter of my hand wch was sent over to Haure de Grace to him wch I did it ypon the returne of a letter I had from Capt. Lewer weh Letter I sent the qth: of January to yor honnor, the contents of Capt: Lewers Letter if yor honnor bee remembred was that ye Sailers was in muteny, and wthout there was ready monies at their arrivall in the roade they would not come in, I having Sundry Letters from yor honnor that there was order taken for the payment of ve Sailers I tooke the occasion to write over to these Capts: fearing mutiny, and that the Kings Service should suffer, and writ them that I had order, and monies to pay them by that time they should come to the roade, Capt. Lewer having this letter goeth to Mr Gape the Towne Clarke, and thereafter to the Maior, and getts a warrant out to arrest my person that I should pay ye Sailers their wages w^{ch} truely was done this day about 10 of the Clock, the Sarieant arrested mee on the bridge in [? sight] of a great many townes-men, and so went to my chall where god willing heere in this towne shall I never remaine Longer wthout my honest name bee repaired I thanke god I was never in my Liffe time arrested bu[t] once in Scotland on the Shore of Lyth, it was for King Charles, and for my loue towards his Matie: and the good Service I did him wch his Matie: very well knoweth, and so is this done, now all I shall desire of yor honnor is to Let my case bee knowen to the Queene to speake to the King to give mee what reperation on Capt. Colonell Ashburneham, and I have thought all ye waies that can bee thought vpon for the transporting of it to Bristoll, it is but all skores in the sand, for there is noe meanes for carriages, and albeit wee had carryages ye way is very daungerous yet, at the first rumor of my Lord Hoptons retreate wch was reported heere that hee was absolutely routed, I resolved with Colonell Ashburneham for ye security of the Magazine, Portland not being then victualled, and the towne of Waymouth neither forfaited, nor victualled wch is the fault of the basenes of the county. resolved to put the Armes, and amunition into Hasedonke his friggatt weh I did, and the wind being good, I resolved on the first coming of the enemy heere to go for Exeter, and deliver it there, but the wind coming contrary after two, or three daies, and victualls being provided for the castle of Portland, the safest way was to take the Armes, and amunition out of the friggatt, and secure it in Portland castle, God willing I will bee as carefull of my Charge as if the King, & Queene were present Looking vpon mee, (But wthall by the way) when such distractions cometh a thaurt, if my Credit had not beene better then my purse wth monies, if ye enemy had come the King had Lost a braue magazine, for there is noe body heere would Lay their hands to helpe without monies, & some good friends did Lend mee monies on my promise I should pay them wthin ten daies, My Lord albeit I were never so much necessitated I can haue noe monies of the Customers without an order from my Lord Treasurer, and vpon such Suddaine alarmes as this & the enemy betwixt this and Oxford it is not possible to send for orders, but before it come to mee from Oxford the Kings armes, and amunition may miscarry. If I may not have the Credit of 100 sterling to Ly beside mee, I wonder why the King hath trusted mee wth his Maties: Monies, and Armes, and amunition before this, and I am trusted now Likewise wth these Armes, and amunition; My Lord I have beene in Loading, & vnloading into ye friggat, & putting it out a Land at Portland to ye sailers of the ships, to worke to worke men [sic], to porters great Charges, And at the first in these distracted Times it was very hard to mee, but I run wth monies in the one hand, and a Cudgell in the other, and made them do it. And now my Lord if yor honnor do not send mee speedily an order to receive monies, the armes must Lay there at Portland, for I have done as much as Lyeth in mee in worke, word, or deed, or so farre as my credit can reach; remember my Lord I foretold it before hand, if there bee not monies sent if any thing miscarry it shall bee none of my ffault, I sent yor honnor a coppy of all Armes, and amunition I received, and on thursday Last wee sent away the Galliot for Holland, and her master, and all the sailers very well pleased, and hee hath promised to bee back heere with the rest of the Armes that Lyeth at Rotterdam wch hee is to Load, & to bring heere, yesternight Prince Maurice was at Chard, and yesternight Colonell Ashburneham did draw all his forces together at Dorchester, and is to joine with the Prince; I hope God willing that within these ten daies of time wee shall bee at Waymouth so fortifyed that wee shall not care for Sir William Waller nor all the rebells by Sea, or Land, I must say Colonell Ashburneham

But every neglect or default instantly appeare wherein, & in whom it shall bee. And so the blame & punishment fall where it iustly ought. As well concerning the other Provisions of the Traine, as touching the Scalling Ladders, & Bridge Boates, whereof such patternes are wth all diligence to bee prepared, as may either bee approved, or the amendment of both so directed, y^t the Residue, may bee wthout exception.

Concerning the Prouision of $\begin{cases} plankes \\ boords \\ spokes &c. \end{cases}$ to bee had at $\begin{cases} Witney & \& \\ farington \end{cases}$ hee is to

cause ye same persons, or in Lieu of Wells the Wheelewright to expedite the bringing in of ye Prouisions, formerly marked & designed for his Mats seruice in those places, his Highnes Prince Rupertt having writtene letters, to the Commanders of both places to yt effect.

That to the Gouernor of Farrington being already deliuered to himselfe in this Towne.8

The other to S^r. Richard Crane, 9 now left wth him, hee is to deliuer to Robert Collins together wth such Instructions, and whatsoeuer els, may bee necessary, on the part of the officers of his Ma^{ts} Ordinance, y^t hee may forthwth take in hand & expedite the dispatch of y^t seruice wth all possible diligence. And whatsoeuer els may aduance y^e proceede of this yeares proportion for the Traine is seriously recommended to M^r Sherburnes best industry & diligence.

Amongst the rest ye present dispatch of ye Proportion for the 20. pieces. And whereas the Imployment of the Purveior to Farrington, was principally about Smithes Coales, Michaell Bastian having already made provision of a Competent Proportion for some daies.

And ye said Purveyor according to ye Lo: Hoptons order being to addresse himself to Dunnington Castle, wth the Prouisions & conuoy of Basing: His said Imployment may bee respited vntill his returne (as is conceiued) except some other expedient for the effecting of both may bee found.¹⁰

To w^{ch} end M^r Sherburne is desired to conferre wth Michaell Bastian. That no tyme or meanes for the expediting, or advancing of any the Provisions or services concerning this yeares Proportion for the Traine may bee neglected or omitted.

NOTES

The documents printed in Sections A, B and C above have been selected from the whole body of Royalist Ordnance Papers as described in Appendix I. They amount to approximately one half of the total, and include all letters of Ordnance officers, a majority of the original warrants, and representative samples from the journals and registers of the office. The notes which follow, therefore, aim to relate the documents reproduced in the text to the other Ordnance Papers, whether printed or not, as well as to place them in their historical context.

SECTION A

Notes to p. 64

- Henry Younger, often styled Captain Younger, was one of the half dozen senior officers of the train of artillery, paid 10/- a day. He was probably a professional soldier, and had been Comptroller of the Artillery in 1640, the post he retained during the civil war. He commanded several by-trains into the field, the last recorded in the Royalist Ordnance Papers being that of 17 June 1644, B 288. In May 1645 he was rewarded with augmentation of his arms. See above, p.17, B 4, C 4, C 54, B 260, B 261 etc., Grantees of Arms, ed. W. H. Rylands (Harleian Soc., Vol. 66), p. 290.
- 2 Charles Greene was a conductor to the train of artillery who had become by this date, and was to remain, its chief plumber. He was listed, among the conductors, as 'Bullet-caster' in the roll of Ordnance Office personnel of 1643-44. His main task, as this entry indicates, was the manufacture of small-arm shot: in the period covered by the journal of receipts, Add. MS.34325, 30 December 1642—10 November 1643, Greene and the Oxford plumber, James Fletcher, delivered 18 tons 4 cwt. of musket shot and one ton of pistol and carbine shot to the New College stores, more than was provided from any other source. He supplied ammunition to the end of the war; large quantities were delivered to the army before Naseby—A 195, A 198—and the last reference to Greene in the Ordnance Papers is dated 20 May 1646, A 206. See above, p.26 n.5, A 6, 9, 17, 31, 61, 148 etc., B 269 and C 54.
- William Baber was a 'pirate' powdermaker, based on Bristol, before the civil war. He became the King's chief powder supplier until replaced by Strode and Wandesford: see above, pp. 14 n.4, 29-30. All the journal entries concerning Baber, of which this is the first, have been included in Section A: they show that from 8 January to 30 May 1643 he delivered 148 barrels to store. This was not sufficient for the army's needs, and Oxford was dependent on supplies from the North and on the Ordnance Commissioners' magazine at the Schools, which appears to have become the principal supplier as early as July 1643, before the formal replacement of Baber in the Spring of the following year. See A 6, 7, 11 etc., 99, 103, 115 etc., and other references to Baber at A 164, B 94, 178 and 230.

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- 4 Sir Mathew Carew (b.1580) was of the family of Anthony in Cornwall. He was the eldest son of Sir Mathew, a Master in Chancery, and brother of Thomas, the courtier and poet. He was knighted in 1611. He may have been living at Cockthorpe, Oxon, when he made his contribution of arms to Oxford magazine, but at the fall of Tewkesbury in April he was reported as among those who fled from the town. D.N.B., Visitation of Cornwall, 1620 (Harleian Soc., Vol. 9), p.33, Shaw, Knights of England, 11, p. 151, Al. Oxon., C.C.C., p.91, Add. MS. 18980, f.40.
- Spencer Compton, 2nd Earl of Northampton (1601-43), was one of the peers who early rallied to the King's cause. He raised horse and foot, enlisted four of his sons and took command of Banbury after its capture in October 1642. As this document indicates, he helped supply Oxford from the town with essentials for munitions manufacture; lead was needed for the casting of musket shot. Northampton was killed at the battle of Hopton Heath, 19 March 1643. Clarendon, VI §§ 99, 278, 280, 283, Stevens, pp.49-50, C.P., B 7, 10, 77.
- 6 For the Ordnance Commissioners, and their organisation of craftsmen for the train, see above, pp.17-19, 25-26. The heads for staff weapons—pikes, bills and poleaxes—were supplied separately by local blacksmiths, or from Worcester, as in A 15, and presumably fitted to the staves, such as those delivered here, in the Commissioners' stores in the Schools. The process may be traced in A 10, 11, 12, 15, 16 and B 267. As the pike staves ordered were 15½ foot long the pikes themselves must have been over 16 foot. The craftsmen employed were drawn from a wide area: Thomas Hill was of Chieveley parish, near Newbury, as a later delivery from him reveals, A 15.
- Winter Graunt (d.1660) was a royal servant before the civil war, and until November 1643, when he was replaced by Henry Stevens, an Oxfordshire gentleman, served the Royalist army as Waggon-Master-General. His father and his mother's brothers (Winters of Huddington, Warwickshire) were all Gunpowder plotters, and Graunt was no doubt a Catholic. Through his work he was closely associated with the Ordnance Office, and he appears several times in the Ordnance Papers. In 1644 he was involved in transporting supplies in the West country, C 82; thereafter he lived abroad, C.Clar.S.P., I, pp.320, 336. The arms received from Graunt were probably those handed in to him as a result of the King's proclamation of 5 January 1643, Steele, No. 2344. There is a full account of Graunt and the duties of the Waggon-Master-General by Dr. Margaret Toynbee in Stevens, pp. 13-17.
- There were two Colonel Gerrards in the Royalist army at this date. The regiment of Charles Gerrard, later Earl of Macclesfield (d. 1694), was part of Oxford garrison; that of his cousin Sir Gilbert Gerrard had been stationed at Brill, on the borders of Buckinghamshire, since December 1642. A Captain Houghton was an officer of the latter regiment at Culham camp in May 1643; he may be the 'Hatton' referred to here: see B 117. For both Charles Gerrard and Sir Gilbert Gerrard see note 70, A Section. The muskets were handed in for repair or in exchange for serviceable arms.
- 9 Captain Charles Kirke was one of the several regular officers in Sir Ralph Dutton's regiment of foot, at this time part of Oxford garrison, and was,

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like the officer in the previous note, replacing some of his regiment's unfit arms. The instructions from Strode for this purpose are printed in B 62. Kirke had been a Lieutenant of foot in the Scots Wars (Peacock, p.85), and rose to be Major of Dutton's regiment by October 1644, when he served with Gage at the relief of Banbury. At the Restoration he was listed as an Indigent Officer. Peacock, p. 85, W. Sanderson, A Compleat History of the Life... of King Charles, p.730, List, 64, B 99 and 117.

- 10 Colonel John Innes was a Scots professional soldier. He had commanded dragoons at the battle of Edgehill, and sat on the Council of War in November-December 1642. He was Governor of Cirencester in March 1643. Other entries in the Ordnance Papers record the return of arms from his regiment of dragoons during 1643. Bulstrode, *Memories*, p. 81, Harl. MSS. 6852, ff.166, 260, 6802, f.49, B 24, 43, 125, A 93, Add. MS. 34325, ff. 11, 50, 66.
- Thomas, Lord Wentworth (1613-65), son of the Earl of Cleveland, was, like his father, a notable soldier. He commanded cavalry in the Scots Wars, in the first civil war—he was Colonel of the Prince of Wales's Horse in 1644—and at the battle of Worcester (1651). He was also Colonel of a dragoon regiment, and as such took part in the taking of Cirencester in February 1643. The 140 muskets returned to store, from his dragoons, were distributed to Oxford craftsmen for repair on 22 February, and handed back on 24 March 1643, B 73, 78 and 88. D.N.B., C.P., Bibliotheca Gloucestrensis.
- 12 John Russell (c.1620-87) was the third son of Francis, 4th Earl of Bedford (died 1641), M.P. for Tavistock, Devon, from 1641 until disabled for royalism in January 1644. He was, as indicated here, Lieutenant Colonel of Wentworth's dragoons; he took part in the Chalgrove raid. He was close to Rupert, and when the Prince took over Colonel Lunsford's foot he was commissioned into that regiment, eventually becoming its Colonel. He was Colonel of the Foot Guards after the Restoration. M. F. Keeler, The Long Parliament (1965), p. 328, Symonds, pp. 165, 180, C.C.C., p. 1208, C. Dalton, Army Lists, I, p. 7.
- 13 Nicholas Sherman, Master Armourer, was the holder of that office before the civil war. He died in August 1643, and in the following October his widow petitioned for relief. See above, p.27 n.4, and P.R.O., L.C.3.1. Sherman had carried out repair work on the 30 suits of armour he was now returning. A gorget is a piece of armour for the throat.
- 14 Sir William Russell (d.1669) of Strensham, Worcestershire, was a leading Royalist in the county. He raised forces for the King, was made Governor of Worcester, and was active in supplying the Oxford army with the products of the local iron industry. This delivery, of pike heads, is the first recorded in the Ordnance Papers; several others follow. See A 37, 88 and 94. Russell fell into dispute with his fellow Royalists, and was replaced as Governor by Sir Gilbert Gerrard late in 1643. See above, p.35 and A 134.
- 15 Bartholomew de la Roche was a French 'fireworker' whom the Royalists much esteemed though seldom paid. An account of his career at Oxford is given above, pp. 32-33. The heavy—60 lb.—mortar was no doubt required to pound the ingredients of la Roche's explosive mixtures.

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- The King's proclamation appealing for arms from the citizens of Oxford was issued on 12 March 1643 (Steele, No. 2391a), and it brought an immediate if limited response, which is recorded in the journal of receipts, W.O.55.1661[17]. The same journal records the results of the similar proclamation of 22 April 1643 (Steele, No. 2411), and it has been reproduced in full in Section A. As a result of the first proclamation there were handed in from private persons in the city and colleges of the University to the New College magazine 53 muskets or their equivalent, 97 staff weapons or swords, and 39 pieces of armour or equipment, A 18-25, 28 and 30. After the second proclamation the equivalent figures are 158, 363 and 317, A 35-36, 40-60, 63, 65, 69, 81 and 87. The amounts involved include arms etc. left behind by garrison soldiers with their landlords, and those sold or pawned by soldiers and now recovered. See above, p. 34.
- 17 Gilbert Sheldon (1598-1677), Warden of All Souls from 1626 to 1648, later Archbishop of Canterbury and Chancellor and benefactor of the University, was a Royalist sympathiser: he took the Protestation oath only with qualifications, aided Sir John Byron, the Royalist officer, and his company during their short stay at Oxford in September 1642, and co-operated with the King's forces in the city thereafter. He was ejected from his college on the Parliamentary visitation of 1648. He promptly and no doubt willingly parted with his suit of armour and the college's halberds (next item) to the royal magazine following the proclamation of 12 March 1643. D.N.B., Oxon. Protestation Returns, ed. C. Dobson, pp.100-1, H.M.C., House of Lords, new series, XI, p. 326.
- Captain Unton Crooke, Junior, and his father, also Unton Crooke, were prominent Oxford citizens, lawyers, and Parliamentarians. The former possessed a house in St. Aldate's, and at Marston, outside Oxford. Arms from Unton Crooke of 'St. Owles', A 35, and 'St: Toles', A 42, probably refer to his house in St. Aldate's. Whether this receipt from All Saints is from the father or the son, or from some other Crooke, is uncertain. D.N.B., 'Sir John Croke', Oxford Council Acts, 1626-1665, ed. M. G. Hobson and H. E. Salter (henceforth cited as O.C.A.), pp. xxiii, xxix, 222, 306, etc., Bodleian: Add. MS.D.114, f.48.
- Sir Ralph Dutton (1603-?1646), of Sherborne, Gloucestershire, was the younger brother of the wealthy M.P. and later friend of Oliver Cromwell, John 'Crump' Dutton. Sir Ralph enjoyed court favour before the civil war, and his foot regiment, officered mainly by professionals, was the second raised for the King in the summer of 1642. It was part of the garrison of Oxford at this time. Visitation of Gloucestershire, 1623 (Harleian Soc., Vol. 21), pp.54-55, W.B. Willcox, Gloucestershire, pp. 29, 34, Keeler, The Long Parliament, pp. 162-3, Harl. MS.6852, f.253, note 9, Section A, above, B 48, 50, 54, 62, 99, 117, 153 etc.
- David Woodfield (d.1668), Oxford citizen and joiner, was Second Sergeant to the Mayor, 1635-67. He helped train the Oxford militia before and during the civil war, and the arms returned here may be a few of those of the trained bands. The major part of Oxford's arms was placed in the Guild Hall in 1642 and reserved for the use of the city regiment, raised in 1643, in which Woodfield was commissioned as a Lieutenant. O.C.A.,

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1626-1665, passim, ibid., 1665-1701, pp. 1, 12, Bodleian: Add. MS. D.114, f. 46, List, 150.

Edward Stephens (b.1581) was Clerk to Sir John Heydon, and probably the longest serving official of the Ordnance Office. He had begun his military career in the Low Countries, and his active service included the siege of Julich, 1610, the war in the Palatinate, 1620, and the expedition to Cadiz in 1625. He had since then been at the Office of Ordnance, first under Sir William Heydon, then his brother Sir John, with whom he left London in 1642 to join the King. His goods, along with those of Heydon, were sequestrated by Parliament in 1643. His pay was seven years in arrear when he petitioned for relief in 1645. This entry and others-A 62 and 79-indicate Heydon's concern that la Roche should be well supplied. D.N.B., 'Sir John Heydon', P.R.O. 30.5.6, pp. 368-70. Sir William Pennyman (1607-43), of Marske, Yorkshire, M.P. for Richmond, 1640-42, was a wealthy landowner and alum miner, with connections at court before the civil war, who had raised a foot regiment in Yorkshire for the King which was later styled by Symonds the 'Eldest Regiment of the army'. It was at this time, like Dutton's, part of Oxford garrison. This, and the following entries, A 33, show the regiment exchanging unfit for serviceable arms. D.N.B., Keeler, The Long Parliament, pp. 302-3, Symonds, pp. 160-1.

There was more than one Oxford citizen of this name in the civil war. It is probable that this entry refers to John Holloway (1598-1675), Steward of New College, who lived in St. Aldate's parish. His delivery of a pike to the magazine, like those of other citizens on or after 22 April 1643, was prompted by the King's proclamation; see above, note 16, A Section. Wood, City of Oxford, III, p.249, Bodleian: Add. MS. D.114, ff.24, 46, Wood, Fasti, II, 12.

This delivery of iron cannon balls, mortar and hand grenades and pikeheads from Worcester was not the earliest to be received by the Oxford magazine—see A 15 and 26—but it was the first of real significance. The arrival of the train, rumoured to consist of 95 carts, caused excitement at Oxford. It is more likely that about half that number of carts had been required to carry the ammunition listed here, which weighed some 20 tons. The passage from Worcester would have been via Evesham and either Chipping Campden or Stow-on-the-Wold, the routes recommended to Sir William Russell, the Governor of Worcester, in connection with the train which arrived on 25 March: A 26 and Harl.MS.6852, f. 259. The journey normally took four days. In return Oxford sent powder, musket shot and match to the forces in Worcester, B 116, 121. Further deliveries of iron or ironwork from Worcester are listed at A 88 (8 tons) and 134 (2 tons). See above, p.35. The conductor of the train was William Dudley, who had previously conducted that of 25 March 1643, A 26 and W.O. 55.459, f.81.

The garrison at Cirencester, of which Colonel John Innes was Governor, was withdrawn by the King in order to concentrate his forces for the relief of Reading, threatened by Essex. The cannon returned to Oxford and listed here were not those taken by Prince Rupert for his successful assault on the town on 2 February 1643, but were no doubt captured

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there; they were supplied with ammunition from Oxford in March 1643: see B 56, 83 and 91. Of the two tons each of powder, match and musket shot which the New College stores had sent to Cirencester, much less than half was returned in this train, B 20, 87 and 91. The sakers—five-pounders—were inferior iron guns, and mounted on improvised carriages. An order to Innes to send the guns to Oxford had been drafted as early as 30 March, Harl. MS. 6802, f.49. The officers accompanying the train, William Fowler and Christopher Jones, had been keepers of the Cirencester stores, B 56 and 91. See above, note 10, A Section, for Innes.

- 26 George Symm, of Marske, Yorkshire, was Sergeant Major (i.e. Major) and later Lieutenant Colonel to Pennyman. He left the service of the King in October 1644 and compounded with the Parliamentary committee of Yorkshire. Symonds, p. 161, names him George Symons. Yorkshire Royalist Composition Papers, ed. J. W. Clay (Yorks. Arch. Soc., Record Series, Vol. 18), pp. 18-19.
- Peter Tilliard (d.1643), of Oxford tradesmen family, was elected Sergeant to the city Bailiffs, 1635, and served until his death during the civil war. Like Woodfield, he had no doubt come into possession of the arms he delivered here as a result of his official post, cf. note 20, A Section, above. O.C.A., pp. 60, 63, 69, 114, etc., Wood, Life and Times, I, p. 203.
- Sir Richard Cave (d.1645), M.P. for Lichfield, 1641-42, was an associate of Rupert's and an early member of the Oxford Council of War. He was, however, not at Oxford when this musket was received. He had joined Maurice's forces at Sudeley on 1 April, and was involved in the surrender of Hereford to Waller on 25 April. He was killed at Naseby. Keeler, The Long Parliament, pp. 128-9, J. Duncumb, Collections towards the History.. of the County of Hereford, I, pp.245-58, Symonds, p.193.
- 29 Philip Parsons (1594-1653), Principal of Hart Hall since 1633. D.N.B.
- Sir James Pennyman (1608-79), of Ormsby, Yorkshire, was at this time Lieutenant Colonel to his cousin Sir William Pennyman's regiment of foot, and succeeded him in the command on Sir William's death in August 1643. He left the Royalist cause before Naseby, and compounded for his estates in 1646. He was created Baronet in 1664. His company, quartered in St. Thomas's parish, had left these arms behind when it joined the expedition to relieve Reading, 22 April 1643. Other arms of the company, also handed in by a St. Thomas's parishioner—they are among those 'swept up' by Captain Humphrey Elmes, listed at A 60—were reclaimed later by Pennyman's men: W.O. 55.459, f. 141. For Pennyman see G.E.C., Complete Baronetage, III, pp. 287-88, C.C.C., p. 934, Dugdale's Visitation of Yorkshire, ed. J. Clay, III, pp. 70-74, Symonds, pp. 160-1, Yorkshire Royalist Composition Papers, I, pp. 187-94.
- This entry indicates the employment of local craftsmen, in this case a cooper, in Oxford's munitions industry. The saltpetre house was a necessary link in the chain of gunpowder production in the city. In 1627—another year of military emergency—the city council had helped set up such a petre workshop: O.C.A., p.9. Other elements in the chain of production are referred to in B 50 (the powder mills) and A 133 (the powder house).

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- Gerrard Croker (d.1647), of Hook Norton, Oxfordshire, raised locally first a troop then a regiment of horse for the King, in the winter of 1642/3. A delivery of horsemens' armour was made to his troop, 14 December 1642, B 41. His regiment survived until Spring 1644, when Croker withdrew from the war. C.C.C., p. 1639, List, 34, Will, P.C.C. Fines 220, Harl. MSS. 986, ff. 79-90, 6804, f.130, 6851, f.106, 6852, f.1.
- 33 Probably Major Symm, of Pennyman's foot, is intended. See above, note 26.
- 34 Sir John Culpepper (d.1660), of Hollingbourne, Kent, one of Charles I's principal councillors from 1642, had exchanged the Chancellorship of the Exchequer, which went to Sir Edward Hyde, for the Mastership of the Rolls in February 1643. He was created first Lord Culpepper in 1644. D.N.B., C.P.
- Sir Thomas Holland (c. 1577-c.1644), of Berw, Anglesey, M.P. for Anglesey in 1601, Sheriff of the county, 1609, 1622, 1640, and trained band Captain. *Dict. of Welsh Biography*, p.361.
- Brian Twyne (1580-1644), Fellow of Corpus Christi College, historian of the University and first keeper of its Archives, was 'one of the greatest of Oxford antiquaries'. His account of the Musterings of the University, 13 August 1642 to 15 July 1643, which was used by Anthony Wood, and other manuscripts he gathered, are an important source for the history of civil war Oxford. He died in St. Aldate's parish in July 1644. D.N.B., Oxoniensia, Vol. V, pp.96-114, Wood, Life and Times, I, p. 53 ff. Twyne himself explained the background to the entry in the journal of receipts printed here. On his copy of the proclamation of 22 April, calling for arms (Steele, No.2411), he noted that it 'was red in St Tolls [Aldate's] parish at Euening prayer on Sunday. 23. of Aprill. It seemes y^t for hast, it could not be printed.' 'I myselfe was induced to bringe in (for more suretie) one birding peece made of a Caliuer barrell, and a very good bill w^{ch} I had lately trimmed vp for mine owne defence.' His receipt for these, which he also preserved, is signed Thomas Eastbrooke and dated 24 April. Bodleian: MS. Twyne-Langbaine 2, ff. 26-7. See above, p. 34 n.3.
- Hannibal Potter (1592-1664), Fellow of Trinity from 1613 and President of the College from August 1643 until deprived by the Parliamentary Visitation, 1647. D.N.B., 'Francis Potter'.
- 38 Sir Edward Hyde (1609-74), later Earl of Clarendon, at this date Privy Councillor and Chancellor of the Exchequer. D.N.B.
- John Sayer, Sayre or Sare (d.1643), Oxford chandler, was an Alderman of the city and Mayor in 1627 and 1634. O.C.A., pp. 6, 7, 8 etc., Wood, City of Oxford, III, p.36.
- Leonard Lichfield (1604-57) had succeeded his father as printer to Oxford University in 1635, and was employed by the King during the civil war to print royal declarations, proclamations etc. He was paid £676 for this work in March 1644, but was owed a further £1200, which his widow claimed at the Restoration. His shop, in Butcher's Row, now Queen St., was burned down in the Oxford fire of October 1644. D.N.B., F. Madan, Oxford Books, II (1912), passim, C.S.P.D. 1644, p. 73, 1661-2, pp. 135, 238, 245.

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- Joseph Bampfield (b.1622) was an Irish adventurer who had served as a junior officer in the Scots Wars and rose rapidly, though very young, to be a Colonel of foot in 1642. On 24 February 1643 he was supplied with match for 'seruice in the west', and was probably sent to Malmesbury with infantry, B 74 and note 103. He claimed later, in his Apologie, that he had been made Governor there by Rupert. He and the garrison forces were withdrawn to aid in the relief of Reading, and these few stores were returned to the Oxford magazine at the same time; cf. A 38 (Cirencester), A 61 and 67 (Banbury), A 66 (Abingdon), A 67 and 68 (Lichfield). D.N.B., Bellum Civile, ed. C. - While the army faced Essex's forces before Reading Abingdon stores were called in. The town had been garrisoned and supplied after Edgehill, B 8, and the two cannon placed there had been exchanged for two falcons on 8 January 1643, B 53. It remained a Royalist stronghold until the summer of 1644.
- 43 Rupert had been recalled by the King immediately after his capture of Lichfield on 21 April 1643: he and his forces arrived at Oxford on the 24th and joined the King on his way to Reading. The Prince's train was received into store on the 26th and 27th, this entry and A 68. The demi cannon, the culverin and one of the sakers, and the ammunition for them—the most important element in the stores returned—had not formed part of Rupert's train when he set out on his expedition to the Midlands on 28 March 1643, B 93. It is likely that they—or some of them—were supplied to Rupert from Lord Capel, the Royalist commander at Shrewsbury. Warburton, II, p. 163, H.M.C., Hastings, II, pp. 99-100.
- 44 William Seymour, Marquess of Hertford (1588-1660), had been named the King's commander in the South and West in the summer of 1642. When he had failed to gain the support he expected first in Somerset, then in South Wales, he returned to Oxford in January 1643, probably bringing with him these two minions. Although taken by Rupert in March, and here returned, they were earmarked for Hertford's use in his subsequent Western campaign: B 56, and note 87, B 93, 111 and 112.
- Anthony Greene (d.1644), Major of Northampton's regiment of foot at Banbury, was a professional soldier who had served as a Captain of foot in 1640. He was one of an expert committee of officers set up in January 1643 to advise on the future size and composition of the artillery train. He acquitted himself well during the siege of Banbury, August-October 1644, and was knighted at Oxford, November 1644. He died at Hart Hall in December and was buried in St. Mary the Virgin's. Peacock, p. 86, Harl. MS. 6851, f. 64, The Life, Diary, and Correspondence of Sir William Dugdale, ed. W. Hamper, p. 75, Wood, City of Oxford, III, p. 246. See B 10, 77 and 109 for other references to Greene at Banbury. This was the second delivery of supplies for musketeers from Banbury to Oxford: cf. that of 24 April, A 61.
- 46 Henry Southam (d.1660), Oxford glover and innholder, was an Alderman and Mayor of the city in 1629 and 1637. He was an active councillor during the civil war. O.C.A., pp. 8, 21, 74, 242 etc., Wood, City of Oxford, III, pp. 35-7, H.M.C., House of Lords, new series, XI, pp. 322, 327-8, 332.

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- Thomas Walker (d. 1665) was Master of University College from 1632 until his ejection at the Parliamentary Visitation, 1648, and again from 1660 to 1665. Wood, *Life and Times*, I, p. 445, II, p. 52.
- The King had marched from Oxford on 22 April 1643 to relieve Reading with seven cannon of battery, an uncertain number of smaller pieces and a train of 50 carts: see B 103 and note 131. He had been checked at Caversham Bridge on 25 April, and Reading was surrendered the following day. On the 28th the King and Rupert returned to Oxford, and the train, listed here, the day after. Some changes in its composition are noteworthy. If 3 twelve-pounders were taken only one was returned. But two minions were rescued from Reading, and perhaps also the falconet, which is not listed in B 103: and more powder, match, musket shot and big cannon shot were returned than were taken. The terms of the surrender of the town had allowed the Royalists to march out with four guns and 50 carts with baggage and sick men: and the rescue of the best cannon and munition and all the men locked up in Reading had been the main objective of the relief expedition. On the other hand ten pieces in the town and much powder was lost: see below notes 46 and 124, B Section. Clarendon, VII § 35-6, Warburton, II, pp. 178-9.
- 49 Sir William Vavasour (d. 1659) was the younger son of Sir Thomas Vavasour, Knight Marshall to James I. He served as Colonel of foot in the Scots War, 1640. At Edgehill he was Lieutenant Colonel of the King's Lifeguards of Foot, and captured; but he escaped from imprisonment in April 1643. That he had probably resumed an infantry command and was at Oxford is indicated by this delivery of 1 May 1643. In the following month he was appointed Commander-in-Chief of forces in Herefordshire, Monmouthshire and South Wales: later references to him as General there are A 140, B 174, 248, 264 and his letter of 30 March 1644, C 72. See also B 51, and Stevens, pp. 40-2.
- Probably William Leighton, Major of the King's Lifeguards, is intended. Leighton had served on the continent before the civil war; he was wounded at Edgehill, but took part in Rupert's capture of Cirencester, February 1643. He became Lieutenant Colonel of the Guards upon Vavasour's promotion: see above, note 49. He was knighted at Hereford, September 1645, and at the Restoration was rewarded with a commission in the Foot Guards. B 12, 71, 172; National Library of Wales, Chirk Castle MS. F 7442, Symonds, pp. 194, 233, Walker, pp. 61, 129, Dalton, Army Lists, I, p. 45.
- Henry Washington (c.1615-64) was the eldest son of Sir William Washington of Packington, Leicestershire, and through his mother allied to the great Villiers connection. A professional soldier, he served abroad, then in the Scots Wars, and rose in the civil war to command a regiment of dragoons in succession to James Usher, killed at Lichfield, April 1643. He won renown at the taking of Bristol in July 1643; in the following year he was Governor of Evesham, and in 1646 of Worcester, which he surrendered in July at the end of the war. He obtained a captaincy of foot in the Guards at the Restoration. Peacock, p. 73, Stevens, pp. 39-40, Dalton, Army Lists, I, p. 7. The broken arms of his regiment, here

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handed in for repair, were replaced in part by the order of 11 May 1643, B 113 and note 149. Cf. also A 80, B 127 and B 225.

- 52 Sir James Harrington (1607-80), of Ridlington, Rutland, and Merton, Oxfordshire, was a noted Parliamentarian, Recruiter M.P. and Councillor of State. The great copper, no doubt to be melted down as other pots, kettles and similar utensils had been, for the use of the gunfounder—B 84 and 86—was probably taken from his house at Merton. G.E.C., Baronetage, I, p. 53. See A 90 for another requisitioning, and A 87 for coppers supplied from the royal kitchens.
- Joseph Wagstaffe (b. ?1612) was a soldier of fortune, who had been, before the civil war, Major in an Irish regiment in French service. He was named by the Long Parliament for the army raised for Ireland in the summer of 1642, and so, like many others, found himself serving in Essex's army in the autumn. He was captured in January 1643, transferred to the Royalists, and was in command of foot which was supplied with ammunition in February, B 68. He rose to be Major General of Foot under Prince Maurice, and was knighted at Crediton in July 1644. He took part in Penruddock's rising, 1655, and was rewarded with a small grant of land at the Restoration. D.N.B., C.Clar. S.P., I, p. 222. These 36 muskets received from Wagstaffe for Washington, or an equivalent number, were delivered to the latter on 16 June 1643, B 127 and note 164.
- 54 Francis Windebank (c. 1613-45), the second son of Charles I's Secretary of State, Sir Francis Windebank, had entered the service of Thomas Wentworth, Earl of Strafford, and been appointed Usher of the Chamber to Prince Charles, then had taken a command in the army facing the Scots in 1640. He was at this date Sergeant Major in Charles Gerrard's foot regiment—see B 50 and 196. He was later given the command of Bletchingdon House, near Oxford, and was executed for surrendering it to Cromwell in May 1645. D.N.B., 'Sir Francis Windebank,' Symonds, pp. 163-4.
- Sir John Byron, later Lord Byron (1599-1652), of Newstead, Nottinghamshire, was one of the King's foremost cavalry commanders. He had gained experience in the Low Countries, was an officer in the Scots Wars, and was named by Charles to the lieutenancy of the Tower in the dispute with Parliament, December 1641. He raised horse for the King in the summer of 1642, paid for by his kinsman the Earl of Worcester, and fought at Edgehill. In the autumn of 1643 he was created 1st Baron Byron of Rochdale and given command in Lancashire, D.N.B. In mid-May he and Wentworth—for whom see note 11 above—led a party of horse and dragoons on a raiding expedition into Buckinghamshire, in which they plundered the countrypeople, fired villages, levied forced taxes and drove off cattle. The munitions returned here from their forces were that part of a delivery to them, made the same day, which was surplus to their requirements: B 114. Warburton, II, pp. 191-4.
- 56 Sir Richard Molyneux, 2nd Viscount Maryborough (c.1617-c.1654), eldest son of an official of the Duchy of Lancaster who had been raised to the Irish peerage, mustered mainly Catholic horse and foot for the King in the summer of 1642 in Lancashire. His regiment of foot served with

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the Oxford army, and Molyneux was at Edgehill, but thereafter he remained largely in the North, fighting at Whalley in April, Ormskirk in August 1643 and Marston Moor in July 1664. He was at Naseby, surrendered at Ludlow (1646) and took part in the campaign which ended at Worcester, 1651. D.N.B., C.P. His foot regiment, referred to here, was at Culham camp—see note 63 below—and therefore named in Ordnance Papers, A 93 and B 117: its Lancashire origins are obvious from the company commanders listed in B 117: and see next note.

- Roger Nowell (b. 1606), of Rede, Lancashire, was in all probability the Lieutenant Colonel of Molyneux's foot at this date. He survived the Restoration. His younger brother Richard was a Captain in the same regiment and was killed at the taking of Bristol, July 1643, Warburton, II, p. 248, and *Dugdale's Visitation of Lancashire*, 1664-5 (Chetham Society, Vol. 85), II, p. 221.
- 58 It is possible though not certain that Henry Harris was Lieutenant Colonel of Lord Digby's, later Thomas Weston's, regiment of horse, at this date quartered in Oxfordshire. Warburton, III, p. 17. This seizure of goods of a 'delinquent' compares with that in A 78: see note 52 above.
- Marmaduke Rawdon (1582-1646), of Hoddesdon, Hertfordshire, wealthy London Councilman and clothworker, was of Yorkshire origin. He was an officer of the City trained bands before the war, and supported the Royalist Mayor in 1641. Like other prominent City Royalists such as Crispe, Strode and Bynion—for whom see notes 74 and 92, B Section, and 120, C Section—he joined the King at Oxford and took an active part in military affairs. He raised a regiment of foot at his own expense (see B 102) in part recruited from Londoners in exile, in the Spring of 1643. He was made Governor of Basing House, which he successfully defended in November, and was knighted at Oxford, 20 December 1643. Later ousted from his post, he died as Governor of Faringdon in April 1646. Stevens, pp. 47-8, Harl. MS. 986, f.91, Pearl, London and the outbreak of the Puriton Revolution, pp. 121, 265. A near contemporary memoir of Rawdon is printed in the Journal of the Yorkshire Arch. and Top. Soc., Vol. 25, pp. 315-30. His regiment, to which these muskets, repaired by William Standinought, the Oxford gunsmith, belonged, was probably at this date not yet removed to Basing. Cf. B 182 and note 227.
- 60 Probably Humphrey Brookbank, a renegade from the Parliamentary army after Edgehill, is here referred to. He was captured by Parliamentary forces at the surrender of Grafton House, near Towcester, Northants, and shot as a deserter, December 1643. It is not known in which regiment he was Major at this time. Camden Miscellany, Vol. 12, pp. 86-7, 95, Peacock, p. 49.
- 61 Sir Henry Vaughan (c. 1587-c.1660), of Derwydd, Carmarthenshire, the sixth son of Walter Vaughan of Golden Grove, was Sheriff of the county in 1620, M.P. for Carmarthen in the Parliaments of 1621-8 and for the shire in the Short and Long Parliaments, until disabled in 1644. He was knighted at Oxford in January 1643. He brought his South Wales regiment of foot to the King's army some time later: this entry in the Ordnance Papers is the first reference to it. While it remained with the field army for the campaigns of this and the following year—see B 147, 153

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- and note 184, B Section, A 118 and Symonds, p. 160—Vaughan was sent to aid his nephew Lord Carbery in South Wales. He was an irreconcilable Royalist and spent much time in prison after his capture at Naseby. D.N.B., Dict. Welsh Biog., Keeler, The Long Parliament, p. 371.
- 62 John Owen (1600-66), eldest son of John Owen of Clenennau, Caernarvonshire, Sheriff of the county, 1630, brought his foot regiment from North Wales to Oxford at the end of 1642. He was an active and able infantry commander, who may have acquired some military experience abroad, and in the civil war took part, it is said, in seven battles, nine sieges and 32 actions. Like Vaughan and Molyneux he left his regiment at Oxford when he took up a command nearer home. In 1644 he was appointed Governor first of Harlech, then of Conway, and Vice-Admiral of North Wales. He was knighted in December 1644. At the end of the war Rupert tried to persuade him to take service with the French. D.N.B., Dict. Welsh Biog., N. Tucker, Sir John Owen.
- Owen's regiment was quartered, along with the major part of the infantry of the Oxford army, in a camp, started on 1 May 1643 after the surrender of Reading, which lay on rising ground between Abingdon and Culham, on the east bank of the Thames. 14 or 15 regiments-about 5000 menwere there supplied with ammunition and arms, B 108 and 117. Conditions in the camp were not good, however: the soldiers, badly paid and poorly clothed, lived in improvised mud-huts and fell prey to the wartyphus already raging in the Parliamentary army. When Owen and other senior officers in the camp requested that the sick be moved out, the Council of War agreed, and withdrew the infected men to hastily prepared hospitals near Oxford. At the same time an equivalent number of the defective arms of their regiments were brought out, and deposited in the New College magazine, 10-21 June, where they were recorded in the journal of receipts. This entry, relating to Owen's regiment, is the first; the next is that of Colonel Herbert's. No others have been reproduced, for a schedule of all the muskets and pikes so received was later drawn up, and this is included as A 93. Rupert's Journal, E.H.R., Vol. 13, p. 733, Harl. MS. 6804, f. 92.
- 64 Possibly Edward Bostocke of Holt, Denbighshire. Tucker, Sir John Owen, p. 131.
- 65 Richard Herbert, 2nd Baron Herbert of Cherbury (c. 1600-55), was the eldest son of Lord Herbert of Cherbury, courtier and soldier, and nephew of George Herbert, the poet. He was M.P. for Montgomery in the Long Parliament until disabled in 1642. Having seen active service in the Scots Wars and in Ireland in 1642, he was commissioned, in September 1642, to raise a regiment of foot, which had arrived to join the main army by 16 March 1643, when it was supplied from New College magazine, B 82 and note 112. Herbert was later Governor of Ludlow—see B 184—, and in 1644 of Aberystwyth. D.N.B., 'Edward Herbert', Dict. Welsh Biog., Keeler, The Long Parliament, p. 212, H.M.C., 10th Report, App. IV, p. 399, Stevens, pp. 48-9. The defective arms returned with the sick men from Herbert's regiment were brought in by a company armourer; a sign that the proclamation of 10 March, which had asked for armourers to be appointed to regiments, was working. See above, p. 49 and n. 9.

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- 66 The Lord General was the Earl of Forth, for whom see note 26, B Section. He had taken over this foot regiment as well as the command of the army from the Earl of Lindsey, mortally wounded and captured at Edgehill.
- 67 Sir Jacob Astley was the Sergeant Major General, commander in chief of the infantry: see note 75, A Section. He had recently superseded Richard Feilding, in disgrace for the loss of Reading, as Colonel of this regiment.
- 68 Richard Bolle (d. 1643), of Theddlethorpe, Lincolnshire, probably a career soldier, was given command in the summer of 1642 of the regiment of foot raised in Staffordshire by Lord Paget. Bolle was killed at Alton in December 1643, and was buried in Winchester Cathedral. *Lincolnshire Pedigrees* (Harleian Soc., Vol. 50), I, p. 149, C.S.P.D., 1628-9, p. 477, G. Godwin, *The Civil War in Hampshire*, p. 146.
- 69 Sir Edward Fitton (1603-43), 2nd Baronet, of Gawsworth, Cheshire, Sheriff of Cheshire, 1632, recruited this regiment in his native county, where he was a leading Royalist, and brought it to the main army before mid-October 1642. He died shortly after the taking of Bristol in July 1643, but whether of wounds received there or not is uncertain, and the command passed to his Lieutenant Colonel, a professional soldier, Anthony Thelwall. G.E.C., Baronetage, I, p. 113, Harl. MS. 6851, f. 211.
- 70 Sir Gilbert Gerrard was the youngest brother of Sir Charles Gerrard of Halsall, Lancashire, whose wife was the sister of Sir Edward Fittonsee previous note-and whose eldest son and heir was Charles Gerrard, later Lord Gerrard of Brandon, also a Royalist Colonel. Sir Gilbert's foot regiment, of which his twin brother Ratcliffe was Lieutenant Colonel, was largely Lancashire in composition—three company commanders were also named Gerrard, B 117. Sir Gilbert and his regiment were quartered at Brill in the winter of 1642/3; he was later, in succession to Sir William Russell, Governor of Worcester. Notes 8 and 14 above. Charles Gerrard (c. 1618-94), whose regiment is also listed in this schedule although it was probably not in camp but in garrison at Oxford, had been a soldier in the Netherlands and was promoted early in the civil war. He commanded a tertia of infantry at Edgehill, became an associate of Rupert's, and was General in South Wales, 1644-5. He acquired a fairly disreputable character after the Restoration. For accounts of him see C.P., D.N.B., Stevens, pp. 44-5; and for Sir Gilbert, Burke, Dormant and Extinct Peerages, p. 229.
- 71 Sir Thomas Lunsford (c. 1610-c. 1653), who had originally raised this regiment in Somerset in the summer of 1642—it was in part a re-creation of the unit he had commanded in the Scots Wars—had been captured at Edgehill, and the Colonelcy passed to his younger brother Henry (b. 1611). When Henry was killed at the capture of Bristol in July 1643, Rupert himself took it over, and the effective command was given to Colonel John Russell, for whom see note 12 above. Sir Thomas Lunsford was released in 1644 and became Governor of Monmouth. He was captured at Hereford in December 1645, spent some time in the Tower and died in Virginia. D.N.B., Symonds, pp. 154, 166 etc., P. Young, Edgehill, pp. 219-21.
- 72 Sir Thomas Salusbury (1612-43), 2nd Baronet, of Lleweni, near Denbigh, was a leading Royalist in North Wales. In the summer of 1642 he was

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elected by the gentry in Denbighshire and Flintshire Colonel of the locally raised foot regiment, which he brought to the Royalist army before Edgehill. It was a large and poorly armed force, and suffered at the battle. It was at Reading at the surrender, and now at the camp at Culham: but Salusbury himself was at the head of his troop of horse with Prince Maurice at Worcester. He died shortly afterwards, and the engineer Charles Lloyd took the regiment over. That it was still one of the biggest regiments and still perhaps short of firearms is indicated in the schedule of arms returned. D.N.B., Dict. Welsh Biog., N. Tucker, Denbighshire Officers in the Civil War, pp. 91-116.

- Edward Sherburne (1618-1702) had succeeded his father, also Edward. as Clerk of the Ordnance at the Tower early in 1642. He was now, along with the other senior official of equal status pre-war, Richard March. styled Commissary. Sherburne and March had been briefly imprisoned by Parliament in the summer of 1642, but had made their escape to Oxford by November, B 31. Their houses and goods in the Tower were taken over for Parliament's use. In Sherburne's case these included an excellent library; he was a scholar and minor poet, and was probably more responsible than any other for the preservation of the Royalist Ordnance Papers. He served in the Office throughout the war, and again at the Restoration, until deprived in 1688. He was a Catholic-his family came from Stonyhurst in Lancashire—and had no doubt strong Jacobite learnings. His younger brother Henry was also an Ordnance official during the war: see note 100, A Section below. D.N.B., Aylmer, The King's Servants, pp. 79-80, 156-8, 291, 357, Wood, Fasti, II, p. 30 (based on the information sent to Wood by Sherburne himself, now Bodleian: Wood MS. F 44, ff. 221 et seq.). See above, pp. 13, 19-20. The document printed here, signed by Sherburne, is the schedule to a warrant of Heydon's, dated 6 August 1643, reproduced at B 148: see note 186, B Section. It authorizes redelivery of the arms handed in, in June, to those formerly sick men who were recovered of their illness and were about to rejoin their regiments, then at the siege of Gloucester. Some arms had been redelivered prior to the warrant; they are listed in A 93. The 35 muskets and 36 pikes handed back to Owen's regiment after repair were received on 2 August 1643, W.O. 55.459, f. 370.
- Rupert had arrived at Buckingham by I July 1643 with a strong detachment of horse to protect the passage of the Queen and her train from the North to Oxford. He there skirmished with Essex's forces, mustering at Aylesbury, and on 4 July a train of two six-pounders, their supplies and the 'fireworks' of la Roche were dispatched to him, B 134 and note 169. On the 6th, however, he drew out of Buckingham and marched North; the Queen had already set out from Newark. Perhaps to speed his march, he sent back the artillery train, while keeping the more easily transportable 'fireworks'. Warburton, II, pp. 223-8, Rupert's Journal, E.H.R., Vol. 13, pp. 733-4. The 6-pounders returned here may well be the same guns which were taken by Prince Maurice to relieve Hopton at Devizes and which were in action at the battle of Roundway Down, B 137.
- 75 Sir Jacob Astley (1579-1652), of Melton Constable, Norfolk, was a career soldier, with considerable experience acquired since 1599 on the continent,

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commander and councillor of war during the Scots Wars, and at this time Sergeant Major General of the King's army. He led the infantry in all the major campaigns of the Civil War, and was created Baron Reading in November 1644. Astley had taken over the regiment of Feilding after the fall of Reading, see note 67 above. D.N.B.

- 76 Ludovic Lindsay, 16th Earl of Crawford (1600—c. 1652), Scots soldier of fortune, had served in the Spanish army before 1640. He raised a regiment of horse for the King in 1642 and fought at Edgehill. He and his cavalry were part of the Oxford horse brought by Maurice to join Hopton's forces in June 1643, and he was at Lansdown, Roundway Down and First Newbury. He went to Scotland with Montrose in 1644. D.N.B., C.P., Lord Lindsay, Lives of the Lindsays, II, p. 58.
- Hopton's Cornish and the Oxford horse had driven Waller from the field of Lansdown on 5 July 1643, but the infantry had themselves to retire to Devizes a few days later as Waller regrouped his superior forces, blocking the road to Oxford. Crawford and a part of the Oxford cavalry broke through, brought these broken arms to the royal magazine and rode back with a fresh train—listed at B 136—which was intercepted and taken by a detachment of Waller's horse under Major Dowett the following day, 11 July. Maurice and re-inforcements from Oxford defeated Waller on Roundway Down, two miles to the North of Devizes, on 13 July. See note 172, B Section, for a full account of these actions.
- Captain Francis Whitehead had been Scoutmaster-General in Reading garrison before its surrender in April 1643, and had been employed in taking messages from the acting Governor to the King. He claimed at the Restoration to have been also Waggon-Master-General and Captain of Horse during the civil war, and to have lost part of his estates and all his fortune. Richard Atkyns and John Gwyn, ed. P. Young and N. Tucker, pp. 49, 72, C.S.P.D., 1660-1, p. 17, 1661-2, p. 630, Ashburnham, II, Appendix, p. xxiv. Part of the armour he brought in was delivered next day to Sir Thomas Aston's regiment of horse, W.O. 55.459, f.327.
- This is the first delivery from the Commissioners' stores in the Schools building, Oxford, to the New College magazine, recorded in the journals of receipts. It anticipates an order —B 163— to supply the magazine with munitions, issued in August 1643, and indicates that some six months before February 1644, when Strode and Wandesford officially took over the production of powder at Oxford and—in theory—throughout Royalist England, they were challenging William Baber, whose last recorded delivery of powder was 30 May 1643, A 88. See note 3 above, and pp. 19, 30-2. Following the warrant of 22 August the Schools continued to supply the New College stores: all such deliveries have been reproduced in A Section, A 103, 115 etc. From this first entry, 13 July 1643, to the last, 12 June 1646, A 207, the delivery of 583 cwt. of gunpowder from the Commissioners' magazine to the New College stores is recorded. Because of the incompleteness of the journals, particularly after June 1644, this cannot, however, be taken as an accurate record of their total production.
- 80 Captain John Strachan (d. 1670) was a Scots sea-captain, a native of Aberdeen. He had command of a royal navy ship in the Scots Wars, opposed the National Covenant and was named as a 'delinquent' by the

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Covenanters in 1641. His great and acknowledged services to the King in 1642, as Captain of the frigate 'Providence', were to carry arms and men to England from the Queen in the Netherlands; in July he brought the nucleus of the Royalist train of artillery and several prominent Cavaliers, including George Digby. He was again successful in running the Parliamentary blockade in February 1643, landing the Queen herself, her entourage and vital military supplies at Bridlington Bay: see above, pp. 40-1. These were the stores now brought to Oxford, in his keeping. Strachan was sent to Weymouth after its capture in August 1643 to organise the traffic in arms from the continent; fifteen of his letters to the Ordinance Office from there survive and all are printed in C Section. The first, C 26, is dated 26 November 1643, and the last 6 April 1644, C 78. After the civil war he joined the Queen in Paris, and in the 1650s engaged in gun-running to Scotland. At the Restoration he remained in the entourage of Henrietta, and died at Westminster in 1670. J. Spalding, Memorialls of the Trubles (Spalding Club, 1851), II, pp. 169-71, Register of the Privy Council of Scotland, 1638-43, p. 512, C.S.P.D., 1639, p. 279, 1641-3, p. 346, C. Clar.S.P., II, pp. 181, 203, 358, 374, 457, III, pp. 14, 198, 352. His will is P.C.C. Penn 10.

- 81 Henry Percy (1605-59), the younger brother of the 14th Earl of Northumberland, who adhered to Parliament, had been appointed General of the Ordnance by commission of 22 May 1643, C 3, and created Lord Percy of Alnwick, June 1643. For an account of Percy and an assessment of his Generalship, see above, pp. 20-1.
- Richard March (d. 1672) had been Keeper of the Stores in the Office of Ordnance since 1635. He, as well as Sherburne—see note 73 above—was imprisoned in the summer of 1642, had his house and goods sequestrated and made his escape to the King. From November 1642 he played a vital role in organising arms manufacture—he was called in to take charge at Cirencester after its capture in February 1643—and the import of supplies; he was sent to Bristol when it surrendered and remained there until at least May 1645. His letters from Bristol are printed in C Section: the first, 6 September 1643, is C 13. At the Restoration he was rewarded with the office of Gentleman Usher. See above, pp. 13, 19-20. C.S.P.D., 1641-3, p. 68, L.J., V, pp. 308, 448, William Salt Library, S. MS. 45, ff. 3, 20 etc., S.P.16. 507, No. 78, Calendar of Treasury Books, 1660-7, p. 454. His will is P.C.C. Eure 50.
- 83 Henrietta Maria had landed on the Yorkshire coast, with arms, munitions and veteran officers from the Netherlands, in February 1643. She held court at York until she began her journey south in June with a considerable force: she wrote to the King on the 27th that she marched with 3000 foot, 30 companies of horse and dragoons, six cannon and two mortars, and a train of 150 waggons, Letters, p. 222. She left Newark on 3 July, met Rupert at Stratford on the 11th and the King at Edgehill on the 13th. She entered Oxford in triumph the following day, and her stores were received by the magazine, as we see here, on 19 July. The inventory shows that the Queen had one three-pounder as well as the six cannon already referred to; that the mortars were of unequal size; that four of the cannon were Dutch and the two six-pounders Danish—a detail

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furnished by the copy of the train in the journal of receipts, Add. MS. 34325, f. 58—and that her supplies, as listed here, were sufficient to fill approximately 23 carts. Most importantly it indicates that the Queen carried with her a sizeable amount of gunpowder and the sulphur for making powder, still in short supply at Oxford. She kept some control of the brimstone later, B 150 and 169, and notes 188, 189, and 214, B Section below. The train was therefore as important as that sent earlier to Oxford from the Queen and the Earl of Newcastle, which had consisted of two guns and their ammunition and 136 barrels of powder, A 83, 16 May 1643. Clarendon, VII § 122, Letters, pp. 219-24.

- 84 The entry in the journal, Add. MS. 34325, f. 58, adds to this list 'Horse harneis 33. decayed.'
- 85 On 23 July 1643 Mark Pope and William Dudley, two conductors of the train, were instructed to carry munitions to Wallingford garrison, and in addition further supplies to a destination to be revealed to them by Percy himself. It may be that these stores seized in the 'Late service in Hampshire' and now brought to Oxford by Pope and Dudley relate to Percy's secret instruction. W.O. 55.459, ff. 302-4, 307.
- Shortly after the capture of Bristol the Royalist High Command decided to attempt Gloucester, the last obstacle to communications between Oxford and South Wales, and between Bristol and Worcester. The city was reputed to be poorly defended and ready to declare its loyalty to the King. Charles summoned Gloucester on 10 August 1643. For deliveries to the army camped before the city, see B 152 et seq., and B Section, notes 191, 192, 193 etc. Killinghall was named to conduct supplies to the foot under Forth, en route to Gloucester, on 7 August, B 148: no doubt he received these muskets for repair in exchange.
- 87 A journal of stores received was kept by the Clerks of the Ordnance Office who were with the army which lay before Gloucester and took part, later, in the First Newbury campaign. It consists of 9 leaves; entries begin, here, 21 August and end 22 September 1643; and selected excerpts are printed below, A 104-6, 108, 110 and 112. 'A Booke of Deliveryes' was also kept by the clerks with the army in the field; see B 157 and note 196. All entries in these books relate, of course, to arms received into and delivered from the magazine of the marching army, and not to the New College stores.
- Sir Bainham Throckmorton (c.1606-64), 2nd Baronet, of Tortworth, Gloucestershire, was a county landowner and pre-war farmer of the King's works in the Forest of Dean. A brother-in-law of Hopton, he was a prominent Royalist, Sheriff of the county in 1643 and commander of its trained bands. Throckmorton was instrumental in organising the supply of the county's men and materials (as here) to the forces before Gloucester: see B 167 and his letter to Percy, C 12. Visit. Gloucs., 1623, p. 163, G.E.C., Baronetage, I, p. 65, C.S.P.D., 1641-3, p. 67 etc., 1644, p. 446, 1660, p. 451, C.C.C., p. 1149, Harl. MS. 6802, f. 102.
- 89 Sowdley or Soudley, in the Forest of Dean, possessed furnaces and forges which were put to work for the King's forces. Further deliveries of iron ammunition—in all 527 round shot, mainly for large siege pieces—from

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- Soudley were recorded, A 106, 108. Probably, like the stores from Bristol, A 108, the shot was transported up the Severn by boat to the camps of the besiegers. See above, p. 36.
- 90 Ralph, Lord Hopton (1598-1652), Royalist general, had been appointed, after some dispute, Deputy Governor of Bristol when it fell into the King's hands. From there he supplied the forces engaged in the siege of Gloucester. He was created Baron Hopton of Stratton by patent, 4 September 1643. D.N.B.
- There were handed in, by the constables of parishes within the Oxfordshire hundreds of Bampton, Bullingdon, Chadlington and Ploughley, a total of 35 shovels, 36 spades, 10 pickaxes and one hoe, 5-19 September 1643: further details are supplied by Add. MS. 34325, ff. 67-70. The tools were required for the improvements to Oxford's defences which were undertaken at this time; A. Wood, History and Antiquities of the University of Oxford, ed. Gutch, II, p. 468.
- The Royalist forces had raised the siege of Gloucester on the approach of Essex's army, 5 September 1643; they passed through Painswick the same night. This entry confirms these events; it and the next indicate that Bristol continued to supply the army on the march. *Iter Carolinum*, Rupert's Journal, E.H.R., Vol. 13, p. 734.
- 193 If Evers is a variant spelling of Eure (cf. B 161 and note 205), Thomas Eure, eldest son of Colonel Sir William Eure and Major to his regiment of foot, which had recently arrived at Oxford from the North, may be referred to. He was killed at First Newbury. See note 205, B Section, D. Lloyd, Memoir of the Lives, p. 670, Durham Visitation, 115.
- 94 Captain Samuel Fawcett, named as Comptroller of the Bytrain in 1643 and 1644, C 4 and C 54, was also a cannon-founder at Oxford. He had charge of a mortar at the siege of Bristol, and of some siege pieces at Gloucester, Warburton, II, pp. 246-7, B 164. That of his own making was not at Bristol, but was sent-along with 20 shells-as part of the train, B 146, which accompanied the Oxford foot under Forth to join Rupert's forces for the siege of Gloucester in early August. When his own broke, Oxford was asked for a replacement, 14 August 1643, and one of two the Queen had brought from the North was sent, B 155 and A 107. Now, the siege being raised, all three mortars, including the broken one, are returned to store, together with iron cannon (two small hammered guns, according to Add. MS. 34325, f.69), ammunition and unserviceable arms and materials. Fawcett's broken mortar was melted down in October, B 187. Fawcett was a Norwich man, the brother of the Rev. Thomas Fawcett; he was later Governor of Woodstock, and took part in the battle of Worcester, 1651. He was captured and died in the Fleet before the Restoration. See above, p. 33; A. G. Matthews, Walker Revised, p. 198, C.S.P.D., 1660-1, p. 68, B 293, 295.
- Edward Somerset, styled Lord Herbert (1603-1667), son and heir of the wealthy Catholic peer, the Marquess of Worcester, of Raglan Castle, Monmouthshire, raised men and money locally for the King in 1642-3, supplied—as here—ironwork for the army, and was rewarded with high command in South Wales. He acquired notoriety in 1645 when, as the

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- Earl of Glamorgan, he went as Charles's envoy to the Confederate Irish. See above, p. 36.
- 96 Most probably Henry Aldham, a local Gloucestershire officer, Major to Sir William Vavasour's Welsh forces at the siege of Gloucester, and at Tewkesbury in April 1644, W.O. 55.459, ff. 403, 452, 95-7. He was taken at the surrender of Sudeley Castle in June 1644, TT: E 252 (43). This entry and the next are the last in the journal of receipts of the marching army: for their significance, see above pp. 55-56.
- 97 The battle of Newbury was fought on 20 September 1643. The King and Prince Rupert returned to Oxford on the 23rd, and the sutler's waggon was no doubt part of their train. The full train returned to Oxford two days later; arms and ammunition in it are listed in full at Bodleian: Add. MS. D. 114, f. 131.
- This is the first entry in the journal of receipts for Reading magazine. All entries in this journal —beginning 4 October 1643, ending 11 April 1644— are reproduced in the following Ordnance Papers: A 114, 116, 117, 119, 121, 122, 123, 124, 125, 128, 145. The Royalists had re-entered the town, abandoned by Parliament after the battle of Newbury, on 3 October. Sir Jacob Astley was appointed Governor, and the town was set to work to rebuild the defences and provide for the large garrison placed there. The journal kept by the clerks of the Reading magazine, under the command of Henry Sherburne (see below, note 100), records the delivery to their stores not only of arms and ammunition from Oxford, as this entry, but of arms, armour, tools and materials etc. from local craftsmen and private citizens.
- Colonel Robert Villiers, *alias* Danvers (1624-74), illegitimate son of Viscountess Purbeck, and later Fifth Monarchist plotter, was commissioned to raise a regiment of foot on 15 June 1643. It was now sufficiently recruited, from Shropshire and North Wales, to be armed: 200 muskets and 100 pikes, and powder, shot and match, were delivered, 2-7 October, to the regiment, quartered at Cowley, W.O. 55.459, ff. 486, 489-90. This entry shows that the arms came originally from the Commissioners' magazine, along with an impressive supply of other stores. Black, p. 47, N.L.W., Clenennau Letters, 537, *List*, 136. For Villiers' remarkable career see *C.P.*, 'Viscount Purbeck', and *D.N.B.*, 'Danvers, Robert.'
- Edward Sherburne, was placed in charge of Reading magazine, where he remained until the abandonment of the town in the following year: see above, p. 51, and B 204, 208, C 63. He was later Chief Engineer of the army, prepared a plan of the defences of Oxford, and was killed by the 'tumultuating Souldiers' just before the surrender of the city. A. Wood, Fasti, II, p. 32, Athenae, II, p. 704, City of Oxford, II, p. 258, Bodleian: Wood MS. F. 44, f. 234.
- 101 Degory Collins (d. 1672), Major of Sir Ralph Dutton's foot regiment, was a veteran career soldier. The regiment normally formed part of the garrison of Oxford. C.S.P.D., 1628-9, p. 488, Addendum, 1625-49, p. 283, J. Chester, Westminster Abbey Registers, p. 178.
- 102 Wokingham, Berkshire. This and the following entries reveal that Astley sent small raiding or foraging parties to the villages around Reading.

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- 103 Twyford, Berkshire.
- 104 Reading had been supplied at first with two six-pounders and two three-pounders only, A 114. Three twelve-pounders and another six-pounder are now assigned and are here munitioned; thus strengthened, the town would be the base for Hopton's operations in the Southern counties in the coming winter. Note other deliveries from Oxford at this date, and B 197, A 124.
- 105 Sir Humphrey Forster (1595-1663), 1st Baronet, of Aldermaston, Berkshire, Sheriff of Berkshire, 1619-20, was the Royalist owner of the manor house at Aldermaston, which was now stripped of its arms and armour for the King's service. G.E.C., Baronetage, I, p. 145, Visit. Berks., 1532-1666, I, p. 208.
- 106 Sir Charles Blount (d. 1644), of Mapledurham, Oxon., Catholic and Royalist, was active in the King's service—see C 18— until accidentally killed by a sentry at the North Port, Oxford, in June 1644. The arms from his house, which, like Forster's, lay close to Reading, were also sent into the magazine there. A. Wood, City of Oxford, III, pp. 114, 245, C.C.C., p. 2245, A. H. Cooke, The Early History of Mapledurham, pp. 115-6, 209.
- 107 Weymouth had fallen to the Earl of Caernarvon in early August 1643, and Sir Anthony Ashley Cooper was appointed Governor for the King. The Ordnance Office attempted to assert its authority over the military stores there, particularly the large number of heavy iron cannon; see C 14, 17. An inventory of the ordnance in the town and in Melcombe Regis was made, 13 October, B 189, and the agent for Percy, Captain John Strachan, was sent there in November, C 26 et seq. Eight of the smaller guns were dispatched to Oxford on 30 October, by Richard March, and arrived, as this entry indicates, on 10 November. Rawl. MS.D.395, f. 214 adds the following information about them: of the King's, one bastard minion, weighing 13 cwt., one bastard minion weighing 11 cwt., 3 qtrs., and one falcon weighing 8 cwt., 1 qtr. Of Mr. William Gardner's, marked I.B., three minions, two weighing 17 cwt., 3 qtrs. and one 17 cwt., 2 qtrs. Of Mr. H. Mitchell's, one minion weighing 17 cwt., and of Capt. Geares, one minion weighing 17 cwt. The cannon in Weymouth was in part owned by the government, part by the town: Henry Mitchell and James Giear were prominent citizens and officeholders. Rawl. MS.D.395, f. 214, and Weymouth and Melcombe Regis Minute Book, 1625-1660, ed. M. Weinstock, Dorset Record Society, I, pp.4 2, 43, 50.
- 108 A further large delivery for Reading foot and the bigger siege guns in the town, from Oxford, following those of 24 October (see note 104 above), and 4 November, A 124. The warrant for this delivery is B 208; see note 254, B Section. Four days were required for the train to be floated down the Thames from Oxford to Reading.
- 109 It is not known when and where in Oxford Roger Daide, the match manufacturer, built his workshop. It may be that the tools delivered to him on 20 May 1643 were for this purpose, B 50 and note 75, B Section. This and the next delivery from the Schools, A 133, indicate no shortage of

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- match at Oxford at this time. See also A 137, for another reference to the match house.
- The powder house, here being repaired or strengthened, was a link in the chain of gunpowder manufacture at Oxford, which involved also the powder mills, B 50, and the saltpetre house, A 47 and note 31 above.
- 111 Most probably John Knightley (1611-50), of Offchurch, Warwickshire, Catholic recusant and Royalist, is here referred to. He received a warrant of Baronetcy from Charles I in July 1645, presumably for his services in munition supply. Other references to his activities are A 88 and 156. G.E.C., Baronetage, II, p. 455, III, pp. 118, 355.
- 112 The kinds of harness made by local collar-makers, and used by the train of artillery, reflected the two methods of drawing carriages at this time: the thill was the central pole or pair of shafts of a waggon, the trace the ropes, chains or leather straps which, attached to the swingletree, could be used in place of or in addition to the shafts.
- 113 Sir William Vavasour, for whom see note 49 above, had commanded in South Wales from June 1643; he led a strong Welsh force at the siege of Gloucester and took Tewkesbury and Painswick, January and March 1644. He received considerable supplies from Oxford, B 248, 264, W.O. 55.459, ff. 72, 95-7, 102-5. On 2 April, however, following Hopton's defeat at Cheriton, he and his forces were recalled to Oxford, and his train of two cannon, ordered to be sent to him only on 20 March, B 264, and munitioned on the 29th, is here returned. See his letter, C 72; Stevens, pp. 40-2.
- 114 Sir Arthur Aston (d. 1649) was a veteran career soldier and a Catholic, 'bred up in the Wars of Germany', before returning to England to fight in the Scots Wars and the civil war. He was, successively, a dragoon General, Governor of Reading and then Governor of Oxford, August 1643-December 1644; his foot regiment, referred to in February 1644 as new and lacking arms, Harl. MS. 986, f. 75, was probably that of the city of Oxford itself, which, as Governor, he nominally commanded. D.N.B., D. Lloyd, op. cit., pp. 644-5.
- prisoned for his part in presenting the Kent Petition to Parliament, April 1642. He joined the King at Oxford and raised a regiment of horse; he was wounded at Cheriton and killed at Cropredy Bridge. G.E.C., Baronetage, II, p. 96, Harl. MS. 986, f.87, Visit. Kent, 1619, pp. 223-4. The assorted 'decayed' arms Boteler deposited with the magazine here were redelivered to him on 14 May 1644, B 283, and note 326 below, presumably for some foot he also commanded.
- 116 This entry is the last in the journal of receipts at Reading magazine; the proclamation which may have prompted this collection of arms was Steele, No. 2561a: see above, p. 34. Several foot regiments had returned to Reading from the battle of Cheriton, and wished to make good their losses. That the response was not great—32 muskets, 43 pikes, 6 swords and 6 staff weapons, and 18 pieces of armour were handed in on this occasion—may be explained in part by earlier gleanings of private arms in the town, A 117 and 124, but also by reluctance to aid the Royalists:

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- see the grievances of the town, Harl. MS. 6804, ff. 182-3. The places referred to in this inventory may be traced in the contemporary plan of Civil War Reading, B.M., Add. MS. 5415, E 3, or in *Historic Towns*, ed. M. D. Lobel, I, 'Reading'.
- 117 It is not certain which of the twelve or thirteen foot regiments quartered in Reading is indicated here. Possibly Sir James Pennyman's is referred to; the officers named in the inventory may be of his or another's regiment.
- 118 The Royalist army, horse and foot, mustered on Aldbourne Chase, near Marlborough, on 10 April 1644, and was reviewed by the King. Attached to this page of the journal, and referring to this and the next entry, is a letter from William Godfrey—like Wharton a clerk to the Commissaries, March and Sherburne—to Richard Bachelor, another clerk at the Oxford magazine, explaining that these arms were taken in the town of Marlborough and were ordered by Captain Younger to be sent into the stores. Harl. MS.986, ff. 79-90, C 54.
- the King was that of Sir William St Leger; James, Duke of York, the later James II, then aged eleven, was named honorary Colonel. It lay at Marlborough at the time of the Aldbourne rendezvous, and no doubt left these unfixed weapons, needing repair, in the town, Harl. MS. 986, f. 82, and Godfrey's letter: see previous note. The regiment was being re-equipped at this time, cf. A 163 and 164, and Harl. MS. 6802, f. 169. For St Leger see note 132, A Section.
- 120 In the Grove were the workshops and forges of the craftsmen attached to the train: the wood was required, in all probability, mainly for waggon building. Oak was used for the spokes, ash for felloes, elm for wheel naves. Other entries at this date—here omitted—indicate unusual activity among the wheelwrights and carpenters. As well as this delivery 169 foot of elm board and 333 foot of ash, with dozens of felloes, axletrees and spokes, were received into the Grove, W.O. 55. 1661 [2]. This was part of the preparation for the transport of the train during the coming campaign: Essex and Waller were closing in on Oxford in mid-May.
- 121 Probably this delivery of bar iron and iron ammunition originated with Francis Walker, ironmaster, of Bouldon, Shropshire—see Introduction, p.35, n.8—and was complementary to his supply of cannon to the royal forces. Its arrival, just before Essex and Waller encircled Oxford, was reported by Luke's scouts on 13 May, some days before its formal reception into the New College magazine: carpenters were ordered to prepare boxes for the shot on the 14th, and the next day order was made for the payment of fifty carters who brought the 25 loads from Eveshamundoubtedly this supply, which weighed 12 tons (shot approx. 9 tons, bar iron 3 tons, 4 cwts., 3 qrts., 23 lbs., corrected weight) and so required 25 carts; The Letter Books of Sir Samuel Luke, ed. H. G. Tibbutt, p.652; B 283 and C 81. This was the last delivery of substance from the ironmasters of the West Midlands recorded in the Ordnance Papersalthough later deliveries are known of from other sources—and it brought the total of their supply of iron and ironwork (excluding cannon) since early 1643 to 51 tons. For other Worcester supplies see A 15, 26, 37, 88, 94 and 134; for Colonel Knightley see note 111 above.

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- 122 The evacuation of Reading, on the approach of Essex, and the razing of its defences, were completed on 18 May. Three days before, Forth, the Lord General, had reported to Secretary Nicholas that he had sent munitions from the town to Donnington Castle, Greenland House and Wallingford, and the rest to Oxford as here recorded: C.S.P.D., 1644, p. 163. Some of these, or some other supplies from Reading, loaded in a barge, were captured by Essex's forces, Dugdale, p. 67. That, despite these deductions, the Oxford convoy was considerable, reflects the earlier importance of Reading as a garrison and centre of operations for Hopton's army, and the determination, hitherto, of the King and the Council of War to maintain it. It had been heavily munitioned in the previous month, C 76, B 271, 275.
- 123 Sir Henry Radley (1590-1653), of Yarborough, Lincs., was of gentry family, and had been knighted in 1616. At this time he commanded a company of Life Guards, which had been supplied with arms in April 1644, B 273 and note 318, below. He now returned an equivalent, or, in the case of the pikes, a greater number of arms to store for repair, and so gained his acquittance. *Lincs. Pedigrees*, Vol. 3 (Harleian Soc., Vol. 52), p. 808; Shaw, *Knights*, II, p. 160.
- 124 The foot, having evacuated Reading, were quartered on the Downs and in the villages between there and Wantage. These arms were sent in for repair and replacement: Parliamentarian scouts reported that the infantry were short of arms and that supplies were being sent from Bristol, *Luke*, pp. 656-7.
- The field army abandoned Abingdon, marched through Oxford and quartered around Woodstock on 25 May, leaving these stores in their wake at the royal arsenal. The amalgamation of Hopton's original army with Forth's reinforcements and the residue of Reading and Abingdon garrisons, makes it difficult to apportion this train precisely; basically it belonged to the army of the Cheriton campaign, but probably two sixpounders were from Abingdon, B 242, 261, 288. Most of the train was removed again the same day to rejoin the army. Dugdale, p. 68, Luke, pp. 658-9, A 165 and note 133.
- The muskets are those of the foot regiment of Sir Francis Dodington (1604-70), of Dodington, Somerset. He was an active local commander, who had joined forces with Hopton in 1643, and in March 1644 had taken Wardour Castle after a long siege, during which he had been supplied from Oxford, C 25 and note 27, B 253 and note 298. An intransigent and bullying Royalist, he was excepted from pardon at the Treaty of Uxbridge, did not compound, and remained in exile until the Restoration. The Memoirs of Edmund Ludlow, ed. C. H. Firth, I, pp. 70-80, 459-60, C.Clar.S.P., I, pp. 259, 264, C.C.C., p. 2557. His will is P.C.C. Penn 58.
- Malmesbury had fallen to Edward Massey, Governor of Gloucester, on 24 May. The Royalist Governor, Colonel Henry Howard, had written to Percy earlier to plead for an engineer to improve the fortifications of the place, C 61 and note 99. These supplies from Bristol were no doubt part of an attempt to make Malmesbury more defensible. Cf. B 258 and note 303. Ludlow, I, pp. 457-8, Stevens, p. 49.

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- 128 Robert Markham (c. 1619-63), of Merton, Notts., was Captain, then Major probably in succession to William Leighton in the summer of 1643—of the King's Lifeguards of Foot. He fought at Naseby and was in Oxford at its surrender. The Guards were normally part of the garrison of Oxford. See above notes 49, 50. D.N.B., 'Gervas Markham', C.C.C., p. 1569.
- 129 Richard Hall rose from Captain to Lieutenant Colonel (by December 1644) in Hopton's Foot regiment. The regiment was incorporated into the main army at this time, and Hall was in Oxford at its surrender. This entry, like the last, shows that the army was unloading arms in need of repair while it lay close to Oxford. *Dugdale*, p. 88, *List*, 72.
- 130 Richard Gerrard (1613-86), of Bryn, Lancs., was the younger son of a Catholic Baronet, connected to the Molyneux family, and had been a soldier of fortune in the Spanish service before the Civil War. He commanded the Queen's bodyguard from the Hague to England, and was promoted in 1643 Lieutenant Colonel of her Foot Guards. This regiment, as with the King's Guards, was usually part of the Oxford garrison. See B 50, 141. List, 54, D.N.B., Visit. Lancs., 1664-5, II, p. 116.
- 131 The army, stationed around Woodstock, returned these bandoleers, no doubt, as surplus to requirements.
- 132 Sir William St Leger (c. 1615-44) was the son of the President of Munster. He served in the Irish Wars until the Cessation (September 1643), when he brought his regiment of Foot—which became the Duke of York's—to England: see note 119 above, and C 79. He was killed at Second Newbury. This entry is a further instance of the re-equipment of the regiment at this time, A 149, 163, B 254. D.N.B.
- 133 Part of this list had been entered in the journal the day before, A 164, and incompletely erased. Probably the train was returned to Oxford from Woodstock when the army regained the city on the near approach of Essex at Islip, 2 June. The King slipped out of Oxford with cavalry and some Foot on the night of 3-4 June, leaving most of his Foot, train and baggage behind. The train, as here recorded, is largely that brought in earlier, A 159, and sent out again to the King on 17 June, B 288. Walker, p. 20.
- 134 Probably a career officer, Mill was an Ensign in the Scots Wars, then Lieutenant in Sir Lewis Dyve's Foot regiment by April 1643, B 106. He was at the surrender of Pendennis in summer 1646, with Shelley's regiment. See next note.
- 135 Colonel Henry Shelley, of Sussex family, was a professional soldier who was named for the expedition to Ireland in the summer of 1642. He remained in England, however, to fight for the King, and was taken prisoner at Chichester in December 1642. His regiment was new in 1644; it was on the Western campaign thereafter, and continued in the West Country until the surrender of Pendennis in 1646. Peacock, p.69, C.C.C., pp. 339, 2370, List, 119, C.Clar.S.P., I, p. 323.
- 136 Probably Walter Slingsby (b. 1618), fourth son of Sir Guilford Slingsby, Comptroller of the Navy, is referred to. His memoir of his service with Hopton in the West is well known; as with other units of Hopton's army

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- after Cheriton his regiment was temporarily incorporated in the main army in 1644. Bellum Civile, pp. 90-103, C. Clar. S.P., I, p. 323.
- 137 Boarstall House, Buckinghamshire, eleven miles from Oxford, had been occupied and fortified by the Royalists in October 1643, as part of the defensive ring of strongholds round the city. They evacuated it in May 1644, but found the Parliamentarian garrison established there a considerable annoyance to Oxford. Colonel Henry Gage led a successful assault on the place, 11 June, with 1000 Foot and, no doubt, this mortar and train now returned to store. Sir William Campion was later made Governor, and Boarstall had an active part to play until the end of the war. Stevens, p. 47, Walker, p. 26, Dugdale, p.69, and the Campion Papers, Danny MSS, in the E. Sussex Record Office.
- 138 Godstow House, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles Northwest of Oxford, close to Wolvercote, had been a nunnery until the Dissolution and was now the possession of David Walter, prominent Oxfordshire Royalist. Like Boarstall it was fortified to protect the King's Headquarters. In the Summer of 1644 the shortage of good brass cannon forced the King to withdraw these three-pounders from Godstow and include them in his projected marching train of 17 June, for the coming campaign. But this entry shows that they were returned to store at the last moment. Cf. B 288. Dugdale, p. 79.
- 139 The walls of Rewley House, a ruined Cistercian abbey North of Hythe Bridge, were incorporated in the defences of Oxford on the Northwest side, and housed a culverin as is here indicated. Supplies from Rewley, as from Godstow, were used to replenish the arsenal, depleted after the departure of the train on 17 June 1644. Wood, City of Oxford, II, p. 290 et seq. .
- 140 Donnington Castle, close to Newbury, was garrisoned by the King's forces from September 1643, 'to command the great road through which the western trade was driven to London.' Its Governor was Colonel, later Sir, John Boys. Bullet moulds would be a useful addition to the equipment of any garrison, particularly one liable, as Donnington was, to be cut off from arms suppliers. Stevens, p. 44, Clarendon, VII § 212.
- 141 Before the King had left Oxford in June he had commissioned a group of councillors to order affairs in and around the city in his absence; they were known as the Lords Commissioners: see Introduction, above, pp. 50, 57; Black, pp. 30-1, 220. In this entry and the next the Lords authorize the transfer of stores from the Schools magazine (Strode and Wandesford) to New College.
- 142 A full account of the brothers Boncle (or Bunckley), in arms for the King, is given in Stevens, pp. 59-63. Captain Boncle was probably a brother of George and Sebastian. Cf. B 9, 212, and notes 17 and 259.
- 143 Colonel Smith cannot be certainly identified. Of the several officers of this rank and name in the army at this time, none is commander of an infantry regiment, as this entry would indicate. The 'vrgent and present occasions' were probably the supplying of the force gathered by Gage for the relief of Basing, which left Oxford on 9 September 1644. See note 145 below.

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- 144 The foundry set up at Christ Church is first referred to in the Ordnance Papers in March 1643, B 78 and 84, and note 109, where the foundryman is identified; there are several other references in 1643 to the scrap metal and other materials received there, and the brass cannon it produced, B 141, 159, 187. This entry and the previous one show that the work of the foundry continued in 1644, despite shortages, and that, as in 1643, six-pounders were preferred.
- 145 The Marquess of Winchester's large and well-fortified house at Basing, which had been a Royalist stronghold since 1643, had been supplied with munitions by the expedition led by Gage from Oxford, 9-14 September 1644. The reason for the return of this sadlery to store is not known. Walker, pp. 90-5.
- 146 After the Second Battle of Newbury, 27 October 1644, the King, harassed by the combined armies of the Parliamentarians, had deposited the greater cannon of his train, and his treasure, in Donnington Castle for safekeeping; then, meeting Rupert at Bath, had returned to Oxford on 1 November. This entry shows that in lieu of the artillery left at the castle, the four guns there were removed and brought to Oxford, together with a falcon from Prince Maurice's army. Maurice had joined his forces to those of the King in the West during the Summer. The Donnington guns recorded here may well be the four sent there from Reading in May 1644: see note 122 above, and B 210. The King led the expedition to Donnington, 9 November, which brought the artillery back to Oxford; the cannon and ammunition listed at A 182 may be part of it. Symonds, pp. 143, 148-9.
- 147 Having relieved Donnington, the King and Rupert, newly proclaimed Lord General, marched with the army from Lambourn to Marlborough on Tuesday, 12 November. From there these stores, and those in the next item, were sent back to Oxford magazine. It is noteworthy that Maurice's Western army train retained its separate identity. *Iter Carolinum*, *Luke*, p. 676.
- 148 Richard Feilding (d. 1650), occasionally styled Lord Feilding, was a kinsman of the Earl of Denbigh, and a professional soldier who had served in the Scots Wars. He was disgraced for his part in the surrender of Reading in April 1643, but reprieved; and in 1644 he had command of Hopton's Ordnance. It may have been as General of Ordnance with Maurice that he was involved in decisions, as here indicated, concerning the Prince's stores. Wood, Fasti, II, p. 77, Lloyd, Lives, p. 658, Bellum Civile, pp. 83-4, Clarendon, VII §§ 28, 39-42, 43, P.C.C. Grey 210.
- 149 Exeter had fallen to Maurice in September 1643.
- 150 Leonard Pinckney (c. 1692-67), a royal servant before the Civil War, was Commissary-General of Victuals to the Foot in the Royalist army. He arranged the taking of provisions and quarters in the army's march after the relief of Donnington, and probably as a by-product of his officers foraging while the army was at Faringdon, this amount of powder was discovered and sent to Oxford. Stevens, pp. 64-5, Harl. MS. 6802, f. 283.
- 151 Sir Bernard Astley (c. 1610-45), younger son of Sir Jacob Astley (for whom, see note 75 above), was a Major in Ireland, then Colonel of Foot in England. He was knighted at Burford, 18 June 1644. His regiment

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- was with the army settling into winter quarters in and around Cirencester at this time. D.N.B., 'Sir Jacob Astley', Add. MS. 18981, f. 342: see also B 226 and note 270.
- 152 Sir Henry Gage (1597-1645), a Catholic and a veteran of the Spanish army in the Low Countries, came to Oxford in 1644 and quickly rose to prominence. He led the party which successfully supplied Basing in September (notes 143, 145 above), and repeated this feat with 1000 Horse, each with a bag of corn tied to the saddle bows, on 21 November. This entry may not, however, refer to the Basing exploit, but to the brigade (tertia) of foot which he commanded at Oxford, where he had been recently knighted and was shortly to be appointed Governor. D.N.B., TT: E 303(6), Walker, pp. 119-20, Symonds, p. 147.
- 153 Lieutenant Colonel Richard Palmer, a veteran officer, was appointed the first Provost Marshal for Oxfordshire in early 1644, in an attempt by the King to tighten discipline in Royalist quarters. His body of horse grew to a regiment later, and took up quarters in local houses, such as Rousham, as here, and Bletchingdon. C.S.P.D., 1627-8, p. 129, Steele, No. 2530, Harl. MS. 6802, f. 44, Symonds, p. 163, Luke, pp. 156, 214, 284-5, 460, 470, 529.
- 154 Rousham House, 'a very strong house of Sir Robert Dormer's' halfway between Oxford and Banbury, served as Royalist quarters; but on the near approach of Cromwell Palmer may have been stripping the house of its lead before abandoning it. *Luke*, pp. 454, 470.
- 155 Pontoon bridges were a feature of the Civil War, and in the plans for the artillery train drawn up in January 1645 (Addendum to the Ordnance Papers, p. 428) '12 Large leather Boates, such as the Prince [Rupert] had last yeare' were ordered from the Governor of Shrewsbury. These were to be supplied with everything necessary for them to march upon fourwheeled carriages. Shrewsbury fell, however, on 22 February, and this entry, A 184 (where an overseer of the workmen attached to the train has become Bridge Master), 189 and 190 indicate that the making of the pontoons was being undertaken at Oxford. Sir Henry Slingsby recorded in his diary that the King selected 14 cannon for the coming Summer's campaign and 'caus'd 14 boats to be made for transporting his artillery over any river, & one day makes tryall upon ye river by Oxford how these boats would carry these Guns, causing two of ye biggest to be drawn over by ym.' But despite the presumed success of these trials only eight boats were included in the train when the army left Oxford on 7 May 1645. There is no evidence of their use during the Naseby campaign, and as late as June supplies for the boats were still being received by the New College magazine, A 199-201. W.O.55.1661[2], The Diary of Sir Henry Slingsby, ed. D. Parsons, p. 142, Symonds, p. 165.
- 156 This transfer of munitions from the Commissioners' stores to New College took place a little over a week before the army left Oxford.
- 157 East or Magdalen Bridge was fortified by the Royalists at an early stage—see gabions posted there, B 64—and the later presence of cannon to defend the bridge is noted in B 108, 135 etc. For Oxford defences in general see B 50, and relevant notes.

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- 158 Although this is the only reference in the Ordnance Papers to a battery there, the botanical gardens, occupying their present position opposite Magdalen College, had been part of Oxford defences since November 1642. The Spanish minion was probably the three-pounder sent to Oxford from the Earl of Newcastle in the North in May 1643, A 83; it may have been included in the train this year and its ammunition returned to store as a result; and in the following year returned to Oxford, A 205. Oxoniensia, Vol. I, pp. 161-72.
- 159 Munitions in the small cloister quadrangle of New College, the Ordnance Office magazine, were no doubt loaded onto carts there; this tumbril appears to have been left behind, by accident or design, when the rest of the train departed.
- 160 The King's army was at Daventry on 10 June. Fairfax had raised his siege of Oxford on the 5th, and the covered waggon laden with la Roche's devices may well have reached the Royalist forces in time to be captured at Naseby.
- 161 On 24 August 1645 the King's forces, mainly Horse, had entered Huntingdon after a slight resistance; these miscellaneous infantry weapons were no doubt taken in the town. Symonds, pp. 230-1.
- 162 Faringdon, Berkshire, was one of the last Royalist garrisons to surrender, in June 1646. It had housed, as evidenced by this entry, not only part of the infantry but a section of the train of artillery. Cf. note 158 above. Bodleian: Clarendon MSS. Vol. 23, No. 1796.
- 163 John Wandesford, one of the original Ordnance Commissioners, for whom see Introduction, p. 18.
- 164 The King had left Oxford on 27 April 1646 to surrender to the Scots, entrusting affairs there to the Lords Commissioners, for whom see note 141 above. The final disposition of the munitions in Oxford had no military significance: the Royalist authorities were already treating with Fairfax for the surrender of the city.
- 165 This entry and B 206 indicate that the guns in Oxford's defences were being supplied right up to the moment of final surrender, 24 June 1646.

SECTION B

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- Mountjoy Blount, 1st Earl of Newport (c. 1597-1666), illegitimate son of Lord Mountjoy, the Elizabethan General, and brother of Sir Charles Blount (for whom, see note 106, above), was a wealthy courtier who had seen military and diplomatic service overseas in the 1620s. He bought the Mastership of the Ordnance from Lord Vere of Tilbury about 1634, and made large profits from it before the civil war. 'Silly and faithless', he changed sides more than once during the war, and the King considered the Mastership vacant in 1644, when it was offered to Forth. D.N.B., C.P., G. Aylmer, The King's Servants, p. 231; and see above, pp. 16, 20 n. 4. This warrant to Newport should be viewed as an attempt to tighten up issuing procedures in the Office of Ordnance after the confusion of the Scots Wars.
- The King arrived at Bridgnorth, having left Shrewsbury, on 12 October 1642, and stayed there till the 15th. See Introduction, p. 16, for the significance of this order.
- 3 Sir John Heydon (1588-1653) had been Lieutenant General of the Ordnance since 1627, and continued in this command until the end of the civil war: see above, pp. 16-17, D.N.B. This is the first indication in the Ordnance Papers of his presence with the Royalist army, and the association with the Ordnance Commissioners.
- 4 Great Packington, Warwickshire, East of Birmingham and close to Meriden, was the King's quarters on 18 October 1642. *Iter Carolinum*.
- Prince Rupert (1619-82) had arrived in England with his younger brother Maurice in August, and was made Captain General of the Horse. D.N.B. This is the earliest warrant from the Prince in the Ordnance Papers; it indicates the items of equipment required by cavalrymen—pistol holster, spanner (for winding-up the pistol's wheellock mechanism), powder flask, and ball for pistol and carbine (the trooper's short musket). James Eastland, who signs the receipt for some of these items, was Rupert's Secretary: see also B 15, 36 etc.
- 6 The King and the Council of War decided at Edgcote on 22 October to send an infantry brigade and artillery to take Banbury, then held for Parliament, unaware that Essex's army was close by. The four biggest guns, a substantial train of munitions for cannon and for 4000 Foot are detailed for this expedition. But both sides discovered each other's presence that night, and the royal forces marched to Edgehill for the first major battle of the Civil War, 23 October 1642. Clarendon, VI §§ 80-1, Warburton, II, p. 12. Banbury was taken after the battle, on 27 October, with the train listed at B 7: there the four guns originally ordered are supplemented by three more, chosen from the seven captured at Edgehill, and the number of men required for each cannon is indicated. Several of the officers listed here and B 7 are found in C 4 and 54: for Captain Henry Younger see note 1, A Section.
- 7 Wardington lies one mile East of Cropredy. The train was probably stationed in the village before, as well as after the battle, P. Young, *Edgehill*, p. 80. This 'perfect state' of the magazine is a particularly valuable record of the army's post-Edgehill supply position, showing that the four heavy cannon were not accompanied by good field artillery of intermediate size

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(falcons, falconets and robinets are small pieces), but that seven such guns had been captured in the battle—the twelve-pounders, six-pounders and three-pounders listed. These enemy cannon had, as yet, no supply of ammunition. While the army had stocks of powder and match, there was a shortage of musket, pistol and carbine shot, which Heydon's orders to his clerks confirms. John Newport and Ralph Parker are the two Ordnance officers most in evidence before the arrival of March and Sherburne.

- 8 Edgehill, 23 October 1642.
- The King and the army entered Oxford on 29 October, and an expedition led by Rupert took Abingdon on the 31st. His train included two of the cannon captured at Edgehill. Abingdon was occupied, fortified and munitioned as one of the defensive ring of garrisons round Oxford: two culverins were stationed there, B 33, until replaced in January 1643 by two falcons, B 53 and note 84. Sir Lewis Dyve (for whom, see note 15, below) was appointed Governor of the town.
- This, the first warrant among the Ordnance Papers signed by Charles at Oxford, orders the supply of the Foot as the army was about to embark on the march to London. 17 regiments are listed, and B 10 adds one other, Northampton's Foot. Only two infantry regiments known to be with the army at this time, Stradling's and Beaumont's, are not supplied. Altogether, if B 10 is included, 2030 lbs of powder, with shot and match proportionable, were delivered; enough, if each man filled his bandoleers—see B 10—for over 4000 musketeers, the number referred to in B 17. The deliveries were made to some units while they were still in Oxford, to others on the march: six were supplied on 5 November, when the army had reached Reading: see B 12 and 13. Only those commanders and selected junior officers not already identified have been included in the notes which follow. The Lieutenant General's regiment was that of the Earl of Lindsey, now the Earl of Forth's: see notes 66 above and 26 below. The Colonel Gerrard supplied on 2 November is Charles Gerrard; on 7 November, Sir Gilbert. This list should be compared with the pay warrants for the same regiments, printed in P. Young, Edgehill, pp. 180-2.
- The King's Foot Guards were commanded by Lord Willoughby d'Eresby, the son of the Earl of Lindsey; with his father he was taken prisoner at Edgehill. For later notices of this regiment, normally part of Oxford garrison, see B 12, 35, 51, 63, 71, 99, etc.
- 12 Herbert Price (c. 1606-78), Brecon landowner, M.P. in the Long Parliament till disabled in 1643, and courtier in the Queen's household, raised this regiment in his native county. It did not remain long with the Oxford forces, however, for Price was captured at the fall of Hereford in April 1643. Keeler, The Long Parliament, p. 314, C.C.C., pp. 360, 1203-5, 2042-3, List, 108-9.
- John Savage, Earl Rivers (c.1603-54) was a Catholic peer and landowner, M.P. for Chester, 1624-5, and High Steward of Macclesfield. He recruited his Foot regiment in Cheshire and brought it to the King at Shrewsbury; it was later, under John Boys—see note 19 below—the garrison of Donnington Castle. C.P., C.C.C., pp.914-6, P. Young Edgehill, p.232.
- 14 Thomas Blagge (1613-60), of Bury St Edmunds, Suffolk, raised his Foot regiment and brought it to the King before 12 October 1642. It was the

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garrison of Wallingford—and its Colonel the Governor—from December 1642 until the end of the war. Blagge died shortly after the Restoration, and was buried in Westminster Abbey. J. Chester, Westminster Abbey Registers, p. 152, P. Young, Edgehill, pp. 181-2, 217-8, List, 13, Lloyd, Lives, p. 679: and see B 37, 101, 276, etc.

- 15 Sir Lewis Dyve (1599-1669) was of Bedfordshire family, and half-brother of Lord George Digby. He raised Horse and Foot for the King in the summer of 1642, and before the end of this year was appointed Governor of Abingdon. For his career see H. G. Tibbutt, *The Life and Letters of Sir Lewis Dyve*, Bedfordshire Hist. Record Soc., Vol. 27 (1948).
- John Belasyse (1614-89), second son of the 1st Viscount Fauconberg, was a Yorkshire Catholic, M.P. for Thirsk, 1640-2, whose regiment was among the first raised in the summer of 1642. He was created 1st Baron Belasyse in January 1645. D.N.B., Keeler, The Long Parliament, p. 104, C.C.C., pp. 966-8, 1338-9.
- 17 George Boncle or Bunckley (1616-45), of Scottish family, was servant of the household of the Prince of Wales before the Civil War. He was at this date Major to Salusbury's Welsh regiment, and later Lieutenant Colonel to Sir Arthur Aston's Horse. Knighted in January 1645, he was taken prisoner at Naseby and died in imprisonment. Stevens, pp. 59-62.
- 18 Urian Leigh (b.1600), of Adlington, Cheshire, was probably the second son of Sir Urian Leigh, and a soldier who had served in foreign parts before becoming Major to Fitton's Cheshire regiment. He was taken prisoner at Alton, Hampshire, in 1643, but was with the royal forces on the Western campaign, summer 1644. He survived the Restoration. *Visit. Cheshire*, 1663 (Harleian Soc., Vol. 93), p.63, Walker, p. 61, *List*, 47, C.C.C., pp. 893-5.
- 19 John Boys (1607-64), eldest son of Edward Boys, of Bonnington, Kent, had been a Captain in the Scots Wars: he was later Governor of Donnington Castle, and knighted for his successful defence of the place in October 1644. See above, notes 140, 146, A Section, and 13, B Section. D.N.B., Peacock, p. 77.
- 20 Bartholomew Pell (c.1598-1671) was of Lincolnshire gentry family. He rose to be Major, then Lieutenant Colonel of this regiment, and was knighted. At the Restoration he was listed as an Indigent Officer. Lincs. Pedigrees, Vol. 3 (Harleian Soc., Vol. 52), p. 770, Walker, p. 61, List, 55.
- 21 Richard Bagot (1618-45), the fourth son of Sir Harvey Bagot, of Blithfield, Staffs., was Captain in Bolle's regiment for a brief space only. He was named Governor of Lichfield by Rupert after its capture in 1643, and continued there until he died, of wounds received at Naseby, in July 1645. G. Wrottesley, 'A History of the Bagot family', Collections for a History of Staffs., W. Salt Arch. Soc., N.S., Vol. XI (1908), pp.94-109, Harl. MS. 986, f. 93.
- 22 Francis Saunders has not been certainly identified. He was, no doubt still as Major to Lord Molyneux, at Culham camp in May 1643, and at the siege of Bristol in July. Harl. MS. 6804, ff. 92-3, Warburton, II, p. 248.
- 23 The King left Oxford at the head of the army for the advance on London, 3 November 1642, and arrived at Maidenhead on the 8th. The town had

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- already been taken by Rupert and the cavalry on the 4th. *Iter Carolinum*, and Rupert's Journal, E.H.R., Vol. 13, p. 731.
- 24 The Prince with the Horse was at Egham, Surrey, before moving on to Brentford, where the Parliamentary forces were engaged on 12 November. The low-gauged musket shot and match may have been intended for dragoons accompanying Rupert.
- Henry Wentworth (b.1594) was the younger brother of the Earl of Cleveland, whose son, Thomas, Lord Wentworth,—like Cleveland himself—commanded cavalry in the civil war: see note 11, A Section, and note 322 below. Henry Wentworth was a veteran infantry officer, who had seen service on the continent and in the Scots Wars. Burke, Dormant and Extinct Peerages, p. 578, C.S.P.D., 1628-9, p. 565, 1635, p. 267, and 1639-40, pp. 532, 567, P. Young, Edgehill, p. 67. The 'present service', for which this substantial supply of munitions was required, may have been the linking up of the tertia with forces under Rupert, then at Egham, close to Old Windsor, in readiness for the advance on Brentford, One of the tertia regiments was noted at Brentford fight, 12 November. Atkyns and Gwyn, ed. P. Young and N. Tucker, pp. 46-7, Warburton, II, p. 63.
- 26 Patrick Ruthven (c.1573-1651), experienced Scottish soldier who had risen to high command in the service of Sweden before taking part in the Scots Wars—he was Governor of Edinburgh Castle in 1640—and in the civil war, where he replaced Lindsey as Commander-in-Chief of the Royalist forces after Edgehill, had been created Lord Ruthven of Ettrick in the peerage of Scotland in 1639. In March 1642 he was created Earl of Forth, and in 1644 Earl of Brentford. D.N.B., C.P.
- 27 Longford lies just to the East of Colnbrook, on the road to London. On 10 November the King and his forces had arrived at Colnbrook, and there received the Commissioners sent by Parliament to treat for peace. In the meantime Rupert, with Horse and Foot (see above, notes 24 and 25), was ordered to push on to Brentford, where part of Essex's army lay. This warrant, embodying the King's express command, is a clear indication of his intention to continue his march on London, despite the peace treaty. In a day's march the by-train could, after Longford, have reached Brentford—although not in time for Rupert's dawn attack—or Hounslow, where the King quartered on the following day. The train lacks sixpounders, ordered by Astley, and makes do with demi-culverins (nine-pounders) instead. Gardiner, Civil War, I, pp. 56-9, Iter Carolinum, Rupert's Journal, E.H.R., Vol. 13, p. 731.
- 28 Kingston, with its important bridge over the Thames, was only briefly occupied by the Royalists, in their retreat from Turnham Green, where they had faced the greatly superior forces of Parliament on 13 November. The King and the train of artillery (see next item and C 1) quartered at Oatlands, 14-18 November. The cannon, if sent, must have been quickly withdrawn on Essex's approach. The drakes of 3 lb. bullet may be the bastard falcons of the Edgehill campaign under another name; or they may include guns captured at Brentford. Shot was being cast on the march, as during the Edgehill campaign; cf. B 6.
- 29 Henry Huncks, a Devon man, was Lieutenant Colonel of the Earl of Northampton's regiment of Foot. A veteran soldier, he had been Governor

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- of Barbados, 1639-41. He was knighted in January 1643, but lost his command in May. He served later in the West and surrendered in 1646 on Exeter articles. P. Young, *Edgehill*, p.231, C.C.C., p.1283.
- 30 Eton, Bucks. The foot under Huncks—a commanded party (ie. drawn from several units)—were holding Eton no doubt to defend the bridge at Windsor. The supply ordered is generous and includes tools for entrenching. All of it may not have been sent, however: Huncks signs for a lesser amount, and on behalf of his regiment only.
- 31 Charles was at Reading from 19 to 29 November. The infantry detachments at the crossings of the Thames at Marlow and Henley, like that at Eton—see previous note—were covering the army's retreat to Reading and Oxford. For Henry Lunsford and this regiment see note 71 above.
- 32 Great Bookham, Surrey, two miles Southwest of Leatherhead. No doubt these carts and their drivers had been impressed by the army on its march to or from Turnham Green; possibly by the party sent to destroy the mills at Chilworth, near Guildford, C 1.
- 33 Edward Grey (b.1611), a younger son of Sir Ralph Grey of Chillingham, Northumberland, and half-brother of Lord Grey of Warke, raised Horse, Foot and Dragoons for the King in the North. He served throughout the war, surrendering in 1646 on Newark articles. He was rewarded at the Restoration with command in the Foot Guards. C.P., Visit. Northumb., 1615 and 1666, p. 63, Alum. Cantab., C.C.C., p. 1409, C.S.P.D., 1663-4, p.524, Dalton, Army Lists, I, p. 7, List, 60-1.
- Colonel Grey's Dragoon regiment, a small one, had fought at Edgehill. In December 1642 it was captured at Winchester. P. Young, Edgehill, p.236. The delivery to this unit was part of a general supply of the Dragoons, ordered by Aston, their Major General. On the same day Colonel Usher's received four barrels of powder, and in the following December and January his, Colonel Duncombe's and Sir Robert Howard's regiments were supplied in all with 8½ cwt. of powder, together with match and shot proportionable. W.O. 55. 423, ff. 74, 76, 216, 238-9, and W.O. 55. 457. 60, f. 32. See also B 25. Aston's warrant, and Heydon's comment, indicate laxity in the issuing procedures in the Ordnance Office: cf. B 1, and the 'Advices' of an investigating committee, Harl. MS. 6804, ff. 160-1.
- The Council of War, over which the King presided, was the main executive committee on the Royalist side in the civil war. This is the only record of the meeting of 22 November. It was copied into the Ordnance Office journals as authority for the action required: cf. B 43. The train ordered to Oxford was substantially that which had accompanied the army on the Edgehill and Turnham Green campaigns, with the exception of the two demi-cannon sent to Maidenhead (B 14), and the four three-pounders left at Reading (B 23). It was received at Oxford—at Christ Church magazine—on 25 November. On the following day part of it was ordered to return to Reading, B 29. The residue was sent to New College stores and listed there, 29 November, Add. MS. 34325, f. 5.
- 36 George Digby, 2nd Baron Digby of Sherborne (1612-77), the son of John, 1st Earl of Bristol, succeeded Falkland as Secretary of State in 1643.
- 37 Francis Leigh, 1st Baron Dunsmore (d.1653), was Captain of the Gentlemen Pensioners. He was created Earl of Chichester in 1644.

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- 38 Thomas Wriothesley, 4th Earl of Southampton (1608-67), an important and influential Privy Councillor, was named as a Commissioner for the peace negotiations of 1643 and 1645.
- 39 Arthur Capel, 1st Baron Capel (1604-49), was a wealthy 'new' peer. He was given command of Shropshire, Cheshire and North Wales in 1643.
- 40 Sir Edward Nicholas (1593-1669), Secretary of State from 1641, and Privy Councillor.
- 41 Sir John Culpepper was Chancellor of the Exchequer until February 1643: see above, note 34, A Section.
- 42 Edward Walker (1612-77), Somerset gentleman, herald, and Secretary-at-War to the King, was also Secretary to the Council of War. In 1645 he rose to be Garter King of Arms and was knighted. His papers, and the posthumously printed *Historical Discourses*, are an important record of Royalist activity.
- 43 Farnham Castle, Surrey, had been occupied by a party of Royalists led by the poet and courtier, Sir John Denham. Charles, still at Reading, now orders a Dragoon detachment to go to their aid. This reinforcement, if it arrived, was of no avail, however: Waller forced the surrender of the Castle on 26 November. Rushworth, *Historical Collections*, II, p. 92.
- Governor of Reading by commission dated 22 November 1642. A substantial store of munitions for the garrison of the town is here left under his command, and an officer for the magazine appointed. The Reading arsenal was the most important outside Oxford, and was augmented throughout the Winter of 1642-3: see 1. The artillery left for the protection of the town was less impressive, however. The four pieces and their ammunition referred to were the three-pounders and stores sent there on 22 November, 1 23. Eight other guns were sent on the 27th, B 29.
- 45 Henry Hastings (c.1609-67), second son of the 5th Earl of Huntingdon, had been named by the King Sheriff of Leicestershire in the summer of 1642. He was the county's leading Royalist, and raised Horse which he brought into the main army. By commission dated at Reading 22 November he was given command of a Dragoon regiment. He was now to return home, and is supplied with munitions for his journey. In 1643 he was made General of the Associated Counties of the East Midlands, created Lord Loughborough, and commanded his own 'flying army' from his head-quarters at Ashby de-la-Zouch. He had already distinguished himself with the King's forces on the Edgehill campaign—hence Heydon's fulsome comments on this warrant. D.N.B., H.M.C., Hastings, II, pp. 86-95.
- 46 Having ordered, on 22 November, four cannon only to remain at Reading, and the remainder of the train to return to Oxford (B 23, 24), the King and his council on the 26th, and still at Reading, reversed this decision: eight pieces, with appropriate supplies, are here assigned to the town, and two leading officers, Captain Fawcett and Master Gunner Betts, are placed in charge. Cf notes 35, 44.
- 47 George Brydges, 6th Baron Chandos of Sudeley (1620-55), owner of Sudeley Castle, Gloucestershire, although named Lord Leiutenant of the county by Parliament in 1642, joined the King and was commissioned to raise a regiment of Horse on 19 November. These munitions for the

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- regiment were delivered on the eve of its departure for the West Country. C.P., Harl. MS. 6852, f. 1.
- 48 The Foot regiments of Thomas Blagge and the Earl Rivers were quartered in Wallingford, as part of the general move into winter quarters by the army at this time, Harl. MS. 6851, f. 237. Blagge was appointed Governor; see note 14, B Section. John Boys, who signs for the munitions received, was the actual commander of Rivers' Foot; see notes 13 and 19, B Section. For Winter Graunt and transport from Oxford by water to Royalist strongholds on the Thames see p.22 and note 7, A Section.
- 49 Charles Howard, Viscount Andover (c. 1615-79), eldest son and heir of the Earl of Berkshire, and briefly M.P. for Oxford in the Long Parliament, was commissioned to raise his regiment of Horse early in October 1642. It was as yet very incomplete, and in January 1643 was only three troops strong. A list of the quarters of the army on 9 December places Andover's Horse at Islip, five miles North of Oxford, hardly the 'vttmost parts of Buckinghamshire'. Harl. MSS. 6852, f. 1, 6851, f. 237, Stevens, p. 9.
- The Foot Guards, now established as part of Oxford garrison along with Dutton's, Pennyman's and Charles Gerrard's, had been supplied previously on 31 October and 30 November 1642, B 9 and W.O. 55. 423, f. 222. One of the largest regiments, they had priority in supply: see B 63 and 71. The weekly munitioning of the garrison began in the new year, B 51, but this delivery—and one of the same date to Charles Gerrard's, 423, f.227 was for 'speciall service', no doubt Wilmot's assault on Marlborough, 5 December 1642.
- As the Royalist forces moved into winter quarters around Oxford, Rupert ordered this supply of the Horse to the East of the city. Six regiments (28 troops) were to be quartered in Oxfordshire under the Agreement made between the King and the county this month. A troop of Charles Gerrard's was allotted to Thame; whereas, on 9 December, Prince Maurice's regiment was listed at Faringdon, Berkshire. Perhaps this was why these stores were returned on 8 December. Waterstock lies between Wheatley and Thame, eight miles East of Oxford: allowance must be made in the calculation of distance, in this document and elsewhere (e.g. B 39), for seventeenth-century reckoning in old British miles of 2,428 yards. An Explanation of the Agreement, January 1643 (F. Madan, Oxford Books, II, No. 1187), P. Young, Edgehill, p. 185.
- 52 Brill, Buckinghamshire, stands on high ground ten miles Northeast of Oxford. Given a small garrison consisting of Sir Gilbert Gerrard's and Lord Molineux's Foot regiments, it became at this time part of the ring of outposts defending the city, and Gerrard was appointed chief officer there. He was further supplied in January 1643, B 61, 64. P. Young, Edgehill, p. 185, Harl. MS. 6851, f. 242.
- 53 Richard Bishop was Major of Sir Gilbert Gerrard's regiment, and continued in that position during 1643 and '44. He was Lieutenant Colonel at Worcester in 1646. B 126, Harl. MS. 6804, f. 92, Symonds, p. 13.
- 54 Richard Bachelor was a long-serving officer of the magazine, Clerk to Thomas Eastbrook, Assistant to the Commissaries, whose presence was first recorded in November 1642 (B 14) and finally in August 1645 (A 202), in the same post. He was paid, as clerk, 2/6 per day, C 4. Named as clerk

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- of the Reading magazine, he served there till the surrender of the town in April 1643: see B 14, 26, 38, 42, 45. His inventory of stores agrees with that of 24 November, B 26.
- Daniel O'Neill (c.1612-64), the elder son of Con O'Neill, was distantly related to the Earls of Tyrone. He became a courtier to Charles I, a Protestant, and a soldier in the Low Countries and in the Scots Wars. He was now Major of Rupert's Horse, quartered at Abingdon, and was shortly promoted to Lieutenant Colonel. An active Royalist in exile in the 1650s, he was substantially rewarded at the Restoration. D.N.B., Belvoir Castle, Lindsay Papers, QZ. 22, f. 43. The cavalry at Abingdon were suffering from shortages of all kinds, as O'Neill wrote to Rupert, and could supply little for Reading: B 45, Warburton, II, p. 82.
- of Arundel (1608-52), was the second but eldest surviving son of the 2nd Earl, the great patron of the arts, diplomat and courtier. He was summoned to Parliament in 1640 as Lord Mowbray, quarrelled with the Earl of Pembroke there, sided with the King in 1642, and was Governor of Arundel Castle when it was held briefly for the King in 1643. This entry is the only record of this sitting of the Council of War, one of the earliest held at Oxford: see note 35, B Section, for the Council and its instructions. Among the other Councillors the Lieutenant General is the Earl of Forth, the Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir John Culpepper.
- 57 Charles, Lord Grey of Ruthin (1612-43) signed the Declaration for the King at York, June 1642, but was not among the most wealthy and influential of the Royalist peers. He died at Oxford in June 1643.
- 58 Henry Pierrepont, Lord Newark (1607-80), succeeded his father as Earl of Kingston in 1643 and was created Marquess of Dorchester in 1645. He and six servants lodged in John Holloway's house in St. Aldate's, Oxford, in June 1643. A small man with a violent temper, he was often at odds with his fellow Councillors. Bodleian: Add. MS. D. 114, f. 24, and note 23, A Section.
- of Dartmouth, was a professional soldier who served abroad and in the Scots Wars. He was Master of the Armoury before the Civil War and after the Restoration, when he was also appointed Lieutenant of the Ordnance. He became at this time a close friend of Rupert, and like O'Neill, served in his regiment of Horse. He was promoted by the Prince thereafter, becoming Governor of Oxford in 1645.
- 60 The Council's deliberations reflect the concerns of the Royalist High Command at this stage: the reinforcing of the strongholds protecting Oxford, the improvement of the artillery train and the creation of Dragoons. Two small brass cannon are sent to Banbury, bringing the number of pieces there up to four; see B 48. Heydon and the Ordnance Commissioners are ordered to take in hand the making of short and light carbines, suitable for use on horseback by Dragoons: cf. B 73.
- 61 Major Loopworth cannot be certainly identified. Possibly the actual signature, of which this is a transcript, was that of Lockwood, an officer resident in St. Aldate's, Oxford in 1643. He may have commanded the guard for the Banbury train which met it at Woodstock.

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- 62 Thomas Shirley (b.1597), third son of Sir Thomas Shirley, of Wiston, Sussex, was, like his father, a soldier and adventurer. He was Lieutenant Colonel of Sir Lewis Dyve's Foot regiment, stationed at Abingdon, where its Colonel was Governor. Shirley, Stemmata Shirleiana. His request is an indication of the plight of the troops in the town: see note 55, B Section.
- 63 John Audley was Quartermaster to the train of artillery. In 1645 he was with Captain Fawcett in Woodstock garrison. At the Restoration he was certified an Indigent Officer; B 293, 295, C 4, 54, List, 149. He was here involved in the carrying of the train by boat to Reading and Abingdon. The supplies sent to Reading were for the twelve guns ordered there in November, B 23,29, and include materials for 'fireworks'. The Oxford magazine is emptied of all its demi-culverin and saker ammunition; but, as Bachelor had indicated, B 40, the needs of the garrison at Reading were great.
- 64 Henry Wilmot (c.1612-58), of Anglo-Irish family, was a career cavalry officer, in the service of the Dutch before the Civil War, who rose to be Commissary General of Horse in 1640 and was involved in the army plots. He was now Lieutenant General of the Royalist Horse, with his Headquarters at Abingdon. As with the order of 14 December, B 42, Oxford and Abingdon stores were to be scraped clean in order to make good the shortages at Reading. But, as B 38, 42 and 45 make clear, little remained in these magazines, and the results were disappointing. Once again Winter Graunt, the Waggon-Master-General, requisitions a boat for the transport of munitions: see note 7, A Section, B 32,37 and 45.
- 65 Sir Henry Newton, afterwards Puckering (1618-1701), younger son of Sir Adam Newton, Baronet, of Charlton, Kent, raised a troop of Horse for the King and was present at Edgehill. He now receives, by order of an Ordnance Commissioner, horseman's armour for himself. D.N.B.
- 66 Colonel Charles Gerrard.
- 67 Gerrard's regiment, along with the other Oxford garrison regiments, supplies a contingent of musketeers to make up a party of 500 'commanded men' to convoy munitions to Banbury. The New College arsenal is short of match—cf. note 64, above—but eventually the proportions listed in the receipt, p. 185, were scraped together, and successfully delivered to Banbury. On the day following, Christmas Day, the King orders shot for the four guns in the town, two of which must be the falconets sent there on 16 December, B 43. For Huncks, who signs for this ammunition, see note 29, B Section.
- 68 David Scrymgeour (d.1644), third son of the 1st Viscount Dudhope, was Adjutant General of the Horse to Rupert. His quarters were Ginge, near Wantage, at this time. In 1644 he served during the Cornish campaign, and died at Oxford in December. It is not clear what reference Rupert's authority has to the orders for the supply of Banbury. The Scots Peerage, III, pp. 313-4, Belvoir Castle, Lindsay Papers, QZ. 22, f. 43, Wood, City of Oxford, III, p. 245.
- 69 This small train of munitions for infantry was probably designed for the Foot the Marquess of Hertford was bringing from the West to Oxford. Byron's cavalry, normally quartered around Burford, met it at Woodstock and brought it to Burford, where he clashed, on I January 1643, with a

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- party of Parliamentarians. Harl. MS. 6851, f. 237, Warburton, II, pp. 90-1. And see next note.
- 70 Eynsham Ferry over the Thames is 5½ miles from Carfax, Oxford: see note 51, B Section, for seventeenth-century reckoning. It would appear, however, from Heydon's instructions, that the route North via Woodstock was the one followed; and another Ordnance Paper, not printed here, indicates that the train was received at Stow on the Wold before being taken to Burford. W.O. 55. 457. 60, f. 45.
- This is a summary, found in a journal of issues, of several separate deliveries of tools over a six-month period, the original warrants for which have in some cases survived. Where this is the case it is possible to date the delivery. The Guards, Gerrard's and Dutton's regiments were first supplied on 18 December 1642, Gerrard's and Dutton's again on the 29 and 31 December. The date of Pennyman's and Carbery's supply is not known; but see next note. The garrison soldiers were contributing to the improvement of Oxford's defences, which were under almost continuous alteration from November 1642. Most of the materials listed in this document, however, were for the use of the citizens conscripted into the works. From first to last a total of 679 shovels, 390 spades, 162 pickaxes and 48 other tools were issued in these months for work on Oxford's defences. The stock of tools in the magazine was probably somewhat smaller: these figures are of issues, and some tools would be issued out more than once. The inhabitants of Oxfordshire and Berkshire had sent into the magazine, 10 December 1642-10 January 1643, no more than 316 shovels, 262 spades and 188 pickaxes, Add. MS. 34325, ff. 1-4: and other deliveries from the stores at Oxford diminished this stock, B 64, 108. W.O. 55. 1661 [7], 457. 60, f. 44.
- Richard Vaughan, 2nd Earl of Carbery (c.1600-86), of Golden Grove, Carmarthenshire, M.P. for the county before the Civil War, raised a Foot regiment there which had arrived at Oxford and was quartered in the city by 8 January 1643: on 16 January it was supplied by the magazine with munitions, B 55. This delivery of tools was probably made at about the same time. Carbery was later the Royalist commander of Southwest Wales. Harl. MS. 6851, f. 61.
- 73 Part of the Northern line of Oxford's defences ran from St. Giles Church to Holywell, excluding at first Holywell Church and the mill, then known as Mr Napper's mill, on the Cherwell. The large number of tools for this work may have been issued about April 1643.
- 74 Sir Nicholas Crispe (c.1599-1666), wealthy City merchant, customs farmer, and M.P. for Winchelsea in the Long Parliament until expelled as monopolist in 1641, had left London in 1643 to join the King at Oxford, and raised Horse and Foot there. D.N.B., Keeler, The Long Parliament, p. 147. He was not named as one of the Commissioners for the fortifications of Oxford, May 1643, but was at this time probably responsible for the working of men from St. Peter's in the East parish. Bodleian: Add. MS. D. 114, ff. 10, 17.
- 75 Roger Daide was the match manufacturer in Oxford. He was supplied with these tools on 20 May 1643, probably in connection with the match house: see A 131, 137 and B 245.

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- 76 Charles Lloyd (c.1602-61), the son of a Montgomeryshire soldier of fortune, was a military engineer in Dutch service in the 1630s before becoming Engineer in chief and Quarter Master General to Charles I. In the royal proclamation of 8 June 1643, ordering the completion of the Oxford fortifications, he was named as Engineer in charge. These tools were supplied to him on 29 May. Bodleian: Add. MS. D. 114, f. 22.
- 77 One of the works on which Lloyd—see above note—was engaged at this time was the flooding of the meadows bordering the Thames on the Southwest side of the city. But the flow of water to the powder mills at Osney had at the same time to be maintained. Lloyd was no doubt about to cut new channels, or improve old ones, to the mills. Harl. MS. 6852, f. 82, B 100.
- 78 The massive work at St. Clement's, protecting Magdalen Bridge and entirely enclosing the parish church, was begun in April 1643; these deliveries were made on 17 and 23 June, and included tools to a carpenter for the construction of the gun platform there. By the end of June a demicannon was in position at St. Clement's. Oxoniensia, I, pp.161-72, W.O. 55. 1661 [7], B 131.
- 79 Rhys Thomas (c.1602-45), probably the fifth son of Sir William Thomas, of Aber, Caernarvonshire, and, we may assume, a soldier on the Continent before the Civil War, was at this date Major and later Colonel of the Queen's Lifeguards of Foot. He commanded a part, at least, of the regiment at Naseby and was there killed. Dict. Welsh Biog., Walker, p. 115 (recte 131), List, 128. The Queen's Guards formed part of the Oxford garrison from its arrival in July 1643, until 1646, and, as indicated here, supplied men for work on the defences. Cf. note 130, A Section, and B 141.
- 80 Captain Balis or Bayly was named as Captain of the Pioneers at 5/- a day in the lists of artillery men of this year, C 4 and 54. He commanded an establishment of 200 pioneers of the train, 69 of whom were named in the later list of personnel. Gabions or cannon baskets—see Appendix III—were made in the mills round Oxford, at Osney, Hollywell and Folly Bridge, Bodleian: Add. MS. D. 114, f 92. They were filled with earth and used in the gun positions at this time being constructed in the city defences. Previous deliveries of tools had been made to Captain Bayly on 3 and 15 May. W.O. 55. 1661 [7].
- 81 Owen Wynne, an unidentified Welshman, was variously described as the Commissary of the Draught Horses or Cannon Horses of the train, at 8/a day. In the summer of 1644 he was commissioned by the King as Waggon-Master-General of the army. B 199, C 4, 7 and 54; Stevens, pp. 15, 18, 37, 70.
- This was the first delivery to the Foot Guards of the weekly allowance to the garrison regiments for the defence of Oxford; the other regiments, Pennyman's, Charles Gerrard's and Dutton's, were supplied with equivalent amounts at the same time. Orders for some or all of the regiments—including, for a time, Carbery's, B 55—to receive their weekly allowance were continued hereafter; e.g. B 99. Most have not been reproduced in the Royalist Ordnance Papers. The powder and shot were normally put into store for the regiment, but the sentries, who kept their match alight while on

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duty, used up the week's allowance of match. W.O. 55. 423, ff. 24, 57-62, 78, 86-87, 128, 147, 182; 457. 60, ff. 50, 60-61, 67.

83 For Sir William Vavasour, Lieutenant Colonel of the Guards, see notes 49 and 113, A Section.

The magazine at Abingdon had been run down to provide stores for Reading, B 42, 46; now the two largest cannon there, sent on 1 December 1642, B 33, were to be returned to Oxford in exchange for smaller pieces. They were required for Rupert's expedition to Cirencester: see note 86, below. The shot for the culverin was recorded as returned on 10 January, A 3. On 31 January the two other guns supplied earlier were ordered to be delivered to Brill, B 61. Little remained there when, in April, the King recalled all the provisions from Abingdon, A 66. For the shortages at Abingdon, and the complaints of the officers there, see notes 55, 62 and 64, B Section.

Lord George Stuart, Seigneur d'Aubigny (1618-42), younger brother of James, Duke of Richmond, and father of Charles, the 3rd Duke, had been killed at Edgehill. He was buried with great pomp and circumstance in Christ Church Cathedral on Friday, 13 January. Brian Twyne describes how his corpse was brought from Magdalen College on a chariot draped in black velvet, accompanied by Horse and Foot. Musketeers fired 'three great voleys of shott at the enterringe of the body'. Here three of the garrison regiments receive match for this purpose; the fourth, the Guards, had been supplied the day before, W.O. 55. 457. 60, f. 50. The new regiment at Oxford, Lord Carbery's, did not take part: it was supplied on the 16th for the first time, B 55. Wood, Life and Times, I, p. 82, City of Oxford, II, p. 550.

This train was ordered for Rupert's expedition to relieve Henry Hastings, besieged at Ashby-de-la-Zouch. His force consisted of five regiments of Horse, Dragoons, and Foot drawn from the Oxford garrison: the four small field pieces were for security on the march. It left Oxford on 21 January and reached Daventry in Northamptonshire on the 24th, before the Prince learnt that the siege had been lifted. He altered his purpose and decided to attack Cirencester in Gloucestershire, which he had-with the Marquess of Hertford-attempted earlier in the month. The Parliamentarian garrison there was an obstacle to Royalist communications with the Severn Valley and South Wales, and the extension of Royalist quarters Westward from Oxford. Rupert's force reached Northleach on 1 February, where he received reinforcements from Oxford, including a train, despatched from New College magazine on 29 January, consisting of a mortar, the two culverins, with 60 shot, previously withdrawn from Abingdon, and 212 entrenching tools—cannon and materials suitable for a siege. With the aid of these, and la Roche and his explosives, Rupert, Maurice and Caernarvon stormed Cirencester on 2 February, and took five cannon, 1200 muskets and 14 colours, as well as 1100 prisoners. W.O. 55. 423, ff, 104-5; A Particular Relation of the Action before Cyrencester, 1642[3], A Relation of the Taking of Cicester, 1642[3]; Rupert's Journal, E.H.R., Vol. 13, p. 732.

87 For these cannon see note 44, A Section.

John Ashburnham (1603-71), the long-standing court favourite of Charles I, was now also Treasurer-at-War and Councillor of War at Oxford. He was able to transmit the orders of the King, as here, directly to the Ordnance Office. His hasty note, which can be dated 27 January, reflects the change of

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plan made by Rupert; the Prince required siege materials, such as petards, and could best be intercepted on his march to Cirencester by sending them via Burford, as noted here. Possibly la Roche accompanied the petards: he was at the siege but is not named in either of the major trains involved. Cf. note 86, above.

- 89 For Sir Brian Palmes (1599-1654), the Ordnance Commissioner, see above, p. 17 and B 85. Pennyman, Governor of Oxford and Colonel of one of the regiments stationed there, had received ammunition on 2 December, a day or so before Foot was drawn from the garrison to join Wilmot's assault on Marlborough. He may have received part of the arms referred to at the same time. W.O. 55. 457. 60, f. 24.
- Two of the smallest guns in the Royalist armoury—robinets are three-quarter-pounders—were posted on South or Folly Bridge, and here receive materials for making grape shot. The Southern line of Oxford's defences was wholly unimproved at this time, and the Royalists apparently relied on these miniature cannon and the natural barrier of the Thames until work could be started in the Spring of 1643. Cf. B 89, 100, 108, and note 77, B Section.
- 91 Edmund Peirce (d.1667), a young London lawyer who had been imprisoned by Parliament in 1642, now served in the King's Horse Guards at Oxford. Later in 1643 he raised his own regiment of Horse at his own charge, fought in the campaigns of that year and the next, was wounded, and became Advocate General to the army. Grantees of Arms (Harleian Soc., Vol. 66), p. 195, C.S.P.D., 1660-1, p. 11, List, 105, C.C.C., p. 1566.
- 92 For Sir George Strode (1583-1663), one of the two principal Ordnance Commissioners and the later gunpowder monopolist, see above, pp. 17-19, 29-32.
- 93 Cannon commonly bore on their barrels the emblems, inscriptions or other marks of their owners. The *fleur de lis* on this falcon no doubt indicates its French origin.
- The garrison of Brill consisted of the Foot regiments of Sir Gilbert Gerrard and Lord Molyneux: but, confusingly, it seems likely that at least a detachment of Charles Gerrard's regiment from Oxford was also quartered there at this time, and that the Colonel signs this receipt. Brill, attacked by a party of Buckinghamshire Parliamentarians under Colonel Arthur Goodwin on 27 January, was supplied by New College magazine on 23 and 27 January, as well as with these guns from Abingdon. W.O. 55. 423, ff. 91, 98, 102; notes 52, 84 and 97, B Section.
- 95 Conyers Griffin, later Colonel of Foot in the West Country, and Governor of Longford House, Wiltshire, was the signatory. Walker, p. 106, Bellum Civile, p. 64.
- 96 The work at St. Clement's was to be begun in April 1643. In the meantime Magdalen Bridge, like Folly Bridge, was protected only by its 'parting arch' (drawbridge), and a gun emplacement with these temporary parapets. Cf. B 50, 108, 135, and notes 78 and 90, B Section; O.C.A., p.419.
- 97 B 61, where one cart, six carters, and eleven horses were used to draw the two pieces to Brill. The tools, from the stock at Oxford recently accumulated, were no doubt required to improve or repair the fortifications at Brill after the assault of 27 January. Shovels, spades and pickaxes were normally

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- issued in the proportion of 2:1:1, and Heydon assumes Astley has made a mistake in reversing these proportions. The final delivery indicates a shortage of shovels and gabions at Oxford. See notes 71 and 94, B Section.
- 98 Sir Edward Sydenham (d.1675), of Giddy Hall, Essex, was Knight Marshal, an officer of the palace court, and had been knighted in November 1642 at Reading. He here receives powder and ammunition for the personal use of the King and Prince of Wales, as well as the palace guard at Christ Church. The royal children at Oxford were given some training in weapons of war: see B 260. Shaw, Knights, II, p. 215, C.C.C., p. 1257, C.S.P.D., 1660-1, pp. 17, 89, 137, Will P.C.C. Dycer 131.
- 99 Deddington lies five miles South of Banbury, 15 North of Oxford. Colonel Joseph Wagstaffe, for whom see note 53, A Section, no doubt commanded a regiment of Foot there. Astley's warrant is not acted upon for ten days, possibly, as Heydon's note indicates, because of the continuing shortage of match in the magazine.
- 100 Bernard de Gomme (1620-85), Walloon military engineer, served in the wars of the Low Countries, until in 1642, like la Roche, he came to England, probably in the entourage of Prince Rupert: see above, p. 27. He advised on the fortification of Royalist strongholds, and drew up plans for Oxford and Liverpool. These, and his sketch maps of several battles in the Civil War, are of great value to the historian. At the Restoration he was appointed Chief Engineer, and knighted. D.N.B. He is now raising a company of Foot in the regiment of Colonel Thomas Blagge, part of the garrison of Wallingford, where Blagge was Governor. The company is in the town and further supplied, 21 April 1643, B 101.
- nen unarmed, B 63. Now, with a recruit of 112 men, there were 322 without arms. The repair of muskets and the production of pikes locally was only now getting under way. By November 1643, according to the journals of the Ordnance Office, over 2000 long pikes were received into store. But the shortage of firearms continued, in spite of the calls to Oxford citizens, and when the Guards were supplied, up to two months after Astley's warrant, it was in the proportion of two pikes to one musket, the reverse of the optimum ratio. See above, p. 54; notes 6 and 16, A Section; B 73; and Add. MS. 34325. For Markham and Leighton see notes 128 and 59, A Section.
- 102 These 140 muskets had been handed in from Lord Wentworth's Dragoon regiment on 16 February, A 14. They are here distributed to local craftsmen for repair. The cost of their work when completed was calculated on 24 March to be £19. 10. 0, B 88. See note 11, A Section, note 115, B Section.
- 103 The service was probably the occupation of Malmesbury, where Bampfield, according to his own account, became Governor: see note 41, A Section. In April the arms of the town were returned to Oxford, A 64. For further Western service by Bampfield see B 112.
- 104 William, 6th Baron Paget (1609-78), was a lukewarm Royalist, but, as a Staffordshire peer, kept in touch with Hastings at Ashby-de-la-Zouch, and, as this item indicates, acted on his behalf at Oxford. H.M.C., *Hastings*, II, pp. 94-5, 107.

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- 105 New College magazine received staves and heads separately, and employed local craftsmen such as Goulbron to assemble them. The Ordnance Papers record that he fitted 219 pikes and 50 brown bills in February and March. W.O. 55. 1661 [18], and note 6, A Section.
- 106 John Morley, Major of Wentworth's Dragoons, rose to be Lieutenant Colonel of the regiment, and Deputy Governor of Winchester after its capture at the end of 1643. This—very minor—delivery is one among several to the regiment at Oxford at this time: cf. A 14, B 73, 78, 88, W.O. 55, 423, ff. 140^a, 153.
- 107 The expedition which had in fact set out to relieve Ashby-de-la-Zouch on 21 January: see note 86, B Section. The lack of match at Oxford had left Rupert's train six cwt. short—B 56—and forced him to borrow from Banbury en route. Despite the order of the Council of War the restitution could not be completed until 21 April—a further indication of the continuing scarcity of match. For the general significance of this document see above, Introduction, p. 48.
- 108 Sir John Tyrringham of Tyrringham, Bucks., was knighted at Colnbrook on 12 November 1642, but does not appear to have raised troops for the King. He no doubt required this small amount of powder for his own use. Shaw, Knights, II, p. 215.
- 109 This is the earliest reference to the foundry at Christ Church, for which see above, Introduction, pp. 27-8. Hugh Richardson, described as the Founderer or the Brass Founder, was no doubt an associate of Mr. Lanyon, the Oxford Gunfounder. He had been one of John Browne's foundrymen before the Civil War. C.S.P.D., 1644-5, p. 619, 1645-7, p.27. See note 144, A Section, B 84, 141, 159, 187.
- Ito The original line of defence on the North side of Oxford bordered St. John's College gardens, and mounds in this area are recorded by Loggan (1674) and others. Shovels had been issued for this work in December 1642, and Luke's scouts commented on the strength of the Northern line at this time. 'Cartrushes' are cartouches. W.O. 55. 457. 60, f.44, Luke, ed. Philip, I, pp. 34-5. See also note 73, B Section, B 145, 182.
- 111 This warrant, and other Ordnance Papers not printed here, refer to an abortive attack on Aylesbury, 19-22 March, led by Rupert, the Foot commanded by Pennyman. In addition to the ammunition, listed here, for the Foot, a train of two pieces, a saker and a falcon, was supplied by the magazine. Nothing was accomplished and the stores were returned on 22 March, except for the expenditure of nine saker shot and three cwt. of ammunition issued to the infantry—enough for 600 musketeers. W.O. 55. 423, ff. 171-3, 181, Warburton, II, p. 142, Rupert's Journal, E.H.R., Vol. 13, p. 732, Luke, ed. Philip, I, p. 39.
- 112 Colonel Richard Herbert (for whom see note 65, A Section) brought his Foot regiment to Oxford at this time: this is the earliest reference to it in the city. Parliamentarian scouts claimed that Welsh reinforcements arriving at Oxford were largely unarmed, except for Welsh hooks (see Appendix III), but, although a few of these are referred to, A 92, the regiment apparently possessed 80-100 firearms, and lacked only bandoleers and munitions. New College magazine, however, was able to supply only part of its needs. Luke, ed. Philip, I, p. 37.

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- 113 Cirencester had been taken by Rupert on 2 February, and garrisoned under the command of Colonel John Innes. It had been supplied previously, B 66, and was reinforced later, B 87, 91. This supply, except for the shot, was signed for by Innes on 20 March, W.O. 55. 423, f. 169: the saker shot, noted here as expected from Worcester, arrived at Oxford on 25 and was received at Cirencester on 28 March, A 26, B 91.
- 114 For la Roche and his work see Introduction, pp.32-3. Brimstone or sulphur was one of the ingredients in gunpowder, and la Roche received supplies of the other two, charcoal and saltpetre, on 29 March, B 94.
- 115 See A 14, and note 11, A Section, B 73, 78, and note 102, B Section, for earlier reference to this work. Gunsticks (1 d. each) are ramrods for the muskets. £26.6.0 is the correct total for the repairs undertaken, and it is not clear why this figure was altered.
- for priming the cannon. This delivery reveals again (cf. notes 90 and 110, B Section) that at this time the artillery in Oxford defences were mainly small, and were supplied largely with case-shot (anti-personnel ammunition). As much of Christ Church meadow was soon to be flooded for defence, it is likely that the gun emplacement in 'ye meddowe' was situated close to the East Bridge and Physic Garden: see W.O. 55. 423, f. 162, B 50, 92, and note 77, B Section. That South Bridge was protected is known from B 59.
- 117 Sir Humphrey Bennett (c. 1605-c.1667), of Shalden, Hampshire, the third son of a London Alderman and related to the Earl of Arlington, was commissioned to raise this Horse regiment in March. This is the first reference to it. Bennett served as Brigadier in Hopton's army in the Southern counties in 1643-44. Black, p.22, List, 10, Symonds, p. 50, Harl. MS. 986, f.89.
- 118 Wall, the original Lieutenant Colonel of Bennett's Horse, was killed at Lansdown, July 1643. Atkyns and Gwyn, ed. P. Young and N. Tucker, p.19.
- 119 The arrival of shot from Worcester—see note 113 above—the threat to Cirencester from Waller and the consequent presence there of Rupert on 25 March may have prompted this express order for immediate action only three days after substantial supplies had been sent to Cirencester, B 87. As in an earlier warrant, transmitting an urgent royal command, B 56, the closeness of Ashburnham to the King is apparent in this note. Cirencester was evacuated on 22 April and its stores returned to Oxford, A 38.
- This was the train to accompany Rupert's expedition to Lichfield. Sir John Gell had captured the Cathedral and Close on 4 March, and the death of Northampton at Hopton Heath on the 19th had further straitened Royalist activity in the Midlands. Rupert, with a mainly cavalry force designed for rapid marches (no heavy siege guns in this train, and his Foot probably mounted), left Oxford on 29 March to recover the position and help secure a passage for the Queen, her army and the vital supplies from the North. He took Birmingham by assault on 3 April, arrived at Lichfield on the 8th, and stormed the Close on 21 April. The Prince was then recalled to aid in the Reading expedition, and his augmented train was returned to New College store on 26 April: A 67, 68 and note 43, A Section. Rupert's two three-pounders were those of the Marquess of Hertford: see note 44, A

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Section. It is noteworthy that the gunners for the train are armed with poleaxes: a large number of these had been produced for the magazine by an Oxford locksmith, James Bull, Add. MS. 34325.

- 121 Iffley, a mile or so beyond Oxford's walls, was a convenient village in which to stable draught animals for the use of the garrison.
- 122 Tewkesbury garrison was threatened by the activities of Waller in Gloucestershire, and after the battle of Little Dean, between the forces of Waller and Maurice, it fell to a party from Gloucester, 12 April. The stock of match at Oxford was now apparently greater than hitherto: a double proportion is asked for, and sent.
- 123 Lucius Carey, 2nd Viscount Falkland (c. 1610-43), Secretary of State to Charles I since January 1642, was killed at First Newbury, September 1643.
- 124 Reading had been supplied several times during the winter—see B 20, 23, 26, 29 and relevant notes—but according to Clarendon and Parliamentarian scouts remained poorly provisioned. The King and Council of War debated whether to evacuate the town, but this delivery would appear to demonstrate their continuing support for the garrison there, before Essex opened his campaign on 13 April. Colonel Henry Lunsford commanded a Foot regiment in the garrison: see note 71, A Section.
- 125 The question of the authority of Sir William Pennyman, Governor of Oxford, to order the issue of munitions is discussed above, Introduction, p. 50. Charles Gerrard's regiment was one of the five in garrison, and possibly the largest: all were supplied with powder and shot on 15 April, B 99.
- 126 John Marsh, probably of the family of East Langdon, Kent, was an office-holder at Oxford, acting here as a Commissioner for the fortifying of the city, and later named as Receiver-general of the taxes levied on Oxford parishes for the defences. For the works near the powder mills at Osney see note 77, B Section. The old foundations there may well have been those of Osney Abbey, dissolved at the Reformation. C.C.C., p.2853, Bodleian: Add. MS. D. 114, ff. 10, 15, 17, 24.
- Wallingford, strongly defended by its energetic and ruthless Governor, Thomas Blagge, was the forward base for the army now in the field under the command of Forth, the Lord General. These substantial supplies, as with part of the munitions sent earlier to the army (W.O. 55. 457. 62, 15 and 16 April 1643), were transferred to Wallingford for safekeeping. Forth was to be advised of their arrival. After the return of the King's forces to Oxford the garrison was supplied, by boat, with stores for its own use, B 107.
- 128 For Bernard de Gomme and his company see note 100, B Section.
- 129 This is the first recorded delivery of arms to the newly raised regiment of Marmaduke Rawdon, for whom see note 59, A Section. It is also the earliest instance of a commander contracting with the Office of Ordnance to return arms received, or pay for them himself. A system of indenture similar to this was in operation in the following year: see B 243, 244, 254, 263, 273, etc.
- 130 Thomas Johnson (d. 1644), London botanist and apothecary, according to Wood 'the best herbalist of his age in England', had joined the King at Oxford in 1642. He was Major of Rawdon's Foot by August 1643, when it

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- formed part of the garrison of Basing, and was its Leiutenant Colonel when he died there following a skirmish in September 1644. D.N.B., Harl. MS. 986, f. 91, W.O. 55. 459, f. 363.
- The train taken by the King for the relief of Reading. The small amount of munition for the infantry reflects the fact that supplies had already been sent to the army in the field and deposited in Wallingford—see note 127 above. As listed here, the train is one of the largest recorded in the Ordnance Papers: 50 carts and 347 horses (corrected total) were needed if all the cannon were included—virtually all the transport available to the magazine; and no provision is made in this list for the carrying of the Foot munition, which would require, it might be estimated, a further six carts and 30 horses. But several of the smaller guns were left behind, and possibly part of the rest of the train: the listing of materials is unspecific and conventional, and may be theoretical. The inclusion of six cartloads of tents (some three tons of canvas) in the train reveals the intention of the army, unusual in the Civil War, to camp in the field. In spite of the King's march to Caversham Bridge Reading was surrendered, and the train, significantly altered, was returned to store on 29 April, A 71, and note 48, A Section.
- 132 Wooden uprights for use in marshy ground.
- 133 Sir Lewis Kirke (c. 1588-1663), of London and Bridgnorth, Shropshire, was a member of a family well-known in the Canada trade, which aided in the first English conquests there. He was now acting as Governor of Oxford in the brief absence of Pennyman on the Reading expedition. For this purpose he had been knighted by the King the day before this warrant gave him power to order supplies for the garrison. Kirke was later Governor of Bridgnorth, B 270. Visit. London, 1633-5, II (Harleian Soc., Vol. 17), p. 33, Grantees of Arms (Harleian Soc., Vol. 66), p. 145, Shaw, Knights, II, p. 215, C.C.C., p. 1596, Will, P.C.C. Juxon 121.
- 134 Edward Littleton, 1st Baron Littleton (1589-1645), Lord Keeper since 1641, was named, with the other councillors authorising this warrant, one of the Lords Commissioners for the safeguarding of Oxford in the King's absence: see above, Introduction, p. 50, 57, A 175, 206, 207 and relevant notes; and Black, pp. 30-1. Littleton was later to raise a regiment of lawyers for the garrison, B 286.
- 135 Edward Sackville, 4th Earl of Dorset (1590-1652), Privy Councillor.
- 136 John Digby, 1st Earl of Bristol (1580-1653), diplomat, father of George Digby.
- 137 Sir Richard Willys (c. 1616-90), of Cambridgeshire family, had been knighted at Shrewsbury in 1642 and commissioned to raise a regiment of Horse in February 1643. He here receives a contribution to the arming of his troops from Hyde. Willys was appointed to convoy a train to Worcester in May, B 116, was captured at Ellesmere in early 1644, and was later Governor of Newark, 1645. Believed, correctly, to have been a correspondent of Thurloe in the 1650s, he did not find favour with the Royalists at the Restoration. G.E.C., Baronetage, II, pp. 234-5, Shaw, Knights, II, p. 214, Black, p. 3, Will, P. C. C. Dyke 163, D. Underdown, 'Sir Richard Willys and Secretary Thurloe', E.H.R., Vol. 69.

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- 138 The camp at Culham was begun on 1 May 1643: see note 63, A Section. The major part of the Royalist infantry—estimated at 6000 strong by Graunt—was settled there after the loss of Reading. The first need was for tools for entrenching, and two cartloads are here delivered to Charles Lloyd, the King's Chief Engineer. 239 more tools were sent to the camp by 13 May, having been scraped together by the Ordnance Office from various sources, including Banbury; W.O. 55. 459, ff. 131-5, B 109. Then followed four small cannon (two from Oxford defences, two from the artillery park) and munitions for the troops in seven carts; carts and their drivers listed on p. 224.
- 139 William Villiers, 2nd Viscount Grandison (1614-43), nephew of the great Duke of Buckingham and father of Barbara, Duchess of Cleveland, had begun the war with a regiment of Horse, but was now Colonel General of the Foot. He and Colonel Wentworth appear to have commanded the infantry in the camp; see B 122. Dyve was the Governor of nearby Abingdon. Grandison led the Foot at the storming of Bristol in July, was there wounded and died at Oxford in September 1643. C.P., Warburton, II, pp. 75, 237-49.
- 140 A clerical error, in the transcription of the signature, for Captain Henry Younger.
- 141 Pattison was one of the twelve Gentlemen of the Ordnance which the establishment of the Ordnance Office at this date allowed for. He was named as a deserter in 1644. C 4, 54.
- 142 William Compton (1625-63), younger brother of James, 3rd Earl of Northampton, shared in the command of Banbury. He was knighted in December of this year, did well in the 1644 siege of Banbury, and at the Restoration was Master of the Ordnance. New College magazine was repaying, with interest, the supplies borrowed from Banbury for the army in April, A 61, 67. Before the arrival of this train it was thought the garrison had only 16 barrels of powder left, B 111. The six-pounder, here supplied, noted as 'newly taken' in B 111, was that captured by Northampton in a skirmish at Middleton Cheney on 6 May, Warburton, II, p.186. Major Greene, who is to convoy the train, had recently replaced Henry Huncks as Deputy Governor of Banbury; see notes 45, A Section, and 29, B Section.
- 143 Bullen Reymes (1613-72), of Overstrand, Norfolk, diplomat and courtier, here receives armour as a cavalry officer with Wilmot. He later served in the West as a Colonel of Foot. H. Kaufman, *Conscientious Cavalier*, is a life of Reymes.
- This important review of the stores is the first recorded since that of 25 October 1642, B 6. A further view was taken on 22 May 1643, upon the appointment of Percy as General of the Ordnance, B 118, and note 157. The 'present state' of the Oxford magazine, as revealed in this inventory, is generally satisfactory, with one important exception. The heavy guns brought to Oxford after Edgehill had been preserved throughout the first winter of the war; iron ammunition from the Midlands and North had begun to arrive, and more was shortly to be received (A 26, 37, 83 and 88, and relevant notes); the shortage of match had been remedied; staff weapons were in plentiful supply; and the withdrawal of outlying garrisons

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- and their stores in April compensated somewhat for the loss of Reading: see note 41, A Section, and references there. But the stock of powder was very low; only 57 barrels are recorded, and the stocks in other garrisons are equally meagre. Oxford production was inadequate, and the Northern train of 16 May, which included 136 barrels of powder, was much needed: it more than trebled the magazine's stocks; see note 3, A Section, and A 83.
- 145 A force was being gathered under the command of Hertford and Maurice to join hands with Hopton, advancing from the West. One twelve-pounder and 40 shot, the two minions with 100 shot, and a mortar, all listed here, were assigned to this expedition. Bampfield took the minions about 10 May, B 112, and Maurice the remainder a week later, B 115.
- 146 The officers of the magazine had difficulty in deciding how to total the cannon in their charge. In all 43 are listed, if the 15 in garrisons are included, but other totals may be obtained. Only 32 field carriages were being prepared. The number of guns listed in outlying garrisons agrees with other sources and known deliveries from Oxford. The two bastard cannon were brought by Rupert from Lichfield, the four iron sakers from Cirencester and Malmesbury, A 67, 38 and 64.
- 147 For these guns and their fate see above, p.28.
- 148 The history of these two guns has been traced in notes 44, A Section, 120 and 145, B Section. To convoy the train Colonel Bampfield's regiment of Foot, only 250 strong, was sent ahead of Hertford and Maurice. Warburton, II, p. 189.
- 149 On 6 May 1643 Washington had handed in a number of muskets and musket parts for repair, and on the 11th a conductor of the train had brought 36 broken muskets from Banbury for Washington's regiment, A 77,80. Out of this stock Bastian was to receive 40, and in return supply the regiment with good arms. Washington received his muskets on 16 June. A 77, 80, B 127, and relevant notes.
- 150 Henry Huddleston (d.1666), of Sawston Hall, Cambridgeshire, was Lieutenant Colonel of Washington's Dragoons. Will, P.C.C. Mico 78.
- 151 For Byron and Wentworth's raid, and the return of these munitions, see A 84 and note 55, A Section.
- 152 Hertford and Maurice set out with this train from Oxford on 19 May: see above, notes 145, 148. That some siege work was contemplated is indicated by the presence of a mortar, and Mr Henrick, the Petardier, with his devices, selected in consultation with la Roche.
- 153 Pennyman's authority to order supplies had been queried more than once: see above, p. 50, B 98 and W.O. 55. 459, ff. 110-1. 40 musketeers from the garrison are assigned to convoy Hertford's train to Faringdon on the way to Chard and the meeting with Hopton.
- This is the earliest indication in the Ordnance Papers that Oxford was supplying Worcester with powder and match in return for the many waggonloads of iron sent from the Midlands. For the first time Oxford magazine was in a position to spare some part of its stores, particularly after the arrival of the Northern train of 16 May: see note 144, B Section. For Sir Richard Willys, who convoyed the train, see note 137, B Section; for Sir

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William Russell, the Governor of Worcester, who received it, see note 14, A Section.

- The bulk of the Royalist Foot was camped near Culham, and the indenture printed here records the 15 regiments present, company by company. The commanders have, except for Stradling, next note, already been identified at A 92 and 93. The camp had been supplied earlier with tools and ammunition, B 108. Following the complaints of the officers there and the arrival of more arms at Oxford—see above, pp. 54-5, A 83—250 muskets and bandoleers were sent, in addition to the pikes and bills distributed generally, to seven of the regiments, almost certainly those which had lost arms at the surrender of Reading. Further deliveries were made to the camp, B 122. The brown bills noted as sent in four carts do not appear in the indenture.
- 156 This was the regiment Sir Edward Stradling (1601-44), 2nd Baronet, of St Donat's, Glamorgan, had raised in South Wales at the start of the war, and had led at Edgehill. There Stradling had been captured, and the regiment at this time was commanded by John Stradling, his kinsman. Released from Warwick Castle in May, Stradling died at Oxford in June 1644. D.N.B., 'John Stradling', G.E.C., Baronetage, I, pp. 6-7, D. Welsh Biog.
- 157 The inventory which follows was no doubt ordered by Percy to be compiled when he took office as General of the Ordnance; his signature appears here for the first time on an Ordnance Paper. It is a theoretical computation of the supplies and transport required for the marching train of 10 pieces. and—unlike B 111—excludes cannon permanently in Oxford defences or in other garrisons. It omits the small arms listed previously, but includes the officers of the train. Reference should be made to another 'Present State' of the stores, compiled on 22 may, not reproduced in the Ordnance Papers. It provides an opportunity to trace the incomings and outgoings of the magazine since the previous inventory of 8 May, B 111. With the removal of the trains for the West in mid-May (B 112, 115), the magazine is reduced exactly as indicated in B III: otherwise the cannon, brass and iron, and mortars, the round shot and grenade supplies, remain the same. The stocks of other ammunition, weapons and equipment differ, but not significantly. The amount of powder (129 barrells), match ($9\frac{1}{9}$ tons) and musket shot ($5\frac{3}{8}$ tons), and the number of muskets and bandoleers, has increased, reflecting new supplies received, A 83, and issues made, B 112-6, etc. 122 carts, etc. are listed, an increase of 40 on the previous state. Altogether the inventory of 22 May indicates a healthier position in the Oxford stores than at any time previously, and the trains listed in B 118 confirm this view. Marching trains were mobilised and listed on 7 June (16 pieces) and 7 July (18 pieces). but neither was sent. W.O. 55. 459, ff. 220-5, 354-5.
- 158 Parliamentarian scouts reported that Rupert had placed two troops of Horse to guard Wheatley Bridge in May. Thomas Gardiner, who signs for the supplies received, was the elder son of Sir Thomas Gardiner, the King's Solicitor and Recorder of London. Captured at Chalgrove, imprisoned in Windsor Castle, he was released and later knighted for bringing the news of Rupert's relief of Newark. He was killed in a skirmish near Aylesbury in July 1645, and buried in Christ Church Cathedral. Luke, ed. Philip, I, p. 74, II, pp. 90-1.

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- 159 This further delivery to Worcester follows the substantial supply of 17 May, and a train of four cannon ordered on 30 May but returned the next day, after Waller was known to have withdrawn from before the city, B 116, W.O. 55.459, ff. 199-201. Thomas Pritchard, who signs for the supply, was a servant of Sir William Russell, Governor of Worcester. *Diary of Henry Townshend*, ed. J. W. Willis-Bund (Worcs. Hist. Soc., 1920), II, pp. 26, 148.
- 160 In their 'Humble Desires' to the King the officers at Culham camp in May had asked for bandoleers for their troops. 250 had been supplied in the delivery of arms of the 22nd; and on the 29th the Council of War had ordered as many powder bags as were finished to be sent. See above p. 54, B 117, W.O. 55. 459, ff. 193-5. The magazine was dependent on Oxford production; Mr Jones the Girdler for belts, local glovers for bags. From 6 June to mid-July Jones produced 1600 belts, A 91, Add. MS. 34325, and the magazine was enabled to make this delivery to the camp, along with four cartloads of munitions.
- 161 The Foot regiments of Henry Percy and Thomas Pinchbeck had been formed out of the Yorkshire infantry that accompanied Northern supply trains to Oxford, and were now assigned, like other units of the garrison, to duty in the city defences. Little is known of Colonel Pinchbeck, a London man and career soldier. He was killed at First Newbury, and his regiment passed to Sir Henry Bard: see B 292. Percy's Foot had been first supplied on 4 June; this was the first delivery to both regiments at the East Gate. Both continued to be supplied for this guard duty, at two- to three-week intervals, until 23 August: see W.O. 55. 459, ff. 206, 293, 317, 375, and B 165; Harl. MS. 986, ff. 75, 82.
- 162 Under the direction of Charles Lloyd the fortifications at Oxford were at this time in a sufficiently advanced state for cannon to be placed on the platforms prepared. The great fort at St. Clement's was now ready, and a demi-cannon stood there by 27 June, B 131. Oak and elm timber had been accumulated by the magazine in the Spring, A 16.
- 163 The Foot, which had remained short of leather equipment of this kind for some time, was now being supplied: see note 160, above. Another delivery of powder bags, a substitute for the scarcer bandoleers, had been made on 13 June, W.O. 55. 459, ff. 244-5. The infantry, which broke up from Culham camp at this time, was divided into three tertias, one led by its Colonel General, Grandison, whose Major was Richard Bishop: notes 139 and 53, B Section.
- 164 For these muskets see note 149, B Section.
- 165 Sir Arthur Aston—for whom see note 114, A Section—had recovered from the injury he received during the siege of Reading in April, and had now a command and a regiment in the cavalry under Rupert. The very light robinets (threequarter-pounders) were described as 'galloping guns'—mobile field cannon with two or three horses directly harnessed to each gun—in the order of 29 June to add a cartload of munitions to the train, W.O. 55. 459, ff. 297-8. It was assembled at Bletchingdon House, North of Oxford, for Rupert's Buckingham expedition. Having skirmished with the enemy at Padbury on 2 July the Prince, reinforced by Colonel Richard

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Herbert's Foot and munitions, B 130, marched to Stratford to join the Queen, 10 July, and convoy her to Oxford: note 74, A section.

- 166 Heydon had noted on 8 May that royal servants were to be armed, and occasional deliveries of swords and guns to the King's footmen were made. The magazine had probably a surplus of poleaxes made by Bull, the Oxford locksmith, at this time, and was able to spare some for Prince Charles's household. W.O. 55. 459, ff. 140, 546; note 120, B Section.
- 167 Robert Coningsby, of the family of Hampton Court, Herefordshire, a veteran officer, was Lieutenant Colonel of Fielding's regiment, now commanded by Astley. He died at Oxford shortly after this delivery, and was buried at St. Martin's, Carfax, on 18 July 1643. Peacock, p. 78, Wood, City of Oxford, III, p.233
- 168 Major Toby Bowes, of Harraton, Co. Durham, commanded Astley's regiment at the siege of Bristol, July 1643. P. Young, Edgehill, p. 219.
- 169 The major part of this train, designed to aid Rupert, facing Essex's forces near Buckingham, was returned to Oxford on 6 July, when the Prince decided to march North to meet the Queen. A 96 and note 74, A Section.
- 170 Nicholas Busy or Busie, described by de Gomme as 'our skilful cannoneer', was in practice though possibly not in title Master Gunner to the train at this time. He was killed at the siege of Bristol, 25 July 1643. This delivery, like B 131, was probably for the guns in Oxford defences: the demicannon was at St. Clement's. See above, p. 21, note 5; A 34, B 4, C 4; Warburton, II. p. 246.
- 171 Gervase Elwes, Major to Lord General Forth's Foot regiment, was of London family. He had been Captain in the regiment at Edgehill. Arms had been handed in for the sick men of the regiment in mid-June, A 93; this redelivery is summarised in the same document.
- This was the munitions train intended for Hopton's Cornish infantry blocked up at Devizes. It was prepared when it was thought that the Western army lay at Chippenham, and before the arrival of the Earl of Crawford's Horse, which brought some broken arms from Hopton—placed in the magazine on 10 July, A 97—and, with Colonel James Long's regiment, set out to convoy this train back to Devizes. Hopton's forces were particularly short of powder after the explosion of an ammunition waggon on 6 July. However, a party of Waller's Horse routed the convoy and seized the supplies, as noted here. See notes 76 and 77, A Section; Atkyns, p. 22; H.M.C., Portland, III, p. 113.
- 173 This train, for the relief of Devizes, was, like the last, made up before the cavalry under Hertford and Maurice arrived from the West on 11 July. Three separate orders were issued, adding to the supplies to be sent and including, finally, two six-pounders, probably those returned from Buckingham by Rupert, A 96 and B 134. Maurice and Oxford Horse under Wilmot convoyed the train as far as Roundway Down, where they met and defeated Waller on 13 July, before delivering it to Hopton's army on the 15th.
- 174 James Ley, 3rd Earl of Marlborough (1618-65); came of a legal and office-holding family with estates in Wiltshire. He was at this time General of the Ordnance in the West, and was later appointed Admiral of the King's fleet

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- at Dartmouth. D.N.B., and note 277, B Section. He received the supplies brought from Oxford with the exception of some expended at the battle, and the two six-pounders, probably returned to Oxford.
- 175 Following the defeat and dispersal of Waller's forces in the West it was agreed in Royalist counsels that Bristol and Gloucester should be reduced. For this purpose the two heaviest guns in the artillery park were selected, and ordered to join the Oxford Foot under Grandison for the march to the West. They are directed first to Abingdon, but Grandison was already on his march, and the destination is altered to Fyfield, Berkshire. A train of two twelve-pounders and two six-pounders, for the same service, has returned from Abingdon, no doubt having failed to find Grandison, the same day: it was the nucleus of the next train—see next note. W.O. 55. 459, ff. 322-4.
- 176 Two culverins are added to the four guns sent to Abingdon and returned—see above—and this enlarged train left Oxford with Rupert on 18 July for the West. It joined the two demi-cannon, sent on 15 July, for the siege of Bristol. The supply of these two trains emptied Oxford stores. 364 horses were needed to draw the eight largest cannon and one mortar, 52 cartloads of munitions and materials (26 tons), which included two tons of la Roche's devices. The firepikes brought were used very effectively during the assault. It is noteworthy that New College magazine cannot supply the full complement of powder required. The importance of these trains is further indicated by the presence of Captains Younger, Fawcett, Shebis and de Gomme, and other leading officials.
- 177 These were the eight guns ordered to be melted down—to make larger or more perfect brass pieces—by Percy on 29 July 1643, Harl. MS. 6852, f. 158. See above, pp. 27-8, and A 178 (for the pieces of Lanyon's making), B 111 and 159; for Richardson see note 109, B Section.
- 178 Conyers, Lord Darcy and Lord Conyers (1599-1689), helped raise regiments for the King in Yorkshire; his younger brothers Sir William, knighted at Berwick, June 1639, and Henry were both in arms for the King. One of these, in command of a Northern regiment of Foot now at Oxford, could be the Colonel referred to: another may be the Major in B 153. C.C.C., pp. 1002, 1694, 1880; List, 37.
- 179 Sir Thomas Blackwell, of Mansfield Woodhouse, Notts, had been knighted at Oxford in December 1642. His Foot regiment, like that of Darcy, probably came South with the Queen in July 1643; this is the first reference to it with the main army. It was now, and remained later, a small unit and is lost sight of after Summer 1644. Both Darcy's and Blackwell's regiments were preparing, with other regiments left at Oxford, to march with Forth to the West; they formed part of Darcy's tertia there. B 146, 152, 153 etc.; C.C.C., p. 1277; Shaw, II, p. 215; Symonds, p. 159; List, 12-13.
- 180 This is the earliest entry in the first of three journals recording deliveries from the magazine with the army in the field; it should be compared with the journal of receipts, A 104 and note 87, and the other 'books of deliveries,' B 157 and note 196, and B 172 and note 218. Together the journals provide an almost complete record of the activities of the marching magazine, from the siege of Bristol to First Newbury, 23 July—20 September 1643.

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Selective extracts from the deliveries journals are printed here and in ensuing items, the last being B 177. B 143 records the issues made to the army before Bristol, mainly to Belasyse's and Grandison's tertias, which were posted with the big guns, also supplied here for the preliminary bombardment of the city, opposite the line from the later Royal Fort to Prior's Hill Fort, on the Northwestern side of Bristol. For Belasyse and his Major, Pell, see note 16 and 20, B Section. Warburton, II, pp. 236-64.

- 181 Bristol was taken by storm on 26 July, and this inventory of cannon in the city, made by Fawcett two days later, was asked for by Percy on the 30th. The firepower at the command of Fiennes, the Governor of Bristol, looks impressive but was in fact slender. The great majority of the 98 guns in the defences of the city were minions or less; several were unmounted; all except four, and the new, large mortar, were iron, and other sources reveal that many of these, brought into the city by Sir Francis Popham, the Parliamentarian M.P., of Littlecote, Wilts, were small hammered pieces made by a 'country smith'. The biggest batteries were in Prior's Hill Fort and the Castle Tower or Keep. The Royalists reorganised the city defences, enlarging the redoubt on Windmill Hill to become the Royal Fort-work was started there in September—and in 1644 109 cannons were in position. Although the guns listed here were no great prize, and little powder and match was seized, the capture of Bristol was of importance for the future of Royalist arms supply; see above, pp. 37-8. The inventory begins with the cannon in the South part of the city—the Marsh, now Queen Square and proceeds clockwise round the perimeter defences, ending with the Castle in Bristol itself. Almost all the places named may be identified from Millerd's plan of the city, 1673, and the map reproduced in Archaeologia, Vol. XIV, plate 35. The redoubt by the Limekiln is the Water Fort, the anchor, on the River Avon, of the line which ran North over Brandon Hill and St. Michael's Hill to Prior's Hill, and which then turned Southeast to Lawford's Gate. The Bridge was the old Bristol Bridge over the Avon. and the defences then listed are those on the South side of the city. Tower Haratz, part of the old city wall, stood on the South bank of the Avon. A third gate, Bedminster Gate, is indicated, as well as the other entrances to Bristol from the Somerset side, Temple Gate and Redcliffe Gate. Trine Mills stood on the bank of the Avon opposite the Marsh. Warburton, II, pp. 236-64, Pythouse Papers, ed. W. A. Day, p. 56, S. Seyer, Memoirs of Bristol, II. pp. 296-406.
- 182 These deliveries at Oxford indicate that batteries to defend the North line were now operational; six cannon at St. Giles, five sakers at Holywell, where the works had recently been extended to include Napper's Mill. Harl. MS. 6802, f. 231.
- 183 Ammunition for the six heavier siege guns with the army at Bristol, another mortar, more of la Roche's devices are ordered to accompany the reinforcements of Foot which marched with Forth from Oxford to rendezvous with Rupert's forces near Gloucester on 9 August. Forth's train also carried over seven tons of infantry munitions. The Foot from Oxford were mainly Northern contingents.
- 184 Major William Gwynne has not been certainly identified.

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- 185 Sir Henry Vaughan's regiment had handed into store 9 muskets for repair on 9 June 1643, A 92. They, and five extra, are now returned, before the regiment marches out with Forth's Foot. See note 61, A Section.
- 186 The schedule to this warrant, listing the arms of sick men received in mid-June, is A 93. Over 1000 arms were handed in from the regiments then at Culham camp. As the men recovered and rejoined their units these arms were redelivered; before this warrant some 196 arms had been reissued. Now the King orders a further 600 for the recovered men who had marched to Bristol on 1 August. In fact 469 men were involved; the magazine issues only 400 arms, and a majority of those are pikes. Rendcomb and North Cerney, where the King, Rupert and Forth met with their forces, are 4-5 miles North of Cirencester. See A 92, 93, B 135 and 160, and relevant notes; Harl. MS.6852, f. 163.
- 187 This is a delivery from the marching magazine, to one of the regiments of Foot which had taken part in the capture of Bristol and was now on its way, with the army, to besiege Gloucester. Nympsfield is twelve miles South of Gloucester. This was the regiment of Sir Thomas Salusbury, the command having passed to Charles Lloyd on the death of the original Colonel. See notes 72, A Section, and 76, B Section.
- 188 Henry Jermyn (c. 1604-84), the Queen's principal follower, commanded her Foot Guards at Oxford. In September 1643 he was created Baron Jermyn, in 1660 Earl of St. Albans. D.N.B.
- This is the first sign of the control the Queen exercised over the stores she brought to Oxford from the North on 15 July 1643, A 100. Through her favourite, Jermyn, she orders the issue of part of the stock of brimstone, deposited in the New College stores, to the magazine at the Schools of Strode and Wandesford, the chief Ordnance Commissioners. Later the remainder of her brimstone was delivered to the Commissioners to manufacture gunpowder, at the instance of the Queen, B 169. The Commissioners, in return, had already begun to supply the New College stores with powder, A 99, and continued to do so. A 103, B 163, and note 79, A Section.
- 190 This delivery, ordered by Percy, in the field, as the army approached Gloucester, is of munitions for Dragoons. It is uncertain whether Sir Gilbert Gerrard, whose regiment of Foot was present, or Charles Gerrard, in command of cavalry at the siege, was the recipient.
- 191 These entries, from the journal of the marching magazine, refer to the first moves in the siege of Gloucester. On 10 August 1643 the King sent two heralds and a trumpeter to summon the city in his name; the supply of 5 cwt. of munitions to the commanded men (drawn from different regiments) shows that a large party of musketeers, perhaps over 1000, accompanied them in this task. Two of the three tertias which had taken Bristol were assembled before Gloucester: those of the Lord General Grandison, although he himself was at Oxford, mortally wounded, and Colonel Henry Wentworth. Colonel John Belasyse's tertia broke up, part remaining at Bristol. To these were added the infantry brought from Oxford by Forth, brigaded under Colonel Darcy. The small amounts issued to Colonel John Owen here and B 153 may indicate some special

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service for part of his regiment, such as the guard of the batteries. The train of cannon, supplied here, was that taken by Rupert to Bristol. The bombardment of Gloucester began on 13 August. Warburton, II, pp. 280-3, Bibliotheca Gloucestrensis, ed. J. Washbourn.

- 192 Sir Ralph Dutton commanded a new tertia, apparently composed of those units formerly in Belasyse's but not stationed at Bristol. For Dutton, see note 19, A Section. The Oxford infantry took up positions on the South and East sides of Gloucester, under Astley and Forth. Deliveries to Darcy's regiment show that it had begun its approaches to the city, in hard ground.
- 193 The King's headquarters were established at Matson House, situated on rising ground two miles Southeast of Gloucester. Percy and Secretary Falkland attended Charles there and transmitted his orders for reinforcements for the army to Heydon and Sir Edward Nicholas at Oxford. The order is completed by the next item.
- The day after the orders of 12 August were given—previous item—the mortar made by Samuel Fawcett at Reading and sent with Forth's train of 3 August broke on firing. Its immediate replacement by one of the Queen's, brought by her to Oxford on 15 July 1643, is ordered; and la Roche's ingredients for the explosive fillings for the mortar shells accompanied the ensuing train. 60 lb. grenades, fireballs and stones were fired into Gloucester. See above, p. 55; A 100, 111, B 146, 187; note 94, A section; Bibliotheca Gloucestrensis. The supply of powder with the army and at Oxford was running short: 50 cwt. is asked for, but only 5 cwt. can be sent. The document printed here is incomplete. The train of 23 carts would require 110 horses; only 25 are listed. The train was spotted on 15 August by Luke's scouts. Luke, ed. Philip, II, pp. 137, 139.
- 195 This further supply of cannon in the Oxford defences indicates that there were one culverin and four sakers at St. Giles, where six different guns had been munitioned in July, B 145, and one bastard saker at the East battery, probably that near Holywell: and that all lack ladles and other equipment. The gunner Thomas Grey had been in charge of the St. Giles cannon in July, but was later named for the battery at Gloucester Hall, B 168. The supply of the city's cannon with ladles left the magazine empty, when called upon to provide some for the guns before Gloucester, B 162.
- 196 This is the title page of the second journal of deliveries made by the magazine with the army before Gloucester; the first had begun 24 July, ended 12 August; this journal ends 31 August: see note 180, B Section. The Foot in the trenches before Gloucester are further supplied, and reinforced by a detachment from the garrison of Bristol, which included men from Rupert's and Maurice's regiments.
- 197 Samuel Sandys (1615-85), of Ombersley, Worcs., M.P. for Droitwich until disabled in 1642, was a prominent Royalist who raised three regiments for the King in his native county. One regiment of Foot accompanied the Queen to Oxford and was incorporated into the main army for the summer of 1643. Keeler, *The Long Parliament*, pp. 332-3, Warburton, II, p. 227. His Foot were supplied again, B 158, and his troop of Horse, B 164.
- 198 The orders of Percy printed here are addressed to the officers of the marching magazine. The first is in favour of the tertia brought from South

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Wales by Sir William Vavasour to block up the Northwestern side of Gloucester (Longford is a mile and a half North of the city). His Welsh tertia, consisting of five regiments, remained with the army during the siege, see B 159, 174, 177, and marched later to First Newbury. Percy's second warrant is for the supply of Sandys's Foot, which, like other Worcestershire contingents, was quartered with the Welsh. It is not clear what is the significance of the numbers noted on this document.

- 199 Theophilus Gilby (d. 1667) was a Yorkshire career soldier who left service in Brabant to serve the King, fought in Italy and Flanders in the 1650s, and after the Restoration held command in the garrison at Tangier. He was now Lieutenant Colonel of Belasyse's regiment, succeeded the Colonel to its command in the following year, was captured at Naseby and was knighted in October 1645. Other deliveries to the party of 450 men he led from Bristol had been and would be made, B 157, 164. List, 55; Peacock, p. 94; Shaw, II, 220; C.S.P.D., 1660-1, pp. 132, 216, 428; Will P.C.C. Carr 141.
- 200 This entry is not from the marching magazine journal; it records a delivery from the Oxford stores. The new cannon were probably those cast by Hugh Richardson, the Oxford Brass Founder, from the scrap metal listed on 20 July, B 141. See notes 109, and 177, B Section.
- 201 Extracts from the journal of the marching magazine are resumed. This and the following entries show further deliveries to the infantry and siege guns. As well as the Dragoons under Henry Washington, here supplied, those of Sir Robert Howard were present at the siege. The Royalists' heavy bombardment, and the constant defence of their approaches from the sorties of the besieged, reduced the magazine's stock of powder: on 17 August Percy reported to the King that 120 barrells had been expended, and only 70 remained. Cf. totals given in note 224 below. Pythouse Papers, ed. W. A. Day, p. 58; Bibliotheca Gloucestrensis.
- 202 Roger Burgess, a veteran Welsh soldier, was Lieutenant Colonel of John Owen's Foot, and succeeded to command of the regiment later. He was taken at Naseby. N. Tucker, Sir John Owen, pp. 28, 49. Owen's regiment had been singled out earlier for the guard of the battery, which lay on the South side of Gloucester: B 152, 153.
- 203 A further 20-30 men, discharged from Oxford hospitals, rejoin their regiment, that of Lloyd, formerly Salusbury's: it was among those besieging Gloucester. For this unit and sick men's arms see A 93 and note 72, A Section; B 148, 149 and notes 186, 187, B Section.
- 204 Sir Thomas Tyldesley (1596-1651), of Myerscough, Lancs., was a prominent Catholic and Royalist in the North, who raised forces for the Earl of Derby and brought Foot with the Queen to Oxford in July 1643. He was knighted in that month. He was Governor of Lichfield when the war ended, and took part in the Scots invasion of 1651, when he was killed in action. D.N.B., Stevens, pp. 45-6. His and Colonel Eure's regiments formed part of Darcy's tertia at the siege of Gloucester.
- 205 The Yorkshire regiment of Sir William Eure had, like Tyldesley's and others, arrived from the North with the Queen's forces and train in July.

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- All were supplied at Oxford on 24-25 July, B 142, W.O. 55. 458. 66, ff. 17-18. Cf. A 110 and note 93, A Section; List, 44.
- 206 Hugh Anderton, of Euxton, nr. Preston, Major of Tyldesley's Foot, was, like his Colonel, a Lancashire Catholic. He was Commissary General of Derby's forces around Wigan at the beginning of the war, Anderton Papers, Wigan Public Library; List, 130.
- 207 William Riley, the ladlemaker to the Ordnance Office, could not immediately supply ladles for the guns at Gloucester, as his stock had been issued to the cannon in Oxford defences on 14 August, B 156. He was, however, able to improvise them, within a day, from brass kettles in the magazine. Of the eight cannon in the field, six are here supplied with ladles and case shot. Cf. A 107.
- 208 John Paulet, 5th Marquess of Winchester (1598-1675), Catholic peer and landowner, fortified his great house at Basing for the King. As an important stronghold it was reinforced from Oxford at this time. Earlier in August the regiment of Marmaduke Rawdon, whose Major, as noted here, was Thomas Johnson, the London botanist, was munitioned at New College magazine and sent there: see W.O. 55. 459, ff. 363, 371; notes 59, A Section, 129 and 130, B Section. Now a train of artillery is ordered for Basing. The two short-barrelled six-pounders, and probably the three-pounder, were part of the Queen's train brought to Oxford in July, A 100. Henrietta no doubt approved of the arming of Basing, famous for both loyalty and popery. Later deliveries to the house are B 188, 218, 234; and see C 19, A 179.
- These further deliveries to the forces before Gloucester reveal the presence of Richard March and his assistant Thomas Eastbrooke with Percy at the camp; and of two iron culverins, 'at the house', extensively munitioned at this time—see A 105—and firing red-hot cannon balls. The house or the 'greate House', B 167, was probably Llanthony Priory, within artillery range on the Southwestern side of the city, and close to Forth's head-quarters. These cannon, if they can in fact be distinguished from the brass culverin brought originally from Oxford, were only temporarily with the army. They may have come with the commanded men from Bristol or from Royalist forces in the Forest of Dean; supplies were being drawn from both places in August. A 104-6, 108, 110. Bibliotheca Gloucestrensis.
- 210 In the absence of the King and the Council of War the Lords Commissioners order supplies to all regiments in Oxford garrison; those of Pennyman, Governor until his death on 22 of this month, and Charles Gerrard had long been in the city; Percy's and Pinchbeck's since June, and the Queen's since her arrival in July. Signed receipts for three of the regiments are on the verso of the warrant. Percy's and Pinchbeck's, which received extra supplies for guarding the East Gate during this period, no doubt due to Percy's influence, were drawn out of garrison for the Newbury campaign shortly after this delivery. Deliveries to the garrison were no longer made at regular weekly intervals, as they had been in the winter of 1642-3. Notes 82 and 161, B Section: W.O. 55. 459, ff. 289-90, 362, 395, 416, and warrant of Forth to Percy (Oxford, 2 August 1643), a stray Ordnance Paper now in the National Amy Museum, Chelsea.

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- 211 John or Joseph Balston was a professional soldier, who had signed for Irish service in 1642, transferred to the Parliamentarian forces in England, and then deserted to the King. By 14 June 1643 he was Major to Dyve's Foot, and was still in this post at Sherborne Castle in 1645. P. Young, *Edgehill*, p. 246. Abingdon garrison was supplied again in October, B 192. The King signed this order at Oxford, where he had gone to receive the peers who had temporarily deserted the cause of Parliament.
- 212 See note 200 above.
- 213 These deliveries are from New College stores. Further work on Oxford's defences is carried out, to which the garrison contributes. All the guns on the walls are supplied, although not all the batteries are identified. For the first time a battery near Gloucester Hall (now Worcester College) is referred to. Several of the gunners named here went with the train of artillery sent to the army, 2 September, B 171.
- These deliveries in late August and September of sulphur from the arsenal to the Commissioners' stores at the Schools follow that of 9 August, ordered by the Queen: B 150 and note 189.
- 215 Jermyn, on behalf of the Queen, writes to Aston, the newly-appointed Governor of Oxford, to supply Sir John Byron's troop of horse with a small amount of cavalry ammunition. The troop was with Colonel Thomas Morgan's Horse. For the Queen's authority over the magazine see note 189, above.
- 216 The regiment of Colonel Thomas Morgan, probably raised in Northamptonshire, was first supplied in June 1643, W.O. 55. 459, ff. 280-1, fought at Roundway Down, and was part of Byron's brigade during the summer. Morgan was killed at First Newbury, September 1643, and his regiment is lost to view shortly after. Atkyns, p. 35; Harl. MS. 6804, f. 130; TT: E 69 (10); List, 97.
- 217 New College magazine is almost entirely emptied to supply the army before Gloucester with the train ordered by Percy here and B 173. His warrants were received at Oxford by Mason, his secretary, on the morning of Sunday, 3 September. The Royalist High Command with the armyresponding to the news reaching them of Essex's approach—makes preparations for a war of movement; Percy orders Heydon to send Edward Sherburne and the best officers still at New College with almost all the field guns remaining there and materials—spare wheels and axles—to make the siege train mobile. Shortly after, the mortars were returned to Oxford, A III. Are the Queen's cannon asked for her two Dutch sakers, possibly six-pounders, A 100? Her other six-pounders had already been sent to Basing, B 163. One of the three-pounders was of Spanish origin, A 83 and B 177. Oxford magazine found it impossible to supply all the powder and any of the muskets asked for. When these ten cannon joined the eight before Gloucester the army possessed the train which it took on the campaign following the raising of the siege, employed at Newbury and returned to Oxford on 25 September, almost intact. Luke's scouts reported that the train left Oxford on 5 September; was it deliberately delayed to avoid Essex's forces passing North of Oxford two days before? Luke, ed. Philip, II, p. 147.

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- of Dean on 13 August, to begin the undermining of the defences of Gloucester between the South and East Gates of the city, but he met much resistance; his frantic letter is reproduced at C 12. Midlands miners also refused, and not till the end of August were a sufficient number of Welsh mustered to make a start; the first recorded delivery of candles is 31 August, B 167, the last 5 September, W.O. 55. 1661 [12]. In all they were supplied at the camp with 18 lbs of candles and one lantern. The mines were sunk under the East Gate, Astley's quarter, and at the Southeast corner, opposite Gaudy Green, where the Royalists had largely emptied the moat. The miners were, however, still troubled with flooding, and all the works were successfully countermined by the defenders. Gloucestershire Record Office, D 115, No. 9; Warburton, II, p. 286, n. 2; Luke, ed. Philip, II. p. 145; Bibliotheca Gloucestrensis, pp. 51, 221, 223.
- 219 Percy wrote this warrant himself—like those in B 163, 171—at the camp, no doubt on 2 September; it was received at Oxford the following day: see note 217 above. Mason prepared a more definite instruction, the second warrant printed here, in favour of the Guards to convoy the munition train ordered, which Percy signed. The resulting train, incorporating part of these demands, is B 171. The King's Guards had semi-permanent billets in St. Aldate's, Oxford, but most of the regiment, munitioned at the stores on 20 July 1643, W.O. 55. 459, f. 308, had left to join the army before Gloucester. Their Lieutenant Colonel, William Leighton, was with the batteries there on 3 September, B 172. A party remained at Oxford under Quarter master Benjamin Stone, however, to convoy this train, leaving only the sick and wounded of the regiment behind. W.O. 55. 459, f. 458, 1661 [12], Add. MS.5752, f. 213.
- 220 Vavasour's Welsh tertia had been first supplied on 14 August, B 158 and note 198: in all it received approximately ten cwt. of powder, match and shot during the siege and immediately after, less than the Oxford brigades. Vavasour was independently supplied, though with difficulty, from the Forest of Dean and South Wales. The same day his regiment of 300 Horse is also munitioned, along with Washington's Dragoons and other units. The army had raised the siege on the 5th, and was now removed to the area round Sudeley Castle. Add. MS. 18980, ff. 90, 91-2, 97, 99, 101, 106.
- 221 George Lisle (d. 1648), the soldier son of a London monopolist, served in the Netherlands and Ireland before rising to prominence as an infantry officer in the Civil War. He took over Bolle's regiment of Foot in 1644, was knighted in December 1645, and achieved posthumous fame with his execution at Colchester in 1648. D.N.B., C.S.P.D., 1619-23, p. 161, 1629-31, p. 290, 1660-1, p. 396. Further supply to Lisle's commanded party, 1200 strong, is made on 9 September, B 175, and adds four cannon for service undisclosed. Lisle's group acted as a separate detachment, with the cavalry, before Newbury, and at the battle, where Lisle was wounded, as a forlorn hope. Warburton, II, p. 289; TT: E 69 (10).
- 222 Ammunition for a troop of Horse is supplied to Lord Herbert, for whom see note 95, A Section. Herbert's 'power and purse' helped put Vavasour's tertia in the field, and he no doubt now led his Horse with the army at Sudeley Castle. He delivered shot to the army on 17 September, A 112.

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- 223 Berkeley Castle had been garrisoned for Parliament in February 1643, evacuated after the fall of Bristol and occupied by a Royalist force of 320 Foot, including some of Rupert's regiment, under the command of a Scotsman, Captain George Maxwell. The warrant for this supply to Berkeley orders the train to go via Cirencester; and probably the delivery to Crispe's Horse (next item) indicates that it was to provide the escort. The regiments of Crispe and Spencer were surprised at Cirencester on 15 September by Essex's army, and captured. Whether this train got through to the hard-pressed garrison at Berkeley is uncertain. An unsuccessful attempt was also made to supply the Castle with four demi-culverin at this time. W.O. 55.459, f. 457; Add. MS. 18980, ff. 117, 122, 131; H.M.C., V, Appendix, pp. 346-7; TT: E 70 (10); Luke, ed. Philip, II, p. 146.
- 224 The army moved North to Pershore, Worcestershire, on 12 September, to block one of Essex's escape routes. Here, as during the siege of Gloucester, the normal means of authorising deliveries was often bypassed, and Percy used his signet ring to authenticate orders. The cannon of the marching train are supplied; two six-pounders are detached to remain at Pershore, and are further munitioned on 15 September, W.O. 55. 1661 [12]. These are the final entries from the third and last of the journals of deliveries of the marching magazine reproduced in the Ordnance Papers: see note 180 above. It may be noted that, in the period covered by the journals, 23 July to 15 September 1643, some 13½ lasts of powder, and match in proportion, and 18 tons of shot for infantry and cannon, were received by the marching magazine, mainly from Oxford, but also from Bristol and the Forest of Dean: and the magazine had issued out 8 lasts of powder, 8½ tons of match, and nearly 13 tons of shot (exclusive of supplies sent to independent garrisons). Of this total of deliveries the major part of the powder and match, and half the shot, were for the Foot in the trenches before Gloucester. The six biggest guns at the siege fired 441 round shot (3 tons, 12 cwt.), as the besiegers confirmed. These figures drawn from the journals suggest that the Royalist army at Gloucester had to conserve its munitions, and adapt its tactics accordingly, as notes 194 and 201 indicate. An average daily bombardment of 17 rounds was hardly intensive enough seriously to disrupt the defence; but many casualities were caused by musket fire. When the siege was raised the King still possessed adequate stores, and with additions from Bristol, enough for the Newbury campaign. A 105, 106, 108, 110; Warburton, II, pp. 286-7; TT: E 67 (13), E 69 (15).
- 225 John Chamberlain (d. 1650) was the Catholic recusant owner of Shirburn Castle, near Watlington, Oxon. His strong moated house lay on the Eastern frontier of the Royalist quarters, but was not officially garrisoned and munitioned by Oxford. He may, however, have used Richard Chamberlain, Clerk of the Court of Wards at Oxford (and a distant relative?), to obtain these supplies for the Castle. They were returned in May, no doubt when other munitions were being called in by Oxford: see notes 41-3, A Section. His servant now receives them again, having testified, with Richard Chamberlain, before Sir Robert Heath, Chief Justice of the King's Bench, to the truth of the matter. V.C.H. Oxon., VIII, pp. 151, 179, 182, 190; C.C.C., pp. 465, 871, 1811; C.S.P.D., 1644-5, p. 185.

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- 226 Sir Walter Pye (1610-59), a prominent Herefordshire Royalist, was Lieutenant Colonel of Sir Arthur Aston's Horse in the winter of 1642-3, B 38, but was taken at the capture of Hereford in April 1643. Released in June he was now with Vavasour, who wished to make him Colonel General of Horse in his army. Hereford was once again in Royalist hands: the train with the army, having received substantial supplies from Bristol, A 110, is able to spare these stores for the town. Stevens, p. 48; Aylmer, King's Servants, p.310; Add. MS. 18980, f. 97; W.O. 55. 423, f. 15; Harl. MS. 6802, f. 230.
- 227 For Marmaduke Rawdon and his regiment, the garrison of Basing House, see note 208 and references there. The other deliveries here are to cannon in Oxford defences.
- 228 This document is discussed above, pp. 55-6. On the eve of the battle of Newbury more ammunition for the cannon and munitions for the Foot are called for. The latter had to be obtained from the Schools, as New College magazine was emptied in August: see notes 194 and 217. A comparison of the amounts now sent with the totals returned to store five days later shows that the culverins, twelve-pounders and saker with the army, were short of ammunition after the battle, and the Foot lacked powder. Most sources agree that the battle saw a heavy exchange of fire throughout a long day and many casualties on both sides; and that the Royalists did not have enough munitions left for another encounter of equal intensity the next day.
- 220 Foot regiments borrowed for the Newbury campaign were now returning home after the battle, each with five cwt. of powder supplied by New College magazine. Sir Michael Woodhouse (d. 1652), a professional soldier who had served in Ireland before becoming Sergeant Major General to Lord Capel's Midlands army by April 1643, had joined the 10yal army just before Newbury with his large regiment, the Prince of Wales's Foot. He was knighted after the battle, and here given a double proportion of powder—indications of the sizeable contribution his force had made. With the regiment of Colonel Richard Herbert, the newly appointed Governor of Ludlow-for whom, see note 65, A Section-Woodhouse's Foot were marching back to Shropshire via Woodstock, Enstone and Worcester, reached on 2 October, C 16. Herbert's proportion arrived at Ludlow by 12 October. Special care is taken of Oxford transport at this time; it is obviously in short supply. Symonds, pp. 168, 248; Ottley, Vol. 7, p. 303; Shaw, Knights, II, p. 216; Pythouse Papers, p. 16.
- 230 Colonel Robert Ellis, a prominent Denbighshire Royalist with experience in the Thirty Years War, divided his time between North Wales and the Ordnance Office. He was named Controller of a train in November 1642, B 14: and in the same month was commissioned to raise Foot to guard the train of artillery at Oxford. In December he was ordered to provide the army with ammunition. He was captured at Chirk Castle in January 1643, and was taken prisoner in Cheshire in March. Released in September he was given command of Denbighshire and Flintshire. He is here instrumental in ordering the supply of the forces for Shropshire, and it was Ellis Woodhouse wrote to from Worcester, C 16. He was listed as Heydon's assistant in C 54, but was thereafter mainly involved in the

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- war in North Wales, where he helped organise the supply of munitions and designed fortifications. He died before 1661. *Dict. Welsh Biog.*; N. Tucker, *Denbighshire Officers*, pp. 40-44; Bodleian: Carte MS. 130, f. 312; Harl. MS. 6851, f. 218; Ottley, Vol. 8, pp. 206-8, 231.
- 231 Another regiment returning home receives the standard supply of ammunition from Oxford. Arthur Blayney, the younger son of the 1st Lord Blayney, was a wealthy Montgomeryshire Royalist, knighted at Oxford in November 1643 for his conduct at Beaumaris, and thereafter active in North Wales. Dict. Welsh Biog., Shaw, Knights, II, p. 216.
- 232 Hopton, recently created Baron Hopton of Stratton, was now raising, out of Bristol and several Western counties, a new army of 1500 Horse and 2000 Foot. Weymouth had been taken by the Royalists in August, and supplies from the Continent were expected there: some had already arrived. This royal warrant gave Hopton the right to sufficient muskets to arm his new levies from present and future cargoes landed there; and he appears to have received them before February 1644. C 14, 17, 59; notes 90 and 107, A Section; Harl. MS. 6804, f. 224.
- 233 On the forge in Magdalen College Grove see above, pp. 26-7, and references there.
- 234 In the strengthening of Royalist quarters following the battle of Newbury Basing House was not omitted. It had been supplied earlier, B 163 and note 208, and now the King orders three cartloads to be sent, the copyist of the warrant writing 'Oxford' for 'October'! It was not immediately acted upon, however, for Winchester wrote on 2 November for his authorised supplies, C 19. Percy then ordered the train, 5 November, but too late. Waller was before the House, and the munitions were delivered instead to Donnington Castle. W.O. 55. 459, f. 581; Stevens, p.23.
- 235 Dorchester and Weymouth both yielded, on their fall, considerable stocks of arms and munitions. As a seaport of some importance the latter had long possessed several forts, armed with corporation and government artillery: this survey, comparable to those made at Bristol and Dartmouth after their capture, B 144, 203, reveals the presence of 60 pieces, no doubt all iron, of which at least 22 were demi-culverin: Bristol had only four of this size. The main battery was at the North Fort, East of Weymouth and commanding the harbour entrance. Chapel Green was the site of the Chapel of St. Nicholas, on high ground dominating the town from the South, where a major fort was constructed in the Civil War. The Lookout and probably the Beacon were on a hill Southeast of Weymouth, overlooking the sea. Melcombe Regis lay to the North of Weymouth, connected by a drawbridge over the River Wey. The Blockhouse occupied the East side of the town, facing the sea. The cannon listed here were drawn on to supply Hopton and Oxford in November: Bellum Civile, p. 63, and A 127 and note 107, A Section. J. Hutchins, The History . . . of Dorset, 3rd edn., II, pp. 418-56.
- 236 James, Duke of York, the later James II, was ten years old on this day. Some training in firearms for the King's sons is indicated also in B 65 and 260.
- 237 This train was intended for the use of the Foot which had moved into quarters at Reading in early October. Wallingford was the staging point,

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- and the train was received at Reading magazine by Henry Sherburne, the officer there, on 24 October, A 121.
- 238 Sir Lewis Dyve—for whom see note 15, B Section—was establishing a garrison at Newport Pagnell, as part of the expansion of Royalist quarters at this time, and making it defensible. This train of six pieces was no doubt sent to him there. Before his works were complete, however, 'panic fear' of Essex's approach made him abandon the town, 26 October, and draw off his cannon to join Rupert at Buckingham. Add. MS. 18980, ff. 133-4; Luke, ed. Philip, II, pp. 177-8.
- 239 Sir Charles Lucas (1613-48) was a career soldier of Essex gentry family. His regiment of Horse, commissioned in March 1643, is here supplied with arms; at the same time his Foot received munitions, W.O. 55. 459, f. 505. Lucas's Horse, with other cavalry units, was moving into Buckinghamshire. In September he was named Commander-in-Chief of Royalist forces in East Anglia and the East Midlands, and in October Sheriff of Essex. He later served as General of Horse. With Lisle—see note 221—he was executed at Colchester. D.N.B.
- 240 This supply is for Wallingford itself, the garrison under Blagge, and not designed for the army at Reading. As in B 191 the train is sent by river.
- 241 Sir John Byron's peerage passed the Great Seal on 24 October 1643. This delivery of pistols to his regiment of Horse is in readiness for their march, with Oxford cavalry under Wilmot, into Buckinghamshire to join Rupert. Small arms are beginning to arrive from Western ports, but Percy's note indicates some shortage. John Carlton, of Cumberland, was Cornet to the regiment. Black, p. 96; note 55, A Section; List, 18.
- 242 Two regiments of the garrison of Oxford, which were shortly to be called upon to supply Foot for the Buckinghamshire expedition, are munitioned. The other units at Oxford were similarly supplied, 17-23 October, W.O. 55. 459, ff. 513, 515, 539. Anthony Wharton was Major of Percy's regiment, Francis Windebank—see note 54, A Section—of Gerrard's.
- 243 Further supplies are sent to the infantry in garrison at Reading, this time by road. Henry Sherburne's receipt is also recorded in the Reading journal, A 121. Later deliveries to Reading are A 124, B 208, 214, 240. This and other Ordnance Papers at this time show grave concern at New College over the transport available at Oxford.
- A potential or actual shortage of small arms in the stores, indicated in B 195, has now been overcome. Here and in the previous item deliveries of pistols are made to officers of the magazine and others; in all, from 15 October 1643 until the account was closed, 21 March 1644, 865 pistols are recorded as issued. Many of these were the Queen's: see B 265 and note 310, below. Among those supplied here are Owen Wynne, Commissary of the Draught Horses, Richard Mason, Percy's Secretary, Captain Shebis, engineer to the train, la Roche, the Fireworker, and Edward Walker, Secretary-at-War.
- 245 George Wharton (1617-81) was one of Heydon's clerks: C 54. A Westmorland man, he attained great fame as the chief Royalist astrologer, publishing a yearly almanac, under the anagrammatical nom de plume, 'Naworth'. He

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- was with the train at Oxford by December 1642, B 45, and supplied the Ordnance Office with paper and ink in 1643, W.O. 49. 79. In 1645 he introduced Elias Ashmole to the train, but shortly after became a Captain of Horse. He was imprisoned during the Interregnum but continued to publish and at the Restoration regained his place in the Ordnance Office at the Tower. He was created Baronet in 1677. Like Edward Sherburne, whose niece married Wharton's son, he was buried in the Tower chapel. D.N.B.; G.E.C., Baronetage, IV, p. 94; Madan, Oxford Books, II, passim; C. H. Jorsten, Elias Ashmole, I. pp.20, 28, II, pp. 357, 359, 365.
- 246 It is not clear whether this delivery is connected with the considerable activity at Oxford at this time associated with the campaign in Buckinghamshire and Northamptonshire. A rendezvous at Woodstock is not the most convenient for convoys going Northeast from Oxford; and it is not known whether Aston's two guns were with Rupert.
- 247 Sir Arthur Gorges (d.1661), of Chelsea, Middlesex, was the agent of Henry Hastings, Lord Loughborough—see note 45, B Section—for whom this supply is intended. Despite the efforts of Gorges at Oxford and elsewhere, in search of arms, Loughborough had constantly to complain of short supply. H.M.C., *Hastings*, II, pp.119-22, 134-5; and above, p.50.
- 248 The concern for Oxford's transport resources, already remarked, is further reflected in this document, incomplete though it is. While it may date from the immediate post-Newbury period, it was more likely drawn up in February 1644 by Ordnance officials for the scrutiny of the Oxford Parliament, and is one of the accounts referred to in C 60. Greenland House was supplied on 19 February, B 251.
- 249 Dartmouth was taken by Maurice on 6 October 1643. Many of the stores captured, and listed here, were used to supply his forces before Plymouth, to set out ships seized in the harbour, as privateers, and to munition other garrisons. The defences of the town, as here described, were Townstall Church, the parish church on a hill North of Dartmouth; a fort at Hardness, on the Northern side; Mount Flagon fort, Mount Boone (an old walled manor house), Fort Paradise and Bearscove (Bayard's Cove) Castle, built by the corporation in 1537, elsewhere in the town; and the principal fortifications South of Dartmouth, guarding the entrance to the harbour, St Petrox Church and Castle, and Kingswear on the opposite shore. The Royalists improved these defences by building the tower called Gallants Bower to protect St Petrox, and others to strengthen Kingswear, and by increasing the number of guns in the works. At Dartmouth in 1643 there were more cannon, though of smaller size, than at Weymouth, but fewer than at Bristol; cf. B 144, 189. H.M.C., XV, App. VII, pp. 64-87; J. Sprigge, Anglia Rediviva, pp. 167-70; P. Russell, Dartmouth; Archaeologia, Vol. LXXXV, pp. 129-57.
- 250 Marmaduke Holtby, a recusant gentleman of Scackleton, Yorkshire, was Lieutenant Colonel of Percy's Horse. The regiment had recently arrived at Reading, and was about to join Hopton's army in Hampshire: see C 23, B 199, 223, 242, and Harl. MS. 6852, ff. 198, 242. Holtby was a Gentleman Pensioner at the Restoration, but was forced to petition for relief in 1667. J. Cliffe, Yorkshire Gentry, p. 220; C.S.P.D., 1666-7, p. 401.

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- 251 The Duke of Richmond. Further pistol deliveries, to the eleven year old son of Secretary Falkland, killed at Newbury, and the servants of the Duke of Richmond, indicate no shortage at Oxford of these firearms.
- 252 Sir John Mennes (1599-1671), sailor, poet and courtier, was of Sandwich family, and rose to be Vice-Admiral in 1635, and Captain of the 'Victory' until cashiered for Royalism in 1642. He acted as intermediary between Oxford and the Midlands army under Capel, as here, and was later Governor of North Wales. He was active in the import of arms from abroad, and in 1645 succeeded Pennington as commander of the Royalist navy. D.N.B.; Warburton, II. pp. 371-4, III, p. 55; T. Carte, A Collection of Original Letters, I, pp. 49-52, 67, 89. This supply was convoyed to Chester and Shrewsbury by Major Walton's troop of Horse, Harl. MS. 6852, f. 209.
- 253 Although Newport Pagnell had been lost—see note 238—a substantial force of Royalist Horse and Foot was based on Towcester in Northamptonshire, where Rupert had his Headquarters at this time. Percy had promised the Prince further supplies from Oxford on 1 November, and these were received at Towcester by Samuel Fawcett, who was still there in December. Warburton, II, p. 325; W.O. 55, 459, f. 759.
- 254 Henry Sherburne's receipt for these munitions is again recorded in the journal of the magazine at Reading, A 128. Luke's scouts reported twelve cannon in the town; this warrant indicates that three of these were twelve-pounders. *Luke*, ed. Philip, II, p. 178.
- 255 For the Queen's Lifeguards of Foot, part of the garrison of Oxford, see notes 130, A Section, and 79, B Section. Earlier deliveries to the regiment were B 50, 141, 165, and W.O. 55. 459, ff. 468, 513. Its officers were mainly French, as here, or North Country. *List*, 113.
- 256 Sturt was not the Governor of Donnington (J. Edgar, Sir Ralph Hopton, p. 147: note 140, A Section) but probably an agent of the Ordnance Office, stationed there since its munitioning in September 1643. His identity is uncertain. He wrote to Percy the day after he signed this receipt, C 20.
- 257 Francis Hall was Major of the regiment raised by the city of Oxford in the summer of 1643. In spite of the many disputes between the city and its Colonel—see next note—relations with the Major were always cordial, and Hall was promoted Lieutenant Colonel and thanked by the Council for his services, May-June 1646. O.C.A., pp. xxiii, 133, 380, 395; Harl. MS. 986, f. 76.
- 258 Sir Nicholas Selwyn (1604-56), of Friston, Sussex, courtier and Gentleman Pensioner, was commissioned Colonel of the Oxford Foot regiment in July 1643. It was armed in October by the city, and is now munitioned by New College magazine. Later deliveries to the regiment are W.O. 55. 459, ff. 763, 94. There were long wrangles between the city and Selwyn. Black, p. 55; Shaw, Knights, II. p.201; Alum. Oxon.; O.C.A., pp. 117, 123, 126, 376-8, 383; Harl. MSS. 986, f. 76, 6802, ff. 155, 338.
- 259 George Boncle—for whom see note 77, B Section and 142, A Section—was Lieutenant Colonel of Aston's Horse: his younger brother Sebastian, a Captain in the regiment, signs the receipt. Orders had been drafted on 8 and 10 November for 180 swords and 95 firearms to be issued to the regiment; this delivery falls short. Foot and Horse under Aston, Major

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- General of Horse and Governor of Oxford, left Oxford on 13 November to join Rupert at Towcester and replace the units there ordered to march North with Lord Byron. Stevens, pp. 59-63; Harl. MS.6852, ff. 216, 221; Dugdale, *Diary*, p. 55.
- 260 Sir John Bankes (1589-1644), Chief Justice of Common Pleas at Oxford, was also the owner of Corfe Castle, and these arms were no doubt designed for the garrison there. This delivery is listed with others made by Strachan at Weymouth, C 59.
- 261 This train of four cannon and Foot supplies for Rupert had been ordered by Percy on 30 October, and assembled, but not sent. On 1 November Percy promised supplies and on the 15th he wrote that he'd sent most of what Rupert asked for. The train probably accompanied Aston's forces to Towcester. Its arrival at Reading later indicates the transfer of men and munitions from Northamptonshire to the enlarged army of Hopton in Hampshire. W.O. 55. 459, ff. 569-70; Warburton, II, p. 325; Pythouse Papers, p. 59; Luke, ed. Philip, III, p. 203.
- 262 Byron was given command in the Northwest, and sent there with Horse and Foot in mid-November to co-ordinate the newly-landed 'English-Irish' troops and the local forces. He was ordered to go direct from his service in Buckinghamshire under Rupert, and these supplies from Oxford are to meet him at Moreton-in-Marsh. The amounts ordered by the King are reduced in Percy's warrant: the magazine was depleted after the deliveries to Rupert, Reading and Hopton. Warburton, II, pp. 329-30; Pythouse Papers, p.59. Among the Lancashire Horse accompanying Byron was Tyldesley's regiment, supplied on 17 November, B 217.
- 263 Reading was the staging post and Basing the depot for this train for Hopton's army. Basing's owner, the Marquess of Winchester, signs for the supply, which includes shot for large, medium-sized and very small cannon. Obviously saker shot is in short supply in the magazine. Hopton, near Winchester, thanked Percy for this train, C 25.
- The Queen's regiment of Horse had been raised in the North when she first landed in Yorkshire, and had come with her to Oxford. It was first supplied by New College stores on 3 September 1643, and as a favoured unit—420 strong at this time and quartered near Oxford—was regularly munitioned during the ensuing winter. This is one of several deliveries made from the Queen's own stores: see above, p.50, and notes 244, 310. Captain Thomas Smith was later knighted: Lieutenant Charles Charbo was no doubt a French officer brought from the Continent by the Queen. Symonds, p.146; List, 113; W.O. 55.459, ff. 444, 516, 519, 584-5, etc; Belvoir Castle, Lindsay Papers, QZ. 23, f. 7c.
- 265 Hillesden House, near Buckingham, the home of Sir Alexander Denton (1595-1645), M.P. for Buckingham in the Long Parliament until displaced for Royalism, and brother-in-law of Sir Edmund Verney, was garrisoned for the King in the winter of 1643-4. The officers named in this warrant were of Charles Gerrard's regiment of Foot, and it is clear a detachment of this Oxford garrison unit was occupying the house. It fell to Cromwell in March 1644. V.C.H., Buckinghamshire, IV, pp. 538-9; Keeler, The Long Parliament; List, 53; W.O. 55. 459, ff. 718, 727, 772, etc.

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- 266 Kidlington, close to Oxford, as well as Iffley and Wolvercote, provided stabling for the draught horses for the train. See above, pp. 22-3.
- 267 The pistols ordered in this warrant of the King's were not delivered to Percy's Horse until 21 December, and then only in part. A similar warrant in favour of Rupert does not appear to have been honoured at all. The stock of pistols was running low at Oxford. Percy's Horse had 'vndergone extreme hard duty' with Hopton in November, but was now recuperating in Berkshire. See above, notes 244, 250; C 23; W.O. 55. 459, ff. 755-6; Harl. MS. 6988, f. 164.
- 268 William Ashburnham (d. 1679), younger brother of John, the courtier, was a veteran officer, Army Plotter, and M.P. for Ludgershall, Wiltshire, in the Short and Long Parliaments. He was appointed Colonel General of the Foot in Western parts under Maurice and Hopton, in November 1643, and succeeded Ashley Cooper as Governor of Weymouth after the latter's retirement in December. 1000 muskets were issued to him before February 1644, C 59. Keeler, *The Long Parliament*; Harl. MS. 6851, ff. 225-6.
- 269 The Dragoon regiment of Henry Washington had taken part in the siege of Gloucester, but not, apparently, the Newbury campaign, and was now established at Burford. Washington was, in the new year, to become Governor of Evesham. Nathaniel Gray was Major of the regiment; he also received supplies delivered on 4 December, W.O. 55. 459, f. 719. Note 51, A Section; Stevens, pp. 22, 24, 39-40, 46.
- 270 Bernard Astley—for whom see note 151, A Section—was Major General of Dorset, and Colonel of a Foot regiment first raised by the Marquess of Hertford. Although otherwise unrecorded, C 59 confirms this delivery of arms. *Bellum Civile*, p. 64.
- 271 John Cochrane (b.c.1604), elder brother of the 1st Earl of Dundonald, was a Scots career officer and diplomat, who served in Ireland, Scotland—taking a leading part in the 'Incident' of 1641—and England, and was, at various times, envoy of Charles I to Hamburg, Denmark and the Duke of Courland. He died before the Restoration. Towcester, where Cochrane was Governor—he signs for supplies here and B 231—was abandoned in mid-January 1644, and Cochrane was thereafter associated with the preparations for Montrose's campaign in Scotland. C.P.; The Scots Peerage, III, pp. 343-4; C. Clar. S.P., I. p. 351, II, pp. 146, 154, 222, 230, 240; Harl. MS. 6804, ff. 25-6; Add. MS. 18981, ff. 1, 9-10.
- 272 Reading was again the base for supplies from Oxford directed to Hopton's army, reinforced by Astley's Foot, campaigning in Hampshire: cf. B 218, C 25.
- 273 A small cartload of munitions is sent to Lord Chandos, at his garrison of Sudeley: he had been supplied earlier with a load of arms (not recorded in the Ordnance Papers) from Oxford, and two cannon from Worcester. Note 47, B Section; Stevens, pp. 23, 45; H.M.C., *Hastings*, II, pp. 134-5.
- 274 This may refer to transport from Oxford taken to Bristol to aid in the sending of supplies arrived there, and may include the thirteen carts left at Bristol noted in B 202.

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- 275 Towcester remained the base for Royalist forces on the Northamptonshire frontier during December 1643: see notes 238, 253, 271, above. The four guns sent there earlier had apparently been transferred to Reading, B 214, and these two may have been sent in compensation for their loss. A delivery of ironwork of 4 January 1644 completes the issues to Towcester in the Ordnance Papers, W.O. 55. 459, f. 649.
- 276 For the significance of this order see above, p. 51.
- 277 When Dartmouth was captured a small fleet of ships fell into Royalist hands. The Earl of Marlborough was appointed Admiral on 11 November 1643, and this delivery out of the stock in the port was no doubt intended to equip his fleet. Cf. notes 174, 249; Black, p. 98.
- 278 The siege of Basing by Waller, which had caused the diversion of the last supplies from Oxford to Donnington Castle—see note 234, above—had been raised by Hopton on 13 November 1643. Now two of the cannon brought to Oxford from Weymouth, A 127, and ammunition for the guns already there, are sent to Basing. On the same day Percy ordered the transport for these supplies from Henry Stevens, Waggon-Master-General, who used four of his carts in the service: Stevens, pp. 21, 24, 39. Rather more is signed for at Basing than was ordered, and it is possible that the train housed at Donnington was now taken to its original destination: W.O. 55. 459, f. 247. Further deliveries were made in February and March 1644, Stevens, p. 47, W.O. 55. 459, f. 48b. See above, notes 208, 263.
- 279 John Godfrey (d. 1644), a Norfolk Catholic, had succeeded to the command of Sir John Beaumont's regiment of Foot on the death of the first Colonel at the siege of Gloucester. It was now part of Evesham garrison. Godrey was killed at Tewkesbury in June 1644. This supply was part of the train carried by Stevens to Evesham on 29 December. Stevens, pp. 23, 46.
- 280 Neale also signed for muskets redelivered to the regiment on 27 January 1644, W.O. 55.459, f. 704.
- 281 Possibly George Parker, of Sutton Coney, Staffordshire. C.A.M., p. 1429. He was no doubt at Oxford to collect these munitions and carry them to Dudley.
- 282 Thomas Leveson (d. 1652), a Wolverhampton recusant, was Governor of Dudley Castle throughout the war. He pursued a long-standing feud with the Royalist Governor of Lichfield, and was very unpopular with the countrypeople because of his exactions. He was further supplied in March and April, 1644, B 262, 268. Stevens, pp. 24, 50-1.
- 283 Sir Francis Hawley (c. 1608-84), of Buckland, Somerset, was an old officer, who aided Hertford in Somerset in 1642, and at Hopton's request was made Deputy Governor of Bristol after its capture. He was created Baronet in 1644, and Lord Hawley of Duncannon, Ireland, in 1645. This delivery was to remedy the shortage of arms in the Bristol garrison, shown in C 34. C.P.; Warburton, II, p. 291.
- 284 The correct date, I January 1644, is confirmed by the copy of this warrant in W.O. 55.458. 66, f.98. For Sandys see note 197, above. Evesham was now and later not only an important garrison on the road from Oxford to Worcester, but the distribution centre for a wide area: see above, p. 47.

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- 285 Civil war Oxford was dark and dangerous on winter evenings. On 22 December 1643 Governor Aston, irascible and unpopular, had been assaulted and injured in the street, and he now took steps to provide his six-man bodyguard with suitable weapons. Dugdale, *Diary*, p. 57. As in the previous document the date should be corrected.
- 286 Hopton had his headquarters at Winchester. This convoy was to be met halfway, at Hungerford, by a detachment of his forces: it shows that he possessed twelve-pounders as well as those indicated in B 218. Hopton was recruiting at this time, and the 2000 muskets earmarked at Weymouth for his use (B 186) were now ordered to be supplied to him, Rawl. MS. D. 395, ff. 9, 13.
- 287 Arthur Slingsby (c. 1623-66), seventh son of Sir Guilford Slingsby, and younger brother of Walter—note 136, A Section—was Major to Percy's Horse and later Colonel of the regiment. He shared exile with Charles II and was created Baronet in 1657. C 73; G.E.C., Baronetage, III. p. 17. Percy's regiment provided the convoy for the train from Hungerford: John Thorowgod, who signs the receipt, was Quartermaster to the regiment, B 199.
- 288 Arms exchange and munitions supply are ordered for Charles Gerrard's regiment of Foot, part of Oxford garrison. A detachment of the regiment had been at Hillesden House in December 1643, but was now returned; note 265 above. Gerrard's Foot and Horse left with him for South Wales in March 1644.
- 289 Charles Cotterell (1615-87), Master of the Ceremonies from 1641 and at the Restoration, courtier and translator, succeeded Windebank as Major to Gerrard's Foot in December 1643, while at Hillesden House. He signed for other deliveries to the regiment at Oxford, on 23 December 1643 and 4 March 1644, but remained at court when the regiment left. He was knighted at Christ Church in March 1645. D.N.B.; Symonds, p. 162; W.O. 55. 459, ff. 10, 718, 727, 760.
- 290 Part of the Queen's Lifeguards had been stationed at Wheatley, East of Oxford, since November 1643, when they were noted by Luke's scouts. They continued there until at least March 1644. Other companies were part of the Oxford garrison and were mustered, in red coats, at the New Parks on 13 February 1644. Note 255, above, and references there; Luke, ed. Philip, III, p. 206; W.O. 55. 459, ff. 725, 61; Harl. MS. 986, f. 75.
- 291 It is possible that Samuel Fawcett—for whom see note 94, A Section—was preparing to take part in Rupert's expedition to Aylesbury, on this day. He had been in charge of Rupert's train at Towcester in November 1643. The attempt on Aylesbury, part of the Ogle Plot, failed on the night of the 21st. Gardiner, Civil War, I, p. 275.
- 292 A large train of ten covered waggons is ordered for Byron at Chester. On the day following the King's warrant Byron and his army of 'English-Irish' were routed by Fairfax and Brereton at Nantwich. This supply would arrive about a week later. Ammunition, more plentiful in the North than at Oxford, was not included in the stores sent.

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- 293 This was the first of several deliveries made from Oxford to Vavasour's forces in Gloucestershire early in 1644. Sir Walter Pye, one of Vavasour's chief officers, acted as receiver. See notes 113, A Section, and 226, B Section, and references there; B 264.
- 294 Arthur Trevor (d. c. 1666) was the younger son of Sir Edward Trevor, who possessed estates in Ireland and Denbighshire. Trained as a lawyer, he acted as intermediary at Oxford for Ormonde and Rupert. Unlike the other members of the Prince's entourage, armed with pistols for the journey with the Prince to his new command at Shrewsbury, 6 February, Trevor was to remain at Oxford. Dict. Welsh Biog.
- 295 Somerset Fox the younger (d. 1689), of Caynham, near Ludlow, was another of Rupert's intimates, preparing for the journey with the Prince. He signed the declaration of support for Rupert after the surrender of Bristol, October 1645. He was rewarded at the Restoration with a pension. Visit. Salop, 1623, p. 193; Symonds, p.271; P.C.C. Ent 154.
- 296 James Eastland, possibly of Suffolk family, was secretary to Rupert, and now receives ammunition for the Prince's train. He appears in the Ordnance Papers as early as October 1642 as the Prince's secretary, B 3, 15.
- 297 Greenland House, near Henley, in Buckinghamshire on the Oxfordshire border, belonged to the Doyley family. Reading forces, expanding their quarters, captured the house in December 1643, as Luke's scouts reported. Now three small and inferior iron guns are provided for the garrison there. Note that a base is a small hammered (built-up) iron cannon. Luke, ed. Philip, III, pp. 210, 214, 256; ed. Tibbutt, p.624.
- 298 Wardour Castle, Wiltshire, the seat of the Catholic Lords Arundel, had been taken by Parliament after the gallant defence of the place by Blanche, Lady Arundel, in May 1643. It was now the turn of the Royalists, including Arundel, to besiege the Castle, held by Edmund Ludlow. This delivery is connected with Hopton's reinforcement of the besiegers: he sent Sir Francis Dodington and mining engineers, and the Castle fell on 18 March 1644. C 59 records a similar delivery to Arundel from Weymouth. For Hopton's position see note 286 above. Ludlow, ed. Firth, I, pp. 70-81, 454-60.
- 299 The Duke of York's Foot regiment under Colonel St Leger, the first part of the newly-imported 'English-Irish' army, was now, after a brief stay in the Midlands, incorporated in the Oxford field army. The regiments from Ireland required supplies of all kinds, especially arms. Described as a full regiment in early April, it was probably stationed in Wiltshire. St Leger wrote from Broad Somerford, Wiltshire, on 7 April; C 79. Harl. MS. 986, f. 82; notes 119, 132, A Section.
- 300 This ammunition is intended for the small guns sent to Reading on 12 February, and passed on to Greenland House, B 251; and the rest for the large garrison of infantry at Reading, shortly to be drawn upon for service with Hopton's army.
- 301 Adrian Scrope (1615-67), Cockerington, Lincs., joined the King just before Edgehill, where he rescued his father, Sir Gervaise, left for dead on the battlefield. He was now Major of Forth's regiment of Horse, which he later

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- commanded. He was knighted at the Restoration. P. Young, *Edgehill*, pp. 133, 268, 272; C.C.C., p. 1327. Forth's Horse had been supplied with 100 pistols while at Towcester in January 1644, W.O. 55. 459, f. 686.
- 302 Six iron cannon are sent to Reading to join those delivered earlier, along with supplies for the Foot. Muskets and bandoleers are possibly in short supply at New College, for although 500 are ordered less than half are sent. Reading forces were being strengthened prior to Hopton and Forth's joining together for the Cheriton campaign. Several of the matrosses (assistant gunners) listed for this train remained at Reading when the muster of the Ordnance officials was taken in Spring 1644, C 54. Thomas Eastbrooke was Assistant to the Commissaries: he had been a prominent Ordnance officer before the Civil War. A further two iron guns were sent to Reading two days later, by water. Most of the cannon no doubt originated from Weymouth, as in B 234. A 127; W.O. 55.459, ff. 21-3; C 54.
- 303 Henry Howard (1620-63), third son of the Earl of Berkshire, had been appointed Governor of Malmesbury in March 1643, and was taken prisoner at its capture, May 1644. Henry Stevens, the Waggon-Master-General at Oxford, and a protégé of the Howards, was employed with his 'country teams' to take this cartload of munitions to Malmesbury, at a cost of 14/-. Stevens, pp. 24, 49; notes 127, A Section, 99, C Section.
- This endorsement again indicates that Henry Stevens and his local transport were being called upon; see previous note. Stevens' own accounts reveal that these munitions were taken to Banbury in three carts on 9 March, at a cost of £1.7.0. Stevens, pp. 22, 24, 49-50. See above, p. 22.
- 305 The King's sons had now graduated to firing robinets (one-pounders or less) after earlier practice with pistols and carbines: see B 65, 190.
- 306 Although the destination of this important train (led by Capt. Younger, with his own locked waggon, B 260) is not stated, there can be no doubt that it was the supply drawn out by Forth to accompany the force of 2000 Horse and Foot he took to aid Hopton: it was recorded by Henry Stevens, who provided four of the carts as far as Andover. It left Oxford on 13 March: the two armies met at Newbury next day, and fought the battle of Cheriton on 29 March 1644. Hopton, in his account of the campaign (Bellum Civile, p. 77), states that Forth brought four cannon, but only two are included in this train. Possibly Forth obtained another two from Reading en route. Several of the officers listed were with Hopton when the muster of the train was taken: eleven were supplied with swords for this service. Stevens, pp. 24, 50; C 54; W.O. 55. 459, f. 43.
- 307 These supplies for Colonel Thomas Leveson at Dudley Castle were also carried by Stevens, taking four days to reach their destination. There were two brothers Heveningham in the garrison there. Stevens, pp. 24, 50-1; Harl. MS. 986, f. 95.
- 308 The Royalist Council of War had decided on conscription, and channelled these recruits into established regiments which, if possible, had arms to spare. Some came into the Queen's Lifeguards from North Wales. Captain Blunt had been supplied with match the day before this order, for the use of five companies quartered at Wheatley. Harl. MS. 6804, f. 142; W.O. 55 459, ff. 39, 61.

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- 309 Sir William Vavasour was plentifully supplied in February and March 1644 from Oxford. His forces lay in Gloucestershire, where he had command. Including this substantial train, approximately twelve tons of munitions were sent to Vavasour or his agent Sir Walter Pye, February-March 1644. His letter to Percy of 30 March, C 72, shows that in addition to these two cannon he had expected a mortar and even greater supplies. Although supported by Rupert he fell out with rival generals and lost influence at court, and his army was recalled to Oxford on 2 April: on 6 April Charles Steward, Gentleman of the Ordnance, returned the guns in this train to Oxford stores. A 140, note 113, A Section, and references there; W.O. 55. 458. 65, f. 136; Stevens, pp. 22, 24.
- The Ordnance Papers record the delivery of 865 pistols in the six-month period following the capture of Western ports to the end of this account, 21 March 1644; see note 244 above. A further 210 were issued after that date until records cease (May 1644). Supplies of pistols at Oxford fluctuated widely, depending on the flow of arms from Bristol and Weymouth, where March and Strachan were installed. A Dunkirk frigate, arrived at Bristol as early as August 1643—see C 13 and note 14, C Section—was the most likely source for the arms owned by the Queen, who kept control of their distribution at Oxford. Another consignment, including pistols, landed at Bristol in November, C 22. Considerable quantities of arms of all kinds were sent to Oxford by Strachan at Weymouth: Percy distributed these. See above, pp. 41-3, and C Section, passim; Rawl. MS. D. 395, f. 217.
- 311 For the transfer of munitions from the Commissioners' stores at the Schools, see above, p.51, and note 79, A Section, and cf. B 232. New College magazine was increasingly dependent on Strode and Wandesford, now the official suppliers. Substantial deliveries followed this order: from 4 to 16 April 85 cwt. powder and 50 cwt. match were transferred, making good shortages noted in February and March. A 138, 139, 143, 146, 148.
- 312 The Ordnance Commissioners set local craftsmen to work on arms production: see notes 6, A Section, and 105, B Section.
- 313 Rupert, returning from the relief of Newark to his Headquarters at Shrewsbury, was at Newport, Shropshire, where he orders this delivery to Leveson, whose forces from Dudley Castle had joined the Prince for the expedition.
- 314 Fletcher was the Oxford plumber: for his and Charles Greene's activities (next item), see note 2, A Section. At this date they are supplied with over five tons of lead, and deliver small shot in return—as recorded in A 141 etc.
- 315 Sir Lewis Kirke, a Bridgnorth man—for whom see note 133, B Section—was now Governor of the small garrison there. A small train of powder and match had been sent to Rupert from Oxford, on the news of his victory at Newark. As the receipt printed here indicates, it arrived at Shrewsbury on the 10th, except for one cart which had broken down at Bridgnorth the day before. Rupert on 17 April ordered Kirke to send him this match, which he did the following day. Symonds, pp. 172, 248; Add. MS. 18981, ff. 113-4, 153.
- 316 On the death of Falkland and the succession of Digby to the Secretaryship in October 1643 the King had ordered that royal warrants be countersigned

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by the Secretary: this was not, however, consistently observed in the warrants received by the Ordnance Office. This order, and another of 8 April (a stray Ordnance Paper, now Harl. MS. 6988, f. 174), signed by Walker, the Secretary-at-War, mark a tightening up of the procedure for authorising supply, and hereafter all royal warrants are countersigned by Walker or Nicholas. C. Clar. S.P., I, p.249; B 186, 188, 213, etc. Reading was the principal garrison of the Foot until evacuated in mid-May: Sir John Owen, Deputy Governor, had asked for these munitions on 5 April, C 76. B 275 is a further supply. See note 122, A Section.

- 317 This incomplete list of munitions for the cannon in Oxford defences indicates that three Gentlemen of the Ordnance were assigned to the city batteries (hitherto only gunners have been recorded), and that they disposed of 20 guns. It is not clear which area of the defences each officer commanded. For the development of the defences see notes 73, 77, 90 etc, B Section.
- 318 The Life Guards of Foot, part of Oxford garrison, were with the army at the Aldbourne Chase muster, 10 April 1644. Defects in the arms of the regiment, no doubt discovered then, are rectified here and in the next item, with deliveries to Radley, a company commander. Drafts of this and the next warrant are Harl. MS. 6802, ff. 103, 109. Radley returned arms for repair in exchange on 22 May, A 158.
- 319 Montagu Bertie, 2nd Earl of Lindsey (c. 1608-66), the son of the first Lord General of the Royalist army, had been captured at Edgehill and released in 1643. He now commanded the Life Guards at Oxford.
- 320 A further supply for the men and cannon at Reading. When the town was abandoned in the following month much of this and earlier munitions supply (B 271) was returned to Oxford, A 157 and note 122, A Section.
- 321 Heydon's note on the arms, and their non-delivery with the munitions, indicates a shortage of muskets and pikes after the arming of the Guards, B 274.
- 322 Thomas Wentworth, 1st Earl of Cleveland (1591-1667), was a cavalry general and Colonel of a regiment of Horse which he had only recently taken over. Possibly this supply was in connection with his new Colonelcy. Cleveland's regiment distinguished itself at Cropredy Bridge in June 1644, and was badly mauled at Newbury in October: Cleveland was there captured and Captain Topham, who signs the receipt here, was killed. Symonds, pp.146-7.
- 323 Richard Rhodes had been an officer of the royal stables before the Civil War, and in the summer of 1643 had been paid £5 at Oxford in connection with the Great Horse (larger horses suitable for heavy cavalry). Ten drums manufactured under March's direction at Bristol, at 23/- each, had arrived at New College stores on 13 April, and it was no doubt one of these that Rhodes now employed to exercise one of the horses in his charge. Ashburnham, II, Appendix, p. xxvii; C 47, A 147.
- 324 The plan agreed when Rupert came to Oxford in April 1644 was to strengthen the existing garrisons round Oxford (including Wallingford, where Blagge was Governor). A troop of Horse, here armed, would enable the Governor to get in provisions and money.

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- 325 Banbury was another of the garrisons to be reinforced at this stage. Percy ordered Waggon-Master-General Stevens on 15 May to press three carts and teams to carry these munitions to the town, Stevens, p. 25.
- 326 These arms had been brought into the stores by Boteler on 8 April 1644: see A 142 and note 115, A Section.
- 327 The regiment of Foot of Henry Carey, 1st Earl of Dover (c. 1580-1660), was a new auxiliary regiment recruited from scholars and 'strangers' at Oxford, which was first mustered in the city on 14 May 1644: it was then 600 strong, but probably ill-equipped. Harl. MS. 6802, ff. 99-100, 134; Steele, No. 2560.
- 328 No doubt the Colonel who mustered a large Foot regiment of yellowcoats at Aldbourne Chase in April 1644; his identity remains uncertain. Harl. MS. 986, f. 79.
- 329 Henry Crompton, a professional soldier, had served in the Scots Wars and had been taken prisoner in 1642, before becoming Major of the Oxford garrison, probably late in 1643. He remained in this post until the surrender of the city. Peacock, p.77; Harl. MS. 6804, f. 45; O.C.A., p. 391; Bodleian: Add. MS. D 114, ff. 110, 134-5.
- 330 Lord Littleton, Lord Keeper—for whom see note 134, B Section—was, like his fellow Lord Commissioner at Oxford, the Earl of Dover, raising a regiment of auxiliaries for garrison duty in the city. It was now being equipped, as this and the next item indicate. Cf. note 327 above.
- This important train, ordered by the Lords Commissioners at Oxford, rendezvoused with the King and his forces at Witney on 19 June 1644; it then accompanied the army on the Cropredy camapign and in the West afterwards. The final draft indicates that ten cannon—medium-sized field pieces, munitioned with case as well as round shot—were actually sent, together with 15 cartloads of supplies. The guns from Godstow were returned to store, A 169 and note 138. The list of officers for the train is also found, with some additional information, in S.P. 16.539, ff. 193-4. The Royalists added to this train munitions brought from Oxford, 24 June, and eleven of Waller's guns captured at Cropredy Bridge, 29 June 1644. Stevens, p. 28.
- 332 The Dragoon regiment commanded by Sir Thomas Hooper—a career soldier knighted for bravery at Cropredy—may have been newly raised at this date. It was no doubt armed in order to take part in the relief of Donnington Castle, 6 November 1644. Shaw, Knights, II, p.218.
- 333 Hopton had replaced Percy as General of the Ordnance, by commission dated 20 August 1644. A further commission of 2 December 1644 confirmed and extended his appointment. Drafts of both are noticed in H.M.C., 15th Report, Appendix II, pp.105-6: see also above, p. 21, and Black, pp. 238, 240. The implication of the earlier warrant referred to here was that the Oxford stores were low in the previous December: this may be confirmed from other sources. Banbury, now to be supplied with shot for—presumably—five cannon, had survived a two-month long siege, August-October 1644, and needed replenishing.

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- 334 Sir Henry Bard, later Viscount Bellamont (c. 1615-56), friend and protégé of Rupert, had been Lieutenant Colonel of Percy's Foot before succeeding Pinchbeck in the command of his regiment: see W.O. 55.459, f. 368, and note 161, B Section. He was knighted in November 1643, wounded and captured at Cheriton, but exchanged before May 1644, and was now a tertia of Foot commander and Governor of Camden House, Gloucestershire. These firearms were no doubt intended for his Foot there. D.N.B.; C.P.; Symonds, pp. 180, 182.
- 335 Samuel Fawcett, the Ordnance officer, was at this date appointed Governor of Woodstock. He recruited some colleagues, such as Quartermaster Audley, from the New College magazine, and was active in fortifying and arming the manor house, as this warrant and B 295 indicate, and Luke's scouts reported. See notes 94, A Section, and 63 and 291, B Section; *List* 46; *Luke*, ed. Tibbutt, pp. 687, 693.
- 336 George Lisle—for whom see note 221, B Section—was Colonel of a tertia of Foot and Governor of Faringdon, an important garrison and centre of supplies for Oxford in the winter of 1644/5. His Foot regiment, here armed, was part of the garrison. Cf. Addendum, note 8; Symonds, pp. 160, 163.
- 337 Sir Thomas Coghill (c. 1591-1659), of Bletchingdon, Oxon, Sheriff 1632, knighted 1633, had built his large new house there about 1630. It was now garrisoned and fortified, no doubt—as with the firearms here supplied—at the owner's expense. When 200 Foot under Colonel Windebank moved into the house shortly afterwards a bitter quarrel broke out between the Colonel and Coghill, and this may explain why Cromwell captured it so easily in April 1645. Note 54, A Section; Luke, ed. Tibbutt, p. 693; House of Lords R.O.: Walker Papers, ff. 107-8; Symonds, pp. 18, 163-4; J. H. Coghill, The Family of Coghill, pp. 38-9, 57-9.

SECTION C

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- The King lay at Oatlands on his retreat from London, and there ordered the destruction of the powder mills at Chilworth, near Guildford: see above, pp. 10, 12. Possibly the transport listed in B 21 was taken up by the raiding party sent to Chilworth. The mills may still have been in operation in July 1643, when Percy led a further raid against them. Cf. notes 85, A Section, and 10, C Section.
- 2 This warrant is addressed to Percy as Colonel of a regiment of Horse, commissioned in February 1643. As a result of this order to leave quarters in Gloucestershire his regiment moved into Oxfordshire in June and took part in the Chalgrove raid.
- 3 For the background to Percy's appointment see above, p. 20. The signatory to this copy of the letters patent is the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, Thomas Willys. Black, pp. xxxvii, 40.
- 4 For a discussion of this list see above, pp. 21, 23. The establishment listed here consisted of 576 men, but shortages of personnel in some departments (e.g. only 43 out of 300 carters) point to a lower actual figure. Cf. the later establishment, C 54.
- 5 Nicholas Mountgarnier, a French officer probably recruited by the Queen, was active with the train from January 1642 to April 1644, when he took ship for Le Havre. He is frequently referred to in the Ordnance Papers. See above, p. 26, B 56, B 133, B 134, etc; Bodleian: Tanner MS. 61, f. 16.
- 6 Two of the most senior conductors of the train are authorised to seize transport for the iron cannon, munitions and other hardware to be sent from Worcester. They received the supplies from Russell, Governor of Worcester, on 17 June, convoyed it to Moreton-in-Marsh, then divided it between Banbury and Oxford, where it arrived on 20 June: see A 94. This warrant is referred to above, p. 35, and Stevens, p.16.
- This royal order clarified the relationship between the recently appointed General of the Ordnance and the two principal Ordnance Commissioners, who continued to supply the magazine with powder and match. See above, p.51.
- 8 The pressing needs of the train at this time forced Percy to take up horses and men from the Oxfordshire countryside. 75 horses and 30 carters are required from Chadlington Hundred. On 6 July the King had ordered the General to make ready a marching train, and one of 18 pieces was prepared. Although it was not in fact sent other considerable supplies were. B 136, 138, 139 and W.O. 55. 459, ff. 341, 351, 354-5; Pythouse Papers, pp. 50-1; Stevens, p.16. For Commissary Wynne, see note 81, B Section.
- 9 Marsh Baldon, in Bullingdon Hundred, South of Oxford, is required to supply three teams for the train, a heavy contribution from a small township possessing only 14 families paying the Hearth Tax in 1665. Stevens, p. 16; V.C.H., Oxon., V, p. 30.
- 10 Percy is authorised to take up quarters where needed for his regiment of Horse, previously stationed in Gloucestershire and Oxfordshire: see note 2 above. Munitioned by New College the following day, it raided the mills

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- at Chilworth (note I above) and returned with a few plundered arms on 29 July 1643. A 102; W.O. 55. 459, ff. 302-4, 307; Pythouse Papers, p. 53.
- The case of the Gloucestershire farmers who had their carts and teams seized by Lord Crawford's Horse—no doubt on the Western campaign of June 1643—was referred to a sub-committee of the Council of War at Oxford, 8 July. On 17 July a proclamation was issued, reversing an earlier decision, which forbade trade with London. At the same time these goods, seized before the prohibition, were ordered to be restored to their owners. I. Roy, 'The Royalist Council of War, 1642-6', B.I.H.R., Vol. 35, pp. 157-8.
- 12 Percy was Master of the Horse to the Prince of Wales, whose servants included an avennor—a chief officer of the stable—and two equerries. Other officers, and the 77 horses and 19 nags allowed to the Prince and the Duke of York, are listed in Rawl. MS. D. 395, ff. 204-5.
- 13 For Sir Bainham Throckmorton, Sheriff of Gloucestershire, see note 88, A Section: and see note 218, B Section for the background to this letter, which should probably be dated 17 August 1643.
- This is the first letter from Bristol of Richard March, the Ordnance officer. It refers to the landing there in mid-August of the Dunkirk frigate, the "Lady of Assistance", under Captain Anthony Carton, with a cargo of small-arms and other supplies which were ordered by the King on I September to be distributed mainly to the Royalist navy and the Bristol garrison regiments. The Queen also claimed a share of the pistols brought; see note 310. The remainder, as March indicates, were to be sent to the King at Gloucester: but with the raising of the siege on 5 September he requires new orders. The contractor, Daniel van Hecke, was paid £1000, no doubt for this cargo, by the Treasurer-at-War, and on 5 September got his receipt signed by Secretary Falkland for arms delivered to the army in August. Warburton, II, p. 278 n; Harl. MS. 4712, f. 233; S.P. 16.497, No. 151 and 498, No. 3; Ashburnham, II, p. xxxi.
- 15 Supplies had recently landed at Weymouth, and the King now took steps to divide the powder between Oxford and Bristol. The train designed for Oxford probably was that paid off on 1 November 1643, Harl. MS. 6852, f. 190. Cf. B 186, C 17.
- These are the accounts of Paymaster John Stanforth, whose task it was to pay the members of the train from the money received from Treasurer-at-War Ashburnham. It is not clear whether this account should close at the end of November or December 1643. See above, p. 23.
- 17 See notes 229, 230 above. Sir Richard Leveson and Sir John Wilde were prominent local Royalists.
- This further royal order concerning the supplies arrived or expected at Weymouth is addressed to the newly-appointed Governor of the town, Sir Anthony Ashley Cooper, later Earl of Shaftesbury. His claim to the post was disputed and he left it in January 1644; he was replaced by Colonel William Ashburnham. K. H. D. Haley, *Shaftesbury*, pp.43-9. See B 186, C 14.
- Greys Court, two miles West of Henley, was the house of the Knollys family, and during the war in the possession of William Knollys (1620-64),

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later M.P. for Oxford. In November 1643 Astley, Governor of Reading, placed small garrisons there and in Greenland House: see note 297. Greys Court was later occupied by a Parliamentarian force, and much damaged, C.C.C., p. 996. Astley's scouts were Sir Charles Blount and Charles Lloyd: see notes 106, A Section, and 76, B Section.

- 20 See note 234 above.
- 21 See note 256 above.
- Rupert was at Easton Park, near Towcester, in early November 1643, where he was regularly supplied from Oxford. He had received equipment on the 12th, and now requests further deliveries, which were sent immediately by Percy; B 207, 214, and notes. Byron's recent elevation caused Rupert's clerk to alter the text.
- March's news of an arms cargo at Bristol is a further indication, following the Dunkirk frigate of August, of the usefulness of the port to the Royalists. The King, through Jermyn, orders this supply to be brought to Oxford, although it is uncertain when it arrived. There was, however, an increase in the supply of pistols at Oxford in late December 1643, and a Bristol convoy was received on 13 January 1644. Dugdale, *Diary*, p. 58; notes 244, 310, B Section, 14, C Section.
- In the absence of its Colonel at Oxford, the second-in-command of Percy's Horse, Marmaduke Holtby, reports—from Mapledurwell?—to his superior on the condition of the regiment. As one of the units seconded from Oxford to Hopton's army campaigning in Hampshire it has undergone continual hard duty in bitterly cold weather, and is weakened by the desertion of troop commanders and men. Perhaps as a result of this letter the regiment was moved to safer quarters in Berkshire a few days later. Harl. MS. 6852, ff. 198, 242; B 199, 204, 242, C 2, 9 and relevant notes. Cf. C 73.
- The customs of war decreed that the church bells of a captured city became the property of the victorious army, to be used as gun metal. The Mayor and Aldermen of Bristol, however, no doubt with reference to clause six of the articles of the surrender of Bristol to the Royalists in July 1643, which secured the goods of the inhabitants of the city from plunder, now claimed, in response to Percy's request, that the bells were the property of the parishioners, and should be preserved. Their argument appears to have prevailed, for several pre-Civil War bells survive in the city. See under 'bells and bell-ringing' in Arrowsmith, Dictionary of Bristol. J. Latimer, The Annals of Bristol in the Seventeenth Century, p. 185.
- The signatories are the Mayor, Aldermen (listed in order of seniority) and the two Sheriffs of Bristol in 1643. Hooke and Long were M.P.s for the city in the Long Parliament; see Keeler. Short biographies of others may be found in *The Deposition Books of Bristol*, I, 1643-7, Appendix I.
- 27 Hopton, at Itchen Abbas, near Winchester, thanks Percy for the supplies ordered from Oxford on 23 November 1643, B 218 and note 263.
- 28 This is the first appearance of the two ships from Le Havre, and their masters, which, driven to Weymouth by adverse winds, were to play an important part in the arms trade of the port in the ensuing months. As the postscript makes clear one ship carried 23 guns, the other was considerably smaller.

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- This is the first letter from Weymouth of Captain John Strachan, for whom see note 80, A Section. He had recently arrived at the port to take charge of arms shipments, and his letter strikes a cheerful and optimistic note on this subject, sadly missing later. The high hopes expressed here of the two Captains, of money from Oxford for their cargoes, of transport and contribution from Dorset, and of cooperation from Weymouth officials, were all to be disappointed in the following months, as his later despatches reveal.
- 30 William Sandys was one of the Royalist agents in the Low Countries, active in the negotiations with merchants there for arms to be brought into England for the King. His contract here is with the London merchant John Shaw (c. 1615-80), whose wealth was put at the disposal of the Royalists in exile, and who was rewarded at the Restoration with honours and offices. G.E.C., Complete Baronetage, IV, p.12.
- 31 La Riviere, described by Strachan later as 'a dilligent young man' (C 52), was a Frenchman employed by the Ordnance Office in the shipment of arms from France. He here writes to Percy to explain the delay of the Captains in returning to Le Havre from Weymouth. La Riviere had been in Oxford in October 1643, when he had been issued with a pair of pistols, B 198.
- 32 Probably Lawrence Squibb, Royalist official and at the Restoration Teller of the Exchequer, was secretary to Lord Treasurer Cottington at this date. Aylmer, King's Servants, pp.90, 387.
- Robert Long (d. 1673) had been appointed to an Exchequer post in succession to Sir Robert Pye in October 1643, whose place as well as his goods was sequestrated for adherence to Parliament; see C 68. In 1645 Long became Secretary of the Council of the Prince of Wales in the West. He was given a Baronetcy at the Restoration and the Auditorship of the Exchequer. A servant of the Queen as well as an Exchequer official he may have been writing to Percy from Exeter about the Queen's revenues there. The manufacture of muskets at Bristol, the regular payment for which would obviously involve the Lord Treasurer, is referred to in March's letters, C 47, 50.
- Tresaer, having set off on 13 December 1643; he carried with him Percy's letter from Oxford of the 25 November which he delivered to Forster on 18 December (O.S.). The powder (C 31:600 barrels) supposedly at Le Havre ready for shipment is referred to in C 26. La Riviere then went back to Oxford with Forster's next letter (C 31), and others from Royalists in Paris. Add. MS. 12184, ff. 248-9.
- 35 George, Lord Goring (c. 1583-1663), later Earl of Norwich, was Charles I's Ambassador Extraordinary to France. His instructions from Oxford were dated 28 August 1643, and he had entered Paris in state only a week before this letter was written. For his treating with arms shippers, including M. Robin, 'a great French merchant', see C 52 and notes there. Add. MS. 15856, ff. 11-13.
- 36 William Crofts of Saxham (c. 1611-77), courtier in the Queen's household, had remained on the continent when Henrietta Maria left for England in

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1643, and was active in Paris and Rouen on behalf of the Royalists. He was raised to the peerage in 1658. C.P.; C.S.P.D., 1644, pp. 110, 133, 260; C 31.

- Henri-Auguste de Loménie, Comte de Brienne (1595-1666), assumed the title of Secretary of State in 1638, on the death of his father. He lost office temporarily in 1643 but was now in charge of foreign affairs. An exambassador to London he took a close interest in England, which he knew well. He received the despatches of the French envoys sent to King and Parliament: the ambassador referred to here was the Comte d'Harcourt, in England from October 1643, and at Oxford in November.
- The Grand Prieur, also commonly known as the Commandeur de La Porte, was Amador de La Porte (c. 1564-1644). He was the son of Francois de La Porte, a celebrated lawyer, the half-brother of Richelieu's mother and uncle of the Grand Maitre, La Meilleraye. He enjoyed several important and lucrative military and other offices, and was from 1639 Grand Prieur de France. Now nearly eighty years old, coarse and haughty, he wielded great power and influence, particularly over the heirs of the late Cardinal, of which Charles de La Porte, Marquis de La Meilleraye (1602-64), nephew of Amador and Richelieu's cousin, was one. A well-known soldier and siege expert, La Meilleraye was made Grand Maitre de l'Artillerie (1634), Marshall of France (1637), and later Duc et Pair. The export of cannon from France was strictly controlled, and the permission of the Grand Maitre was obviously necessary. He himself, however, was preoccupied with the delicate political situation in Paris, the disturbed state of Brittany, of which he was Governor (see C 49), and with the military preparations occasioned by the wars in which France was currently engaged. Mémoires de Saint-Simon, ed. A. de Boislisle, Vol. 23, pp. 208-9.
- Walter Montagu (c. 1603-77), the younger son of the 1st Earl of Manchester, was a celebrated Catholic convert. He remained chiefly at the French court during the reign of Charles I, acting as liaison between Henrietta Maria and the opposition to Richelieu. On the death of the Cardinal, as Forster here indicates, he gained great influence with Anne of Austria and Mazarin. He left Paris in October to accompany Harcourt's embassy to England however, was recognized on his journey through Kent and was imprisoned in the Tower. D.N.B.
- 40 Richard Forster (d. 1661), of Stokesley, Yorks., was a recusant, courtier and office-holder in the Queen's entourage. He fled to France with Secretary Windebank, December 1640, and was thereafter at the centre of diplomatic activity in Paris on behalf of the King. He was created Baronet in 1649, and became Treasurer of the Household to Charles II in exile. His son, referred to here, was probably his eldest, Richard, born about 1623, and no doubt now serving at Oxford. Other letters of Forster are C 31, 49. G.E.C., Baronetage, III, p.11.
- 41 Sir William Becher (d. 1651) was of Bedfordshire family, and a probable Catholic. He travelled widely, first as a tutor, then on embassies, before becoming Clerk of the Council, 1623-41. He went to France in 1642, and helped in the organisation of the arms traffic, as we see here. J. W. Stoye, English Travellers Abroad, 1604-1667, passim; C.C.A.M., pp. 1059-60.

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- 42 For the relationship between the two see note 38 above.
- 43 This second letter from Forster to Percy was carried by 'this bearer', La Riviere: see note 34 above. He arrived at Weymouth with Lewer and Tresaer on 6 February 1644, C 52.
- 44 Strachan had asked for a bill of credit from the Lord Treasurer at Oxford, Cottington, out of the customs revenue at Weymouth, in the hands of the collector there: see C 26. He had spent £263, and received only £220 (C 37, 41). The Spanish wine landed at Weymouth, including Malaga and dry sherry, was sent to Oxford with the arms convoy, C 37, for a supply of good wine was a principal concern of the leading Royalists there: cf. C 35, 41, 51. Mason's chief desire was pistols, and he received two on 20 March 1644, Rawl. MS. D.395, f. 217.
- 45 For a discussion of this estimate of the Emption Money for the train of artillery see above, p.24.
- 46 Sir John Stawell (1599-1662) was a Somerset Royalist, M.P. for the county, 1640-42, who was active in raising men for the King there. His regiment of Foot was now part of the garrison of Bristol, while he himself was Governor of Taunton. D.N.B.; M. Keeler, The Long Parliament.
- 47 Colonel Thomas Veale (1592-1663), of Alveston, Glos., had been a Trained Band Captain before the Civil War, in the Berkeley Division of the county. His regiment of Foot at Bristol was largely unarmed. He provided them with arms at his own expense when they were ordered towards Gloucester in February 1644, C 50, 51. He was appointed Governor of Berkeley Castle, but was dismissed by Rupert, 1644. He took part in the battle of Worcester, 1651, went into exile, and was commissioned at Antwerp to lead Foot in an uprising in Gloucestershire in 1659. Archaeologia, XIV, pp. 75-83; Bibliotheca Glocestrensis.
- 48 Sir Thomas Bridges, of Keynsham, Somerset, had been knighted in 1641. He aided in the Royalist defence of Somerset, raised this Foot regiment there, and was later Governor of Bath. He was Sheriff of the county in 1644. C.C.C., p. 969.
- The order for the arming of Bristol garrison, which follows this summary of the defects there, was given on I January 1644, B 237. A further order for 500 muskets to be issued to the regiments at Bristol is referred to in C 50. See also C 51, 56. Of the 2236 common soldiers of the garrison (to which should be added 200 officers), 590 were townsmen, and 995 were unarmed.
- This unsigned note is from Percy to his secretary. It probably refers to the relationship between Percy and the Ordnance Commissioners, as well as the making of munitions at Bristol. Richmond was the person to whom an enclosed paper, now lost, was to be given.
- 51 Hopton, in his narrative of the Civil War, describes how the Oxford Horse under Wilmot, tiring of hard quarters in the Sussex hill country, withdrew to Hampshire, and laid siege to Warblington House, a square pile, garrisoned for Parliament by Colonel Norton. It fell to the Royalists on I January 1644, as Wilmot's letter indicates. *Bellum Civile*, pp. 74-5.
- 52 Stansted House, near Havant, on the Hampshire-Sussex border, once a royal hunting lodge, was now the residence of Richard, Viscount Lumley of Waterford (d. 1661). It was taken by the Horse with Hopton and was

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now serving as Wilmot's headquarters. The high hopes here expressed by Wilmot to Percy, whose cavalry regiment was serving with him, of recruitment of the Foot in Hampshire, of good news from Arundel Castle, were shortly to be disappointed: five days later he wrote again to report that no volunteers had come in, and that Waller had taken the Castle. *V.C.H.*, *Sussex*, IV, pp. 122-3; *C.P.*; Harl. MS. 4713, ff. 251-2; Add. MS. 21506, f. 77; B 242, C 75, and notes there.

- 53 Strachan's letter to Percy's secretary refers again to the shortage of money at Weymouth for purchasing arms and meeting the costs of transporting them. His accounts sent to Oxford 15 December 1643 are not found in the Ordnance Papers. For the projected convoy of the remainder of the arms at Weymouth to Oxford see notes 60 and 64 below.
- Charles Trevanion of Caerhays, Cornwall, a leading Royalist in the county (he was named as a Commissioner of Array in 1642), was appointed Vice Admiral of the South Coast in 1643, as indicated here. His power over shipping in the West brought him into dispute with Royalist naval commanders such as Crispe, Pennington and Haesdonck. He was knighted at Boconnoc in August 1644. C. Clar. S.P., I, pp. 274, 278; Shaw, Knights, II, p.218.
- Warwick, 2nd Baron Mohun (1620-65), helped raise Hopton's army in the West, and was active for the King from September 1642 to September 1643, when, he claimed later, he gave up his commissions. His house and estate in Cornwall, referred to here, were at Boconnoc. C.P.; C.C.C., pp.1504-7.
- Probably, but not certainly, Sir William Killigrew (1606-95), the courtier and dramatist, and during the Civil War Captain of a troop of the King's Lifeguards of Horse. In August 1643 he had gained the reversion to the Governorship of Pendennis Castle, and in October was named one of the Commissioners for Over and Terminer in Cornwall; he may well have been released at this date from his duties at Oxford to aid the Royalist war effort in Cornwall, where his family still had important connections. He now reports from St Michael's Mount on the state of the defences and the mood of the gentry, both in need of repair. The 'industreous Sheriffe' was Francis Bassett of Tehidy, who rebuilt the defences of St Michael's Mount at his own expense and was knighted in 1644. Killigrew wants power from Oxford to reward the King's supporters, such as Bassett, and at the same time enlists Percy's aid in forwarding his own suit to the King for a share in forfeited estates in the county. D.N.B.; M. Coate, Cornwall in the Great Civil War, pp. 103, 120-1, 365-8; ed. A. Collins, Letters. . . of State, II, p.670; Black, p. 78.
- 57 The mouth of the River Maas. A dogger is a two-masted fishing boat.
- This long and instructive letter throws light on the arms traffic between the Low Countries and Western ports: see above, pp. 41-44. Sandys had contracted with Shaw and other merchants in the Netherlands from September 1643 at the latest; see note 30 above. Dunkirk, his present base, was a centre of the trade in arms and munitions, and of piracy. He sent shipments, as he explains here, to Scarborough, where Sir Hugh Cholmley was Governor, and Newcastle, as well as Western ports. The Rotterdam ship, the 'Fortune', Nicholas Brant Master, referred to at the beginning of Sandys'

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letter, returned in May 1644 with a cargo of cloth, C.S.P.D., 1644, p.160. The postscript and C 42 make clear that the ship carrying this letter and arms to Strachan was the 'St Peter' of Dunkirk, Mr Lodon the Captain, Jacques Rayse the contractor, whose factors are or will be established at Weymouth and Dartmouth. The cargo was small, consisting of two chests of pistols, 25 cwt. of match and 27 barrels of powder: cf. C 42. The large stocks held at Dunkirk by Sandys—it was claimed in March 1645 he had sent 40,000 arms to the North and West—are referred to at this date by Lord Goring, who also recommended the agent as 'a most faithful, careful and industrious servant of his Majesty'. Later, however, an arms fraud of Sandys was exposed by Strachan. C.S.P.D., 1644, pp. 157, 159, 160, 1644-5, p.366; C. Clar. S.P., II, pp.181, 203; State Papers . . . of Clarendon, ed. R. Scrope, II, pp. 163-5; H.M.C., 15th Report, II, pp. 94, 98, 99, 111, 115-20.

- 59 William Murray (c. 1600-c. 1653), courtier and friend of Charles I, later 1st Earl of Dysart, had no doubt been, like the others whom Strachan here wished to be remembered to, one of the Captain's 'noble passengers'. D.N.B.; C.P.
- This second letter of Strachan's to Percy illustrates some of the difficulties facing the agents of the Ordnance Office in Western ports. Like the Governor of Dartmouth Strachan had obviously been ordered by Prince Maurice, at this date in Devon, to supply him with arms, in despite of Percy's commands: see above p. 45; C 42; Warburton, II, p.361. The double delivery to Colonel Ashburnham, the new Governor of Weymouth, was a mistake in his favour, which he refused to rectify: cf. B 224, C 41, 42, 59. At the same time the King's supporters in Dorset were divided, neighbouring Parliamentarian garrisons were strong, and the roads from Weymouth, both to Oxford and Bristol, were no longer secure.
- 61 Strachan's letter to Mason, accompanying his to Percy, kept the secretary informed of the supply of wine, olives and pistols. It was addressed to Mason's lodging at the Bear Inn, once the site of the Tabard Inn, now the corner of Alfred St. and High St.
- 62 Robert Slingsby (1611-61) was the second son of Sir Guilford Slingsby, and brother of two Royalist officers, Arthur and Walter: see notes 287, B Section, 111, C Section, and 136, A Section. A naval commander, he had declared for the King in 1642 and been arrested. Now released, he had arrived at Weymouth *en route* for the continent, where he was to raise funds for the Royalist cause. He was made a Baronet at the Restoration. D.N.B.; G.E.C., Baronetage, III, pp. 176-7; C.S.P.D., 1641-3, p. 504, 1644, p.259.
- 63 The amazement of the sailors at the names chosen for the two ships set out as privateers is understandable. It may be that Strachan was indulging a private whim. He refers frequently in his letters to the 'noble passengers' he had carried as a sea-Captain in 1642-3; among these were the Queen and the Duchess of Richmond, who, having survived the hazardous crossing to England from the continent, might well be described as famous persons successful both by land and sea, and be willing to act as 'godmothers' to Strachan's enterprise. 'Pap' was the Duchess of Richmond's

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- nickname: it may be presumed, therefore, that 'Batt' was the Queen's. The 'Resolute Batt' was no doubt the 70-ton prize referred to in C 26.
- 64 In his postscript Strachan refers to orders from Maurice, who was competing with Oxford for the arms at Weymouth: see note 60 above.
- 65 Sir Vivian Molyneux was the younger brother of the 1st Viscount Maryborough. A Lieutenant Colonel in the Scots Wars, he was knighted in 1639 for his services. He was the bearer of this first letter from Sandys to Percy: one other, of March 1644, survives, Harl. MS. 4713, ff. 182-3. Shaw, Knights, II, p. 206.
- 66 Sir Gilbert Gerrard, for whom see note 70, A Section, had arrived in Worcester in December 1643 as Governor in succession to Sir William Russell. On Christmas Day he had been ordered by Percy to send to Oxford 2½ tons of iron delayed at Worcester, A 134. Gerrard now reports on money for Percy he has received, which he will send with the next arms convoy.
- 67 Sir John Berkeley (1607-78), courtier, favourite of the Queen, Ambassador to Sweden, 1637, had been knighted for his services in the Scots War in 1639. He was active in the West for the King and became Governor of Exeter on its fall in September 1643. He no doubt writes from there to Percy to refuse some honour or employment offered by Oxford, possibly in return for supplies from Exeter. Berkeley was later raised to the peerage by Charles II. D.N.B.; C.P.
- 68 This letter, carried by Lord Byron's servant from Bristol to Oxford, crossed with one from Percy to March, as C 47 makes clear. March could not obey Percy's order to supply Byron with munitions; as he reports here, Bristol stores are depleted, Vavasour has to be supplied, and arms making in the city is in danger. Byron was armed from Oxford on 24 January: see B 247.
- The royal warrant of 28 October 1643 does not survive among the Ordnance Papers. March summarises it for the benefit of his General. The order to the Governor of Weymouth, of 4 October 1643 (C 17), is a comparable document.
- 70 In his agitation over the actions of Rupert and Hawley, March writes 'October' (the date of the warrant he refers to) for 'January'. It is clear March was attempting to assume a supervisory role over all arms traffic in the West, but was faced with increasing opposition from all quarters. Cf. note 77 below.
- Vaughan had left his regiment at Oxford and recently arrived in Pembrokeshire, where he was a General under Carbery. He was supplied with arms from Bristol, and money was expected from him by Percy. Notes 61, A Section, and 91 below; C 65; Harl. MS. 4713, ff. 225-6.
- 72 For the winter of 1643-4 Oxfordshire had agreed to pay to the King's forces £1200 a week. In recognition of Kidlington's contribution to this tax Percy excuses the village from quartering the train, but diverts the contribution payment to the Paymaster, John Audley. See above, p. 23 and note 266, B Section; Madan, Oxford Books, II, Nos. 1458, 1498.

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- Forster is referring to the troubles of the French Protestants, whose faith was commonly styled in France 'La Religion Pretendue Réformée'. Following disturbances in Bas-Poitou and Languedoc, which he mentions, the Huguenot representatives had with difficulty obtained permission for a national synod at Charenton in late December 1644, although none had been held since 1637.
- Henri, Comte de Beringhen (d. 1692), a gentleman of Cleves, was close to Frederick Henry, the Stadtholder, and was used as a special envoy by Mazarin to the Dutch, as Forster correctly forecasts. Lettres du Cardinal Mazarin, ed. M. Chéruel, I, pp. 132, 548, 612-3, 622.
- French hopes of an end to the war in Italy, and the withdrawal of their troops from there, were dashed with the death of the pro-French Pope Urban VIII in July 1644. Alexandre Bichi (1597-1657), Bishop of Carpentras, Cardinal (1633), was the papal nuncio in France at this time, and a friend of Mazarin.
- The making of muskets and bandoleers at Bristol under March's supervision had begun in mid-January 1644; he was having difficulty in maintaining payment for the craftsmen, however. He now reports that Colonel Veale's regiment (see note 47, C Section), which required 240 arms and was now leaving the city, would take a full week's production of 200 muskets and pay for them: and that the city, setting up a magazine for its own defence (housed in the Guildhall, for the use of the auxiliary regiment of Foot raised in March 1644), would take 50. A further issue of muskets to the garrison regiments to make good their defects, noted in C 34, is also referred to by March. See above, p. 52 and n.1; C 29, 34, 35, 46, 47.
- March reports on the progress of manufacture at Bristol, first outlined in his letter of 29 January 1644, C 47. He could produce arms and munitions more cheaply than those bought abroad: his muskets were only 18/- each. As was clear in his earlier letter, March sought control over the arms in all Western ports. He calls for accounts from both Weymouth and Dartmouth, and plans a tour of the area. Cf. C 22, 27, 53.
- Goring, Ambassador in France (see note 35, C Section), was active in promoting the trade in arms from Le Havre to Weymouth: the merchants carry his bill of exchange, as well as his letters to Oxford, some of which were intercepted and published by Parliament. Perfect Diurnall, TT: E 252 (21).
- Strachan sends La Riviere with the news that the two Le Havre ships have landed, after much delay, and with disappointingly small cargoes. As he requests, the Queen and Jermyn were immediately informed, for on 11 February the latter wrote to Rupert to tell him of the supplies at Weymouth. The Royalists had now to find the money to buy these arms: Jermyn offered to purchase powder and small arms for Rupert, but it was reported on 19 February that van Haesdonck, returning from Oxford to Weymouth with £3000, was captured near Dorchester. See above, p. 42; notes 28, 29, 31, 34, 60, C Section; Add. MS. 18981, ff. 31, 39, 44, 47.
- The supplies sent on 3 February by Strachan from Weymouth, and now listed by March on their arrival at Bristol, were intended for Rupert's Foot, which was about to rejoin the Prince at Shrewsbury. But the dispute

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between March and Hawley appears to have prevented their delivery, and Rupert complained to Percy that his regiment had not received them. Instead, as C 56 makes clear, the stock of powder was divided between the Deputy Governor and March. For Strode's powder activities see above, p. 44. Add. MS. 18981, ff. 44, 47, 63-4; Warburton, II, p. 380; Pythouse Papers, p. 60.

- 81 This muster roll of the train was first compiled about 9 November 1643 (cf. B 208, 214), then, as changes in personnel took place, revised and added to: the first revision was 20 November 1643, the last 9 May 1644. These alterations to the text are marked here by square brackets. The document may be compared with the earlier establishment of June 1643: see C 4, and above, p. 21. It shows that a 15% expansion of the train had taken place between the two musters, greater in some departments than others (e.g. four new Gentlemen of the Ordnance had been appointed); a matter that was investigated by Oxford Parliament, C 60. Additions to the roll show that new recruitment continued in April-May 1644. Deserters and casualties noted appear to be few. The distribution of personnel between Oxford and other garrisons (including Weymouth, p. 398, Donnington Castle and Greenland House, p. 400) is shown for the first time. Apart from March and his two clerks, however, the train did not staff the Bristol magazine.
- 82 These names were added after the list was originally compiled, possibly at the first major revision of 12 February 1644. See B 260, 261.
- 83 The leaguer was the camp at Reading, much reinforced before and after the battle of Cheriton, March 1644, to which many of the officers of the train were assigned: according to these notes about half the Gentlemen of the Ordnance and Conductors and several matrosses, marked 'Lord Hopton', pp. 400-2. See B 257, 261, 271, 275.
- 84 This conductor, like others on p.398, was assigned to the draught horse under the command of Owen or Hugh Wynne at the Reading camp.
- 85 Godfrey, and the next conductor on the list, was with M. de la Roche, the Master Fireworker, a fact confirmed by B 252.
- 86 This note and others, pp. 400-2, refer to the train of 20 March 1644, sent to Vavasour, commanded by the Gentleman of the Ordnance, Charles Steward, B 264. It returned to Oxford on 6 April 1644, A 140, and Steward was in charge of a section of the city defences by the 17th, B 272.
- 87 This is the only indication that John Taylor, the celebrated 'Water Poet' (1580-1653), was on the payroll of the Ordnance Office.
- 88 Cannon and gunners had been sent to the Oxford Horse under Wilmot campaigning with Hopton in the winter of 1643/4: e.g., 5 March 1644, W.O. 55. 459, ff. 37-8.
- 89 The writer of this letter of compliments may be Sir Richard Percy, an English resident in France. J. W. Stoye, op. cit., p. 405.
- 90 Sir John Pennington (c. 1584-1646), Royalist Admiral, commanded the fleet at Bristol: see above, p. 41. He was now ready to ship these supplies from the city to Royalist forces in Pembrokeshire. The three cannon were not among the artillery taken at Bristol, July 1643, B 144.

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- Carbery, for whom see note 72, B Section, commanded the King's army in Southwest Wales. With his uncle Sir Henry Vaughan he was defeated in Pembrokeshire in the following month: see note 71, above, and C 65.
- March at last received from Percy the backdated warrant which would give him authority over the stores brought to Bristol: see notes 77 and 80 above. Hawley still resisted, however, reserving half the powder from Weymouth for the use of the Bristol garrison. March retaliated by threatening, in his postscript here, to refuse to obey the order of 15 January, to deliver new made arms to Hawley: cf. C 50, 51.
- John Webster was a prominent English merchant, resident at Amsterdam, active in raising money (on the Crown Jewels and the revenue from Cornish tin sales) and purchasing arms in the Netherlands for the Royalist cause. This copy of the bill of lading, sent to Oxford, describes a cargo of arms of about 20 tons. A galliot is a small Dutch cargo boat. The 'Mary' landed at Weymouth in March and returned to Holland on 4 April 1644, C 77. State Papers . . . of Clarendon, II, pp. 163-5; C. Clar. S.P., I, Nos. 2766, 2847, etc.; C.S.P.D., 1664, p. 259; 1644-5, pp. 388, 501-2, 605.
- Strachan has further news of cargoes expected at Weymouth, prizes taken, and his own difficulties regarding money, transport and the posts: Goring's bill, however, has at last been paid, out of the customs: cf. C 52. He confirms that Sir George (not 'John') Strode has an independent arms business in the West: cf. above, p. 44, C 53, 56. Strachan is a day out in his recollection at the end of his letter. The Queen landed at Bridlington Quay on 22 February 1643, and it was on the morning of the following day that Batten's squadron (including Captain Richard Haddock's ship) bombarded her house, with the results Strachan describes.
- No doubt Colonel Giles Strangways (1615-75), of Abbotsbury, Dorset, M.P. for Bridport, 1640-4, a prominent local Royalist and Colonel of a regiment of Horse under Prince Maurice. The delivery of 100 muskets to him is not recorded elsewhere in the Ordnance Papers. Keeler, The Long Parliament.
- 96 Probably Strachan was asked to contribute these 14 Barrels towards the 20 ordered by Oxford to be sent to Lord Arundel and Dodington, besieging Wardour Castle, on 18 February 1644, B 253. In the following month Henry, 3rd Baron Arundel of Wardour (1608-94), recaptured his own castle after a long siege. Cf. note 298, B Section, and next note.
- With a further consignment of arms to Oxford, Strachan sends his account of the deliveries made from the Weymouth magazine 'first and last': the first to Hopton, I October 1643, B 186, the latest the train to Bristol, 3 February 1644, and those still to be sent, C 52, 53, 58. Strachan includes in his totals Lord Montagu's powder (note 100, below), but not Strode's (note 94, above), although both were carried in the same convoy. He does not count the stocks in the French merchants' hands, which remained at Weymouth and were viewed later, C 52, 62. At the end of the letter, the New College clerks have compiled their own list of Weymouth deliveries, presumably from their records, which differ at some points from Strachan's. The convoy of 40-50 waggons, supplied by the Sheriff of Wiltshire, Dorset failing (C 40, 42, 53), arrived at Oxford about 4 March: Luke, ed. Philip, III, p.262.

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- 98 This defence of Percy's Generalship of the Ordnance Office was compiled for the Committee of the House of Commons at Oxford, examining the state of the train on 21-22 February 1644: see above, pp. 22-8, 51. The documents referred to in the defence are C 3, Percy's commission, C 4 and 54, the old and new establishments, and B 202, on transport: the parchment commission authorising the new establishment is not, however, among the Ordnance Papers. Richard March was brought back from Bristol to appear, with Sherburne, before the Committee at this time: cf. C 70.
- 99 The writer is Henry Howard, the town, of which he was Governor, is Malmesbury. As well as the Engineer to the train, Doderick Beckman, material supplies were sent from Oxford and Bristol to the garrison, in March and May 1644. A 161, B 258, and relevant notes.
- 100 Strachan's letter, cited above, p. 43, shows that the supplies sent to Oxford from Weymouth on 26 February, C 59, had got through safely, except that some of the powder sent by Francis, 3rd Viscount Montagu (1610-82), the recusant peer who bought ammunition at Rouen for the King, had been taken by Hopton for his own use. Strachan resists a suggestion by Percy that he should go to Dartmouth to put things in order there, and instead expresses the hope that he can soon return to Oxford. News of the Queen's pregnancy had reached him.
- 101 For Sherburne and the Reading magazine see A 116, B 197, 255, 257 and relevant notes. A number of the officers of the train were now at Reading, and Sherburne expresses concern at their non-payment, which may explain the desertion of one of them—George Pattison, C 54. He also indicates shortages of wooden axles and the iron hoops to bind them.
- This questionnaire, to be answered by Heydon and the officers of the Ordnance, was probably prepared by the Committee of the Oxford Parliament which had earlier quizzed Percy: cf. C 60. It expresses the disquiet of the M.P.s at the growing expense of the Office, and the lack of control over the officers. A train of 30 cannon is envisaged for the coming summer's campaign, as compared with 40 in the previous year: but in fact only ten were actually taken: see above, pp. 26-7; B 288.
- Thomas Bushell (1594-1674), flamboyant businessman and monopolist, had been granted a lease of silver mines in Wales by Charles I before the Civil War, and during the war supplied the King with money, material and arms. Based in Bristol, he now acts to lend Percy money, although he is owed for arms supplied to Vaughan in Wales: and in return asks for arms to be issued to him from the Bristol magazine for the defence of the Welsh mines. Bushell ended the war on Lundy Island. He is referred to again in C 70. D.N.B.; J. W. Gough, The Superlative Prodigall.
- 104 Strachan's long letter about his arrest illustrates the difficulties of the Ordnance Office agents in the Western ports. His main problem was that he had promised to pay the 130-strong crew of the two ships from Le Havre, and their revictualling in France: in all, a sum of £735. The Captains of the ships had returned from Oxford empty-handed, and

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- obviously doubting that Strachan's accounts were accurate. But he blames Francis Gape, the Town Clerk, for his arrest. C 28, 30, 31, 40, 52, 58, 62, 67 refer.
- 105 Strachan sends a further report on the state of his accounts, and gives the news of the arrival of another shipload of arms. He hopes soon to return to Oxford.
- 106 Higgins was probably Lieutenant of a troop of Percy's Horse. The regiment had been ordered to Faringdon in mid-March, and the Lieutenant now reports to Mason on the sequestration of the goods of the elder Sir Robert Pye (1585-1662), the Parliamentarian official and owner of Faringdon House, enclosing a copy of the order of the county sequestration committee to one of its agents. No doubt Percy, no longer at Oxford but with the field army, was ensuring that his Horse benefited from these proceedings. V.C.H. Berks., IV, p. 486; C.S.P.D., 1644, p. 54.
- 107 Strachan sends this letter with the Weymouth carrier, who brings four stand of arms for Oxford lords. 'Captain' Goring is probably Colonel George Goring, son of the Earl of Norwich, who arrived at Oxford at this time. M. Pinoseer was no doubt one of the French merchants engaged in arms traffic for the Royalists.
- 108 March has returned to Bristol after appearing before the Parliamentary Committee at Oxford (C 60), and he refers to his absence. The projected making of musket shot, first mentioned in C 51, now begins. Sir John Winter, supplied from Bristol, was one of the Royalist commanders in the Forest of Dean: see above, pp. 8, 36.
- 109 This letter from Captain Stewart of Percy's Horse provides another instance of the regiment aiding in the seizure of enemy goods: cf. C 68. Coleshill Manor, near Faringdon, was the house of Sir Henry Pratt (1573-1647), Alderman of London. The lead—5 tons, 14 cwt.—was brought to New College stores on 4 April, A 138. The endorsement to this letter appears to indicate that Percy was now at Reading. V.C.H. Berks., IV, pp.517, 519.
- 110 Vavasour writes from Minchinhampton, near Painswick, Gloucestershire, to complain of contradictory orders from Oxford. He had been well supplied earlier, but now returns the two cannon recently sent him. See notes 49 and 113, A Section, 309, B Section, and 86, C Section.
- 111 Arthur Slingsby was now Lieutenant Colonel of Percy's Horse: see note 287. He writes, probably from Faringdon, to his Colonel, presumably still at Reading, of the grave defects in the condition of the regiment.
- 112 Hopton's letter to Nicholas, reporting on the state of his forces after the defeat at Cheriton, was probably passed to the New College officials with the enclosure he sent (now lost), in order that the defects there listed might be remedied.
- 113 Wilmot's cavalry, which had been munitioned by Oxford magazine during March, was shadowing Waller's victorious army, now moving West after the battle of Cheriton. In his note to Percy Wilmot encloses a letter of intelligence from the senior Captain of his regiment of Horse, John Harvey, a veteran officer. The King's forces, as here indicated, were gathering in

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- the Vale of White Horse, Berkshire, preparatory to their rendezvous at Aldbourne Chase, 10 April 1644. W.O. 55. 459, ff. 37-8, 56-7; Harl. MS. 986, f. 83.
- 114 Reading had been denuded for the Cheriton campaign, and now housed a large part of the Royalist Foot. This request of Sir John Owen, the Deputy Governor of the garrison, resulted in substantial supplies being sent on 15 and 20 April, B 271, 275. See note 316, and, for Owen, note 62, A Section.
- makes preparations for a withdrawal of his magazine to the virtually impregnable Portland Castle, on the Isle of Portland. In an evident emergency he cannot employ Customs dues without Oxford authorisation, but he uses French merchants' stocks on his own initiative to equip some of the 'English-Irish' troops brought from Munster by Lord Inchequin to the Southwest. The galliot referred to may be the 'Mary' of Amsterdam, whose cargo was listed at C 57. For the Flemish shipper Haesdonck see above, p. 42.
- 116 Strachan sends this letter to Mason to accompany his one to Percy. The enclosed letter to Thomas Dennis, wealthy citizen, mercer and twice Mayor of Oxford, not among the Ordnance Papers, no doubt concerned his contract with Haesdonck to finance arms imports. S.P. 84, 157, f. 230.
- 117 See note 299, and references there.
- 118 The Chancellor of the Exchequer delivers a sharp rebuke to Percy's request for money. Percy was probably with the army at Reading: the General referred to is presumably Forth. Hyde appears to confirm reports of this date that newly-conscripted recruits to the Royalist Foot were deserting in large numbers.
- 119 For this supply of ironwork, which originated in Shropshire, see A 156 and note 121 there. £10 was little more than half the amount due to the carters for transporting 25 loads from Evesham to Oxford. See above, p.23.
- The Oxford Parliament, which had set up local armouries under civilian control in the spring, had left behind at Oxford a Committee to look after these, and other matters, on its adjournment in April. On 23 May the Committee proposed that the store at Oxford be increased, and on the day following the King issued this order to Percy to send muskets, brought in by Winter Graunt (for whom see note 7, A Section), to Oxford for this purpose. Both Keepers of the Stores were London citizens with court connections. Sir George Bynion was a wealthy Cheapside silk-merchant, who before the war and after the Restoration was also a prominent royal official: and Thomas Nevill, a draper, was Sir Edward Nicholas's brother-in-law. D. Nicholas, Secretary Nicholas, pp. 91, 106, 177, 195, etc. See above, pp.51-2.

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ADDENDUM

Notes to pp. 427-8

This document, which came to light after the publication of the first part of the *Ordnance Papers*, is among the Dartmouth Papers deposited at Staffordshire Record Office: press mark D (W) 1778 I, No. 40. It is reproduced here by kind permission of the Earl of Dartmouth.

The document consists of 16 unnumbered pages, folio. It is endorsed: '4º: february 1644. Notes taken out of Mr Goodwins Booke. his Highnes P. Rupert his Secretary. S.' It records meetings held by the Prince, now Captain General of the Royalist forces, at Oxford, over several days, beginning 29 January 1645. The last page, however, takes the form of a copy of Heydon's instructions to Sherburne, following the decisions arrived at: and Heydon has also added in his own hand the notes 'reinforced feild peeces' and 'Drakes' beside the list of ordnance on p. 428.

The paper concerns the preparation of the train of artillery for the coming summer's campaign. Colonel William Legge, among whose MSS it is found, was not only the recently-appointed Governor of Oxford but also the Master of the Armoury and a close friend of Rupert's (see above, p.28): he was no doubt involved in the discussions recorded, and kept this copy for his own use.

The significance of the document is that it throws light on a particularly obscure period in the history of the Ordnance Office at Oxford (not covered by the extant Ordnance Papers), when important decisions were made about the coming—fatal—year for the Royalists.

- In asking Hopton, the General of the Artillery, now at Bristol, for an inventory of stores in the West, Rupert may have had in mind the grave concern felt by the Ordnance officers at Oxford about the dispersal of the train and its supplies which had occurred over the past two years. With the accounts furnished by Hopton the Prince hoped to draw transport, tools, etc. from Bristol, 'its dependent Garrisons' (p.428), and Bridgwater, to supply the marching train. Bodleian: Clarendon MS. Vol. 23, No. 1796.
- 3 Prince Maurice was at this time at Worcester, attempting to reconstitute his brother's command of the year before in the Welsh Marches. The West Midlands iron industry, which he was asked to direct, had made important contributions to the Royalist war effort in previous years: see note 121, A Section.
- 4 For Shrewsbury and bridge boats see note 155, A Section. Rupert had taken pontoon bridges with him on the Newark and York expeditions in 1644.
- 5 Colonel Thomas Leveson was Governor of Dudley Castle, close to the ironworks at Stourbridge owned by Richard Foley: see note 282, B Section and above, p. 36. Rupert reported 2300 pikeheads at Worcester in March: Warburton, III, p. 68.
- 6 A marching train of only 20 cannon is planned, to be ready by 20 March 1645. The 'former Proportion' (of 40 guns, referred to here, and in the Ordnance Papers) was thereby halved, a recognition of the fact that, in previous years, many fewer had been actually taken into the field and used. The six biggest (reinforced) guns were no doubt designed for siegework, the 14 field guns for the firing of grapeshot. 200 horses would be required

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to draw the cannon, at least another 200 the ammunition and supply waggons, and in the event the shortage of draught animals at Oxford, as well as delays to the ironwork at Worcester, prevented this train from being ready on time. The King and Prince did not march out of Oxford on the Naseby campaign until 7 May, and they took only 14 cannon, leaving behind the twelve-pounders and two six-pounders. See above, pp. 23-8, 55-7, and note 155, A Section.

- 7 Thomas Wells was an overseer, wheelwright and ladlemaker to the train, turned Bridge Master: John Taylor, the 'Water Poet', was a river official attached to the Ordnance Office. Together they would supply the expertise needed to provide bridge boats and their carriages at Oxford: see C 54, A 184, 188, 189 etc, and notes 87, C Section, and 155, A Section.
- 8 The towns and villages near Oxford were to contribute timber supplies, as they had done in previous years. Pikestaves were to be provided by Blewbury (Berks), planks and boards by Witney and Faringdon, both Royalist garrisons. The Governor of Faringdon was Sir George Lisle. See notes 162, A Section, 221 and 336, B Section.
- 9 Sir Richard Crane, of Woodrising, Norfolk, was an old servant of the Palatines and a follower of Rupert. At this date he commanded Rupert's Lifeguards of Horse, which may have been quartered at Witney: this may have been the reason for his being asked to organise supplies there. Crane was killed at Bristol in the following month. Symonds, p.181: G.E.C., Baronetage, II, p.209.
- 10 George Cole was the Purveyor to the train, concerned with supplying Donnington Castle and Basing. The other craftsmen, referred to in Heydon's instructions, are Robert Collins, Master Carpenter, and Michael Bastian, Master Smith.

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
